Richard Darman has requested comments by January 6 on enrolled resolution S.J. Res. 101, which designates the week of October 17 - 23, <u>1982</u>, as "National High School Activities Week." The resolution notes the benefits of extracurricular activities and states that former President Ford has agreed to serve as honorary national chairman of the effort to emphasize the importance of such activities. OMB recommends approval; Education has no objection. In light of the tardiness of the resolution, James Frey recommends in his memorandum to the President that he sign the resolution, but not issue a proclamation. It also notes that half of the students in senior high schools are involved in extracurricular activities, such as athletics, speech, music, debate, drama, and others, that contribute to positive development and superior achievements.

S.J. Res. 101 passed both Houses by voice vote. Unfortunately, the Senate did not take final action until December 16, 1982, approximately two months after the scheduled observance. Because issuance of a proclamation now would be untimely, we recommend that you sign the enrolled resolution, but not issue a proclamation.

#### Discussion

H.J. Res. 459 requests the President to issue a proclamation designating May 13, 1983, as "American Indian Day", and calling for appropriate observances by the American people. The resolution passed both Houses by voice vote.

Congresswoman Fiedler, in presenting the resolution on the House floor, noted that the Indian community has played an integral part throughout the history of the New World. Among the historical highlights cited by her is the fact that in 1916, the Society of American Indians set aside May 13 as Indian Day to recognize and honor the American Indian and improve his conditions. H.J. Res. 459, proclaiming a similar day in 1983, constitutes the first such recognition ever given by the Congress to the original Americans.

Richard Darman has requested comments by close of business today on enrolled resolution H.J. Res. 635. This amends the statutory deadlines for the President's submission of the Budget (from any time during the first fifteen days of the regular session of Congress to January 31) and of the Economic Report (from January 20 to January 31). The resolution also changes the deadline for two other economic reports. OMB recommends approval, and the Council of Economic Advisers has no objection.

In his memorandum for the President, David Stockman notes that normally the Economic Report is transmitted a few days after the Budget, and that current plans call for the Budget to be submitted on January 31 and the Economic Report on February 3. Stockman states that he has received "informal assurances" that there is no "substantial objection" to submission of the Economic Report after January 31.

If Congress passes and the President signs a joint resolution mandating transmittal of the Economic Report by January 31, I think the President should transmit the Economic Report by that date, regardless of "normal practice" or "informal assurances." I see no legal objections to the joint resolution, but I do object to the drift of the last paragraph of Stockman's memorandum, and recommend noting this objection in your memorandum to Darman. A proposed draft is attached.



#### Purpose

Provides later dates than required in current law for submission of the next Budget and Economic Report, and for submission and evaluation of current services estimates related to the 1984 Budget.

#### Agency Recommendations

#### Discussion

H.J. Res. 635 overrides the provisions of current law governing the due dates for submission of the 1984 Budget and the upcoming Economic Report. Under current law, the Budget must be transmitted during the first 15 days of each regular session of Congress and the Economic Report must be transmitted not later than January 20 of each year. H.J. Res. 635 sets January 31, 1983, as the latest date for transmittal of both the next Budget and Economic Report.

H.J. Res. 635 also changes the due dates in current law applicable to the current services estimates of budget authority and outlays related to the 1984 Budget. Instead of a deadline of before November 11, 1982 (i.e., November 10), submission of the next set of current services estimates must occur not later than the date of transmission of the 1984 Budget. In addition, the deadline for submission by the Joint Economic Committee of its economic evaluation of the current services estimates is changed from before January 1, 1983, to not later than March 1, 1983, the same date by which the Committee is required to report on the President's Economic Report. The enrolled resolution, which was passed by voice vote in both Houses, is intended to accommodate congressional and Executive branch schedules for delivery of the State of the Union address and subsequent transmission of the Budget and Economic Report. Normally, however, the Economic Report is sent to the Congress a few days after the Budget. The intention this year was to transmit the Budget on January 31, and the Economic Report on February 3.

We have obtained informal assurances from relevant minority and majority staff in both Houses that no substantial objection exists to transmittal of the Budget on January 31 and the Economic Report later that week. We will continue to explore this matter with the CEA and the Congress.

Establishing the dates for submission of the Budget and Economic Report.

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That (a) notwithstanding the provisions of section 1105 of title 31, United States Code, the President shall transmit to the Congress not later than January 31, 1983, the budget for the fiscal year 1984, and (b) notwithstanding the provisions of section 3 of the Act of February 20, 1946, as amended (15 U.S.C. section 1022) the President shall transmit to the Congress not later than January 31, 1983, the Economic Report.

SEC. 2. That (a) notwithstanding the provisions of section 1109(a) of title 31, United States Code, the President shall submit to the Senate and the House of Representatives the estimates required to be submitted by said subsection for the fiscal year 1984 not later than the date on which the President transmits to the Congress the budget for the fiscal year 1984, and (b) notwithstanding the provisions of section 1109(b) of title 31, United States Code, the Joint Economic Committee shall submit to the Committees on the Budget of both Houses the evaluation required to be submitted by said subsection for the fiscal year 1984 not later than the date on which the report for the fiscal year 1984 pursuant to section 5(b)(3) of the Employment Act of 1946 (15 U.S.C. 1024b) is filed with the Senate and House of Representatives.

#### Discussion

S.J. Res. 35 designates the week of March 20 through March 26, 1983, as "National Mental Health Counselors Week", and requests the President to issue a proclamation calling upon all Government agencies and people of this Country to observe the week with appropriate ceremonies and activities. The resolution was passed by voice vote in both the Senate and the House.

The resolution notes that mental health counselors work in a specialized field of counseling which emphasizes the developmental and adjustive nature of mental health services. Representative Walgren, in House floor remarks on S.J. Res. 35, stated that thousands of mental health counselors across the country help people deal with personal and adjustment problems. They are often part of a medical team and provide direct services to individuals in a variety of public and private settings. Mental health counselors probably provide up to 50 percent of all direct counseling services. H.J. Res. 102, the House companion to S.J. Res. 35, had 236 co-sponsors.

An appropriate proclamation is being drafted and will be forwarded to the White House as soon as possible.

#### Discussion

S.J. Res. 20 authorizes and requests the President to issue a proclamation designating March 27, 1983, as "National Recovery Room Nurses Day" and calling upon the people of this country to observe the day with appropriate programs, ceremonies, and activities. The resolution passed by voice vote in both House and the Senate.

The resolution notes that the immediate postanesthetic period is the most critical time in a patient's recovery. Recovery room nurses provide safety and comfort to the patient who is unable to meet his or her own physical needs. This skilled nursing care reduces the incidence of post-operative complications and mortality.

The resolution makes special mention of the American Society of Post Anesthesia Nurses, whose focus is the education of its membership, with a goal of excellence in the care of patients who have undergone surgery and the administration of anesthetic agents.
