In light of all these circumstances, this office would have no objection to a brief message applauding the work of the Fund, without directly encouraging contributions.

FUND STARTED FOR A "PEOPLE OF MAINE'S MEMORIAL TO SAMANTHA SMITH"

November 29, 1985

For Immediate Release

It was announced today by the Auburn Mall, Auburn, Maine, that a fund entitled "The People of Maine's Memorial to Samantha Smith" has been established. The goal of the fund is to offer the people of Maine an opportunity to create a permanent memorial to the Manchester schoolgirl whose correspondence with Soviet Leader Yuri Andropov launched her on a mission of world peace.

"The idea for the memorial came as a response to the people of the community who expressed a strong need to do something to honor Samantha Smith and her work for peace after her untimely death last August," said Glenn Michaels, Marketing Director of the Auburn Mall and project coordinator.

After much discussion with several people who were closely associated with the Smith Family, it was decided that a life-size bronze statue of Samantha, donated by by the people of Maine and displayed in a highly visible Maine location, would be the a fitting tribute.

"We want everyone in Maine to have the opportunity to participate in this memorial to Samantha Smith," Said Dora Clark, Auburn Mall Manager. "We hope that the Auburn Mall's donation of the model will act as catalyst for the raising of the approximately \$25,000 needed for a lifesize bronze figure."

The next step was to create a support group that would oversee the project and make it the best memorial possible to Samantha. The Portland Museum of Art was contacted to help in the selection of the artist. Norstan Bank, who does financial work with The American Heart Association, United Way and several other community groups, was brought in to assist with and oversee the finances. Governor Brennan's

office will assist with the memorial's final site selection and other professionals from a wide variety of fields have donated their time and expertise to the project.

With a tentative plan in place, Jane Smith, Samantha's mother, was contacted. "We felt that it was essential to have Mrs. Smith's approval before we started the project." Michaels stated. "This was especially important as we hoped that Mrs. Smith would be able to work with the artist to help design the memorial and approve the finished statue."

"I offer my personal approval and support for the project," Jane Smith wrote in a letter to the Auburn Mall. "I like both the accessibility and the permanence of such a memorial."

Following the lead of the successful fundraising campaign of the Vietnam Veterans Leadership Program of Maine for their memorial in Augusta; it was decided that the Auburn Mall would commission an artist to design and sculpt a scale model of the memorial to be available for public display and fundraising.

It is important to note that the "People of Maine's Memorial to Samantha Smith" is totally separate from the Samantha Smith Foundation chaired by Mrs. Smith. The Samantha Smith Foundation is a non-profit organization whose purpose is to foster international understanding through supporting and promoting exchange programs involving people of all ages living in countries throughout the world. All money raised by the "People of Maine's Memorial to Samantha Smith" in excess of the goal will be donated to the Samantha Smith Foundation.

According to Samantha Smith Four dation Vice President Judy Bielecki of Littleton, "the Four dation's board of directors also is in favor of the mer orial statue and believes there should be several options available for the people who want to remember Samantha Smith in some way. We appreciate this initiative very much, "she said. "Although the Foundation is a separate entity, we thoroughly approve of the memorial and are grateful of this remembrance. It's a wonderful thing to do."

Glann Hines, a 35-year-old Houlton artist, is being paid by the Auburn Mall to design and produce the 37 inch memorial model. Hines said he had been considering designing a statue in honor of Samantha even before he was

contacted by the mall. "It was a real coincidence that I was called because doing something like this had been on my. mind for some time," Hines said. "I'm very excited about it all!"

Hines, a long-time friend of the Smith Family, has already been working with Mrs. Smith on the design and hopes to have the model completed by mid December.

The fundraising will be kicked off at the Auburn Mall following the public unveiling of the statue model this month. Efforts currently are under way to enlist the support of Maine's school children in a memorial fundraising campaign to begin statewide in early January. "It only seems natural to involve the children of Maine in a project like this," Said Michaels. "Ideally all of the fundraising events will continue Samantha's mission for world peace in some way. We look forward to some friendly competition between schools and children all over the state."

Request for Congratulatory Note from the President to Commemorate 100th Anniversary of Sun Company

The Vice President of Sun Company has requested a message from the President congratulating the company on its centennial anniversary. He has apparently gotten wind of our policy against such messages, and argues for an exception because (1) the message will only be used in an internal commemorative book, and (2) Sun Company has such an excellent record of corporate citizenship.

The attached standard reply has been expanded by the addition of a new third paragraph, dealing with the suggestion that an exception should be made for Sun.

Thank you for your recent letter requesting a Presidential message congratulating Sun Company on its 100th anniversary.

I am sorry to advise you that we must decline this request. Throughout the Administration, the White House has sought to adhere to a policy of not sending Presidential congratulatory messages to commercial entities. As you might expect, the White House receives numerous requests for such messages. Both because it would be impossible to honor some requests without unintentionally offending those whose requests were declined, and because of concerns about the President sending congratulations to any particular company in a given competitive business, it was decided that the only fair method of dealing with such requests would be to adopt a general rule that the President would not send messages for commercial events.

Your letter acknowledged this policy but argued for an exception based on the limited contemplated use of the requested Presidential message, and Sun Company's record of corporate citizenship. We have adhered to our policy in previous instances despite similar assurances with respect to use of the message. Nor do I believe it advisable or even possible for the White House to attempt to evaluate corporate history in deciding whether anniversary messages should be issued.

Obviously, Sun Company is celebrating an important event, and I can understand your seeking a message for this occasion. At the same time, though, I know you can understand the reasons we must adhere to the policy described above, in fairness to all who have requested such Presidential messages.

Dear Larry:

Attached are a series of letters and memos dating back to July 23, 1985, which chronicle my efforts to obtain a congratulatory note from the President to commemorate the 100th anniversary of Sun Company. Until last Friday, I had been given every indication that such communications were routine.

I am now advised that because of some unfortunate misuses of similar presidential messages, this practice has been largely discontinued at the recommendation of the counsel's office.

Although I fully appreciate the necessity of establishing reasonable protection against misuses or abuses of the President's written communications, I question the necessity of a totally inflexible prohibition. In particular, I question whether such a provision must be enforced in circumstances where stringent protections against abuses are assured, and where the history of integrity of the requesting institution is beyond reproach. I believe our request is defensible on both of these counts.

Our planned use of the congratulatory letter is as the front piece for a history of the Sun Company. Letters from our chairman, Theodore A. Burtis, and our president, Robert McClements, will follow. The balance of the book will comprise one hundred pages of narrative and pictures of what we're describing as Sun Company's successful, century-long adventure in the free enterprise system.

This will be the sole use to which the letter would be put, and distribution of the history book will be limited to officers, directors, employees and retirees of the company along with a few close associates in the communities in which we work and live. I can absolutely assure you that any presidential communication would be limited to this use alone.

As to the overall integrity of the requesting institution, I would simply make reference to the hundred-year history of corporate and community dealings of the company which was founded by the Pew family of Philadelphia. Fewer than fifty American companies have reached this century milestone, and I submit that few if any can match Sun Company's record for fair dealing, compassion and commitment to excellence. Moreover, few companies can match Sun's long-standing history of support for the Republican Party for fully three quarters of its existence.

I'll conclude by again acknowledging the necessity for protecting the office of the presidency. However, I firmly believe that this request is one that the President himself would promptly approve if asked. A presidential note acknowledging Sun company's centennial will not be abused and should not be denied us.



Proposed Presidential Letter to Harry Casey Who Made Substantial Contribution to Eureka College

Fred Ryan has asked for your views on a proposed letter from the President to Harry Casey, thanking Mr. Casey for a recent substantial contribution to Eureka College. I called Ryan for more background. The 95-year old Casey has been a long-time supporter of Eureka. Eureka officials learned that Casey would be present at a December 2 fundraiser in Seattle for Senator Packwood that the President was addressing, and asked if a "handshake" could be arranged. The President did meet briefly with Casey in Seattle, simply exchanging the usual pleasantries. Casey gave the President two gold coins, which are being appropriately processed by the Gift Unit. On January 6, Casey made an unexpected and unsolicited gift of \$500,000 to Eureka. The President learned of this and asked for Casey's address for a thank-you note; Ryan thought it best to furnish a draft.

I have no objection. Based on what Ryan has told me, there was no "quid pro quo" involved here, and I see no reason to object to a brief thank-you on Ronald Reagan personal stationery.
