SUBJECT: NEED FOR A JOINT US-UK ASSESSMENT ON SYRIA AND ANO

Roger Bone of the UK Embassy called to double check our understanding of the "joint" assessment on Syria and the ANO which was agreed in Venice. I said I could not be sure without checking with Frank Carlucci and those who participated in the conversation in Venice, but that it seemed to me that the following was a reasonable way to proceed:

- -- we would do our U.S-only community assessment and have this ready for policy-level review by Tuesday (this has already been tasked);
- -- there was, coincidentally, a JIC paper on the same subject done last week and we would take that into account in doing our paper;
- -- once our paper is finished, we could get together with the UK and in consultation with them decide if another JIC paper is necessary (hopefully not);
 - -- if a JIC paper is needed, we will have to agree on

working that paper also.

Roger replied that this is very much in line with the thinking in London and that in presenting this to Frank Carlucci I could say that this approach was acceptable to the Cabinet Office and No. 10 Downing Street.

I said I would get back to him if this were not the way we wished to proceed. We agreed to keep in touch.

DEAR MAGARET:

THANK YOU FOR YOUP JUNE 26 LETTER. FIRST, LET ME SAY THAT I WAS DIS AYED THAT MY LETTER TO ASSAD AND THE PLAN TO SIND A PICIAL FINOY TO DAMASCUS WERE LEAKED TO THE NEWS MEDIA HERE. I REGRET THAT NEWS OF THE LETTER AND ENVOY CAUSED PROBLEMS FOR YOU FFORF THE EC MEETING. I AM PLEASED TO SEE THAT WE HAVE REACHED AN AGREED ASSESSMENT OF THE IMPORTANCE OF THE RECENT MOVES BY PRESIDENT ASSAD AGAINST THE A U NIDAL ORGANIZATION. ALSO, WE ART, I FLI V., IN COMPLETE ACREEMENT THAT ANY APPROACH TOWARDS SYRIA SHOULD OF CAUTIOUS, DELIBERATE AND STEP- Y-STEP.

WE SFF VALUE IN PRESSURING ASSAD TO TAKE ADDITIONAL ACTION A AINST ARU NIDAL AND TO A ANDON HIS SUPPORT OF TERRO ISTS. E IDES ABU NIDAL THERE A E ADDITIONAL A EAS WHE E WE THINK ASSAD SHOULD OF WILLING TO TAKE MEASURES, E.G. AGAI ST HIZ OLLAH AND IN CONTROLLING REIRUT INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT. ASSAD HAS THE MEANS TO TAKE ADDITIONAL STLPS AND WE WILL PRESS HIM TO DO SO, MAKING IT CLEAR THAT A FUNDAMENTAL IMP OVEMENT IN OUR ELATERAL RELATIONS WILL DEPEND ON HIS TAKING CONCRETE ACTION.

THE ACTION HE TOOK AGAINST A U NIDAL WAS THE FIRST STEP. SYRIA CAN ALSO CONTRIBUTE WUCH TO RESTORING O DER IN LE ANO, TO AKING A VIA LE PEACE PROCESS POSSI LE, AND TO AFFECTING THE SHAPE OF THE IRAN-IRAQ WAR BY DISTANCING ITSFLF FROM IRAN. WITHOUT ILLUSIONS OR A FALSE SET OF EXPECTATIONS, WE'RE PREPARED TO TEST ASSAD.

16. THE RITISH AS EFD UT STESSED AGAIN WASHINGTON'S KEY ROLE IN POOTING SUCH A PACKAGE AND DEPRIVING SHAMIR OF A VETO OVER A CONFERENCE.

17. UPPHY ADDED THAT DESPITE ALL THE TALK OF FLEXIBILITY, IT WOULD IF DIFFICULT FOR THE SOVIETS TO CHANGE LONG-HELD POSITIONS, ESPLCIALLY U DER U.S. PRESSURE. IF THE UK, FRANCE

(The President and Prime Minister Thatcher first met for 45 minutes with notetakers. The discussion then continued at lunch.) (%)

The President greeted Mrs. Thatcher in the Oval Office and the two walked outside for a photo opportunity. During the picture-taking, the <u>President</u> thanked Mrs. Thatcher for her statements on television that morning. He also explained why he had decided not to answer press questions shouted at him during photo opportunities, but to wait to make a detailed statement when the Irangate hearings were completed. (U)

The two returned to the Oval Office and began to talk about the Arab - Israeli peace process. The President noted that the Secretary of State had had a prior meeting with Mrs. Thatcher, and had wanted to suggest a change in the Prime Minister's departure statement. (S)

Mrs. Thatcher acknowledged her discussion with Secretary Shultz earlier in the morning. She said she had shown the Secretary her draft departure statement which contained a lengthy reference to the idea of an international conference on the Middle East. (S)

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The <u>President</u> at this point handed Mrs. Thatcher the text of Secretary Shultz' suggested revision for this section of the departure statement. (U)

Mrs. Thatcher read the paragraph, and proclaimed it a reasonable compromise. She called it a skillful piece of drafting and said she would incorporate it in its entirety in her departure statement. (V)

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Mr. Powell then handed to Mrs. Thatcher a further suggested revision in the paragraph on the Arab-Israeli international conference, for insertion in her departure statement. Mrs. Thatcher gave this new version to the President who suggested the matter be reviewed again at the luncheon. The two then proceeded together upstairs for lunch, joining the other 10 guests who were already in the dining room.

At the start of the lunch, a slight revision of the paragraph on the Middle East, prepared by Secretary Shultz, was shown to Mrs. Thatcher. She read it quickly, and agreed to its content. The text of the paragraph, which was later used by Mrs. Thatcher in her departure statement, read as follows:

"Second, we discussed the prospect for peace in the Middle East. We agreed -- and here, Mr. President, I use words which we both formally endorsed -- we agreed that direct negotiations between the parties are the only practical way to proceed. We also explored how an international conference might contribute to bringing about such negotiations. Clearly, it would not have the right to impose solutions or to veto agreements reached by the parties. We must continue to make progress in the peace process and commit ourselves to work for that." (W)

As Mrs. Thatcher looked over the statement, the President welcomed her formally to Washington and told a joke about how the British might end their driving on the right (wrong) side of the road. Mrs. Thatcher chuckled, and said real problems of this sort would arise when construction of a tunnel under the English Channel began. The only solution may be to build two tunnels.

Mrs. Thatcher went on to say she had been shocked by the questions about arms control shouted by the press during the photo opportunity. Why was the press more concerned by the timing of an INF agreement and a Summit than by the contents of the document? Much more must be done, she insisted, to educate our publics on the importance of getting the details right. We must be careful and that means proceeding slowly and cautiously. The press and public would rightfully blame us if we entered into an agreement that had serious faults. (V)

Mr. Carlucci noted in this connection that the Soviet position on verification was very weak. (3)

The President then recalled the phrase he had learned in Russian: Trust but verify. (N)

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The President said he had fantasized many times about what he might show the Soviet leader when he visits Washington, and what Gorbachev's reactions might be. He assumed Gorbachev would be



surprised beyond belief. He recalled in this connection that a Soviet fighter pilot defected to the West several years ago and that a fascinating biography had been written about the pilot, containing a long flashback of the young Russian's boyhood. The point the President said he wanted to make was that the defector, even when taken to a US supermarket, could not believe that such an institution existed. Nor could he accept that officers and enlisted men in the US Army treated each other as friends and colleagues, with a measure of respect for one another. This was contrary to the pilot's experience in the Soviet military. The young Soviet pilot also, for example, had never driven a car.

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The President suggested that WW-II presented a classic case of how deterrents work. Both sides, observing what had occurred in WW-I, decided not to employ chemical weapons. (U)
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The President expressed his thanks to Mrs. Thatcher and encouraged her to speak out to the Congress. She had his word that he would continue to oppose restrictive trade legislation. (b)

Secretary Shultz then noted that we had been through this debate before. We had been in the 1930's and we had all lived through the results. (%)

The President agreed, and noted that the only difference between now and the 1930's was that US political parties had reversed roles. It was FDR who had run against big government and high



tariffs. The President recalled that he had been a Democrat in the 1930's, and it was the Republicans who were then for tariffs and restrictive trade legislation. (4)

 $\underline{\text{Mrs. Thatcher}}$ said she had looked at the House and Senate bills. Both seemed bad. (V)

Howard Baker remarked that both bills had been butchered with amendments dealing with non-trade subjects. This was a sign that Congress recognized that the President would veto the bills, and that they could get a free ride by attaching personal pet projects to the pending legislation. (U)

Secretary Weinberger noted two especially troublesome amendments which prevented SDI contracts from being given to our Allies abroad. (U)

Mr. Carlucci observed that restrictive trade legislation was being considered at the very moment our trade deficit was being turned around. (5)

Mrs. Thatcher asked whether this was clearly evident, and the President affirmed that the trend was in a positive direction. Secretary Weinberger added that the total budget deficit was going down as well, but that nobody in Congress would acknowledge this fact. (N)

The conversation then turned to the press. Mrs. Thatcher said that she found the questioners she faced on several talk shows this morning very nervy. Some insisted the President knew everything and had made bad decisions, and others that he was so detached that he made too few decisions. (%)

The President said that he recalled a speech he gave at Albert Hall in London some years ago when he was Governor of California. As was the custom, each participant was given a box lunch. Inside his box was a lamb chop and some fruit -- but no utensils. The President said he picked up his lamb chop with his fingers and began to eat. The press immediately began snapping pictures and the next morning under his photograph in the newspapers was the suggestion that he used his fingers because he didn't know which fork to employ. One couldn't win with the press. Lyndon Johnson often suggested to friends that if he were seen walking across the Potomac River, the Washington press would criticize him the next morning for not knowing how to swim. (%)

Mrs. Thatcher said that she has to stand up every Tuesday and Thursday in Parliament to answer questions from the opposition. This made one tough enough to stand up to almost anything. She had already done three television shows that morning, and was doing a fourth this afternoon. It was for Face the Nation, which would be shown on Sunday. (V)

The President ended the lunch with two jokes from what he said were from his collection of current, authentic Soviet humor. The first concerned a Soviet citizen, who after waiting years to buy a car, presented his money to a Soviet official. The official told him to come back in 10 years exactly -- July 17, 1997 -- to pick up his car. The Soviet citizen asked if he should return in the morning or afternoon. The official seemed annoyed and asked what difference did it make. The citizen replied simply: the plumber is coming that morning. (U)

The second story concerned Gorbachev's efforts to catch and punish all those caught speeding on the highway. Soon after a measure to this effect went into law, Gorbachev found himself outside Moscow and running late for a meeting. He thereupon told his driver to get in the back of the car so that he could drive. He sped down the road where two policemen with motorcycles were waiting. One gave chase, stopped the car, and in a minute or two turned around and returned to where the second policeman was waiting. The second policeman asked the first if he had written a ticket or arrested the driver. The first policeman replied negatively. The second policeman asked why not. The first policeman's explanation for inaction was that the person in the car was very important. The second policeman inquired who this important person was. The first policeman said: I don't know, but his driver was Gorbachev.

The meeting ended on this note and the President and Prime Minister Thatcher walked out to the diplomatic entrance to deliver their departure statements.

SECRETARY SHULTZ AND PRIME MINISTER **SUMMARY:** THATCHER MET FOR 45-MINUTES JULY 17 AT THE BRITISH EMBASSY. AFTER A SHORT INTRODUCTORY DISCUSSION IN WHICH PRIME MINISTER THATCHER EXPRESSED SOME WONDERMENT AND DISMAY OVER MEDIA AND CONGRESSIONAL HANDLING OF THE IRAN/CONTRA AFFAIR, THE MEETING CONCENTRATED LARGELY ON TWO AREAS: ARMS CONTROL WITH PARTICULAR REFERENCE INF/SRINF, AND THE MIDDLE EAST WITH A FOCUS PRIMARILY ON THE PEACE PROCESS AND POSSIBILITIES FOR AN INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE. MRS. THATCHER PROPOSED THAT SHE AND PRESIDENT REAGAN AGREE TO A COMMON POSITION ON AN INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE FOR ANNOUNCEMENT DURING HER WASHINGTON VISIT, HANDING THE SECRETARY SOME SUGGESTED THE SECRETARY SAID HE WOULD LOOK AT THE LANGUAGE. DRAFT TO SEE WHETHER A MUTUALLY AGREED FORMULATION MIGHT BE POSSIBLE. THERE WAS A BRIEF DISCUSSION OF THATCHER EXPRESSING HOPE THAT SOUTHERN AFRICA WITH MRS.

THE SECRETARY IN TURN EXPRESSED HIS HOPE THAT MRS. THATCHER DURING HER WASHINGTON VISIT WOULD MAKE A PUBLIC ENDORSEMENT OF SUPPORT FOR THE FRONTLINE STATES, PARTICULARLY FOR MOZAMBIQUE AND CHISSANO. THE SECRETARY WAS ACCOMPANIED IN THE MEETING BY ASSISTANT SECRETARY RIDGWAY, AMBASSADOR PRICE, AND EUR/NE OFFICE DIRECTOR COOPER (NOTETAKER). THE PRIME MINISTER WAS JOINED BY AMBASSADOR ACLAND AND CHARLES POWELL FROM HER OFFICE. END SUMMARY.

- THE PRIME MINISTER BEGAN BY EXPRESSING CONSTERNATION AND DISMAY OVER THE WAY THAT CONGRESS IS HANDLING THE IRAN/CONTRA AFFAIR AND ITS TREATMENT BY THE US MEDIA. SHE OBSERVED THAT THE PRESIDENT'S CRITICS APPEAR TO BE RUNNING TWO OR THREE HORSES IN DIFFERENT DIRECTIONS. THEY ACCUSE THE PRESIDENT OF NOT BEING IN CONTROL BECAUSE HE USES NOTES. "I USE NOTES MYSELF" SHE OBSERVED. AT THE SAME TIME, THEY IGNORE THE PRESIDENT'S STRONG LEADERSHIP AND CLEAR DECISIONS ON THE PERSIAN GULF AND SOUTH KOREA, TO NAME TWO RECENT EXAMPLES. OBSERVING THAT GORBACHEV MUST BE LAUGHING AT THE US ANTICS, SHE SAID SHE HAD LECTURED THE PRESS THAT IT CANNOT USE ITS FREEDOM ONLY TO TEAR DOWN AND TO DESTROY. SHE SAID SHE HAD USED HER INTERVIEWS IN WASHINGTON TO SUPPORT THE PRESIDENT AND TO EMPHASIZE THE IMPORTANCE TO THE WESTERN WORLD OF CONTINUED STRONG US LEADERSHIP.
- 4. MRS. THATCHER SAID THAT THE MEDIA HAD ALSO FREQUENTLY ASKED HER WHY THE RUSSIANS ARE DRAGGING THEIR FEET ON AN INF/SRINF AGREEMENT. SHE SAID THAT IN HER VIEW THE ANSWER IS OBVIOUS: GORBACHEV VERY MUCH WANTS AN AGREEMENT, BUT HE HAS TO BE VERY CAREFUL. HE MUST DO TWO THINGS; HE HAS TO CHANNEL MORE MONEY INTO THE DOMESTIC ECONOMY, MEANING LESS MONEY FOR THE MILITARY; AT THE SAME TIME, HOWEVER, HE HAS TO SOMEHOW KEEP THE MILITARY WITH HIM.
- 5. SECRETARY SHULTZ OBSERVED THAT THE SOVIET PAUSE IS NOT UNEXPECTED. THEY HAVE DONE IT BEFORE ON OCCASIONS WHEN THEY THINK THEY HAVE SOMETHING THAT WE WANT.

 GORBACHEV WANTS TO LET US WRIGGLE FOR A WHILE. THE SECRETARY INDICATED THAT HE BELIEVES THE SOVIETS WILL EVENTUALLY COME AROUND. HE SAID THAT THE SOVIETS UNDERSTAND THEY MUST REACH AN AGREEMENT WITH PRESIDENT REAGAN, A CONSERVATIVE, IF THEY ARE TO HAVE ANY

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POSSIBILITY OF SUCCESSFUL ARMS CONTROL NEGOTIATIONS WITH A SUCCESSOR TO REAGAN WHO WILL NOT ENJOY REAGAN'S SUPPORT AMONG CONSERVATIVES.

- L. MRS. THATCHER ASKED HOW STRONGLY THE US INTENDS TO PRESS FOR GLOBAL ELIMINATION OF LRINF, OBSERVING HOW GLOBAL ZERO WOULD GREATLY FACILITATE VERIFICATION. SECRETARY SHULTZ RESPONDED THAT IN REYKJAVIK WE MUTUALLY ACCEPTED LEVELS OF LOD LRINF WARHEADS OUTSIDE OF EUROPE, BUT WE ARE STILL PUSHING HARD FOR ZERO. HE SAID THAT HE IS HOPEFUL THE SOVIETS WILL ACCEPT GLOBAL ZERO. ON SRINF GORBACHEV IN APRIL OFFERED GLOBAL ZERO AND HE EXPECTS THAT THE FORMAL SOVIET POSITION WILL EVENTUALLY REFLECT THAT.

SHE EXPRESSED HORROR THAT THE GERMANS ARE NOT INSISTING ON THE RIGHT TO MODERNIZE THE PERSHING 1-AS. ZHE ZAID THAT SHE AND CHANCELLOR KOHL WOULD HAVE PREFERRED NOT GOING TO ZERO ON INF, BUT THEY BOTH UNDERSTAND THAT WE SOLD THE ZERO CONCEPT TO OUR PUBLICS AND WE CANNOT NOW THE SECRETARY POINTED OUT THAT HE HAD TOLD BACK AWAY. THE ALLIANCE IN BRUSSELS THAT ANOTHER OPTION WOULD BE TO MATCH SOVIET SRINF DEPLOYMENTS AT SOME LEVEL BUT THAT THE RIGHT TO MATCH MUST BE ACCOMPANIED BY A WILLINGNESS TO DEPLOY. HE AND THE PRIME MINISTER AGREED THAT DEPLOYMENT OF SRINF WOULD NOT BE ACCEPTABLE TO THE EUROPEAN PUBLIC.
- PRIME MINISTER THATCHER SAID THAT SHE REMAINS
 FEARFUL OF SOVIET SALAMI TACTICS ON NUCLEAR WEAPONS AND
 IS CONCERNED OVER THE CREDIBILITY OF THE FLEXIBLE
 RESPONSE STRATEGY. SHE EXPRESSED STRONGLY THE VIEW
 THAT AN INF AGREEMENT MUST BE FOLLOWED BY AN INCREASE
 OF OTHER AMERICAN NUCLEAR WEAPONS IN EUROPE. SHE
 REFERRED TO A GREATER NUMBER OF SLBMS DEDICATED TO
 SACEUR AND THE STATIONING OF MORE F-1115 IN CONTINENTAL
 EUROPE.

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MRS. THATCHER ASSERTED THAT SOVIET TACTICS REMAIN

LO. MRS. THATCHER ASSERTED THAT SOVIET TACTICS REMAIN
TO SEPARATE THE US FROM EUROPE AND TO GET NUCLEAR
WEAPONS REMOVED FROM EUROPE. SOVIET CONVENTIONAL
WEAPONRY IS BECOMING EXTREMELY GOOD. SHE SAID SHE HAS
RECENTLY COMPLETED A REVIEW OF BRITISH CONVENTIONAL
WEAPONS, AND THEY ALL NEED TO BE UPDATED BECAUSE OF
EXTREMELY RAPID SOVIET MODERNIZATION. SHE ALSO
EXPRESSED CONCERN ABOUT SOVIET CHEMICAL WEAPON
SUPERIORITY AND THE DIFFICULTY OF VERIFYING WHETHER THE
SOVIETS WOULD BE IN COMPLIANCE WITH A BAN ON CHEMICAL
WEAPONS PRODUCTION.

11. SHE CONCLUDED HER DISCUSSION OF ARMS CONTROL AND EAST/WEST RELATIONS BY REITERATING CONCERN THAT THE SOVIET STRATEGY IS TO GET NUCLEAR WEAPONS OUT OF EUROPE AND TO UNDERMINE THE FLEXIBLE RESPONSE STRATEGY, ALL THE WHILE MODERNIZING ITS CONVENTIONAL CAPABILITIES. SHE SAID THAT A WESTERN NUCLEAR CAPABILITY IS ESSENTIAL TO DEFENSE AND WE HAVE TO BE CAREFUL NOT TO HAVE OUR NUCLEAR PRESENCE ERODED. THEREFORE'S WE NEED A CLEAR FIREBREAK BETWEEN SRINF AND ANY FURTHER NEGOTIATIONS ON SHORTER RANGE SYSTEMS. SECRETARY SHULTZ AGREED BUT UNDERSCORED THE NEED TO STAY WITH THE WORDING ON SNF WORKED OUT IN THE REYKJAVIK NAC. HE SAID THAT WE ALL UNDERSTAND THERE WILL BE NO NEGOTIATIONS ON SHE BUT WE NEEDED TO KEEP THE FORMULA WHICH THE GERMANS COULD ACCEPT. MRS. THATCHER SAID THAT THE REYKJAVIK FORMULA DID NOT CONSTITUTE AN EFFECTIVE FIREBREAK, BUT AGREED TO STICK WITH THE WORDING WORKED OUT AT THE REYKJAVIK NAC.

MRS. THATCHER THEN TURNED THE CONVERSATION TO THE MIDDLE EAST, EXPRESSING CONCERN ABOUT DEVELOPMENTS SHE REGRETTED THAT THERE HAD BEEN NO MAJOR THERE. WESTERN INITIATIVE SINCE THE CAMP DAVID ACCORDS; NOTED THAT PRESIDENT REAGAN'S 1982 SPEECH HAD BEEN SUPERB BUT HAD BEEN REJECTED BY BEGIN; CHARACTERIZED PERES AND HUSSEIN AS TWO POSITIVE FIGURES WHO ARE DOING EVERYTHING POSSIBLE TO TRY TO ADVANCE THE PEACE PROCESS AND WHO DESERVE OUR SUPPORT; AND EXPRESSED CONCERN ABOUT GROWING SOVIET EFFORTS TO INCREASE THEIR INFLUENCE AMONG THE ARAB STATES. SHE ASKED RHETORICALLY WHETHER IT WAS NOT TIMELY TO MOVE FORWARD BY PROMOTING AN INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE WHICH COULD PROVIDE A "FRAMEWORK" WITHIN WHICH THE TWO PARTIES COULD WORK AND TALK. SHE CITED THE REASONABLE AND COOPERATIVE ROLE OF THE SOVIET UNION IN THE UN ON THE IRAN/IRAQ ISSUE AS ONE HOPEFUL SIGN THAT THE SOVIETS

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MIGHT BEHAVE RESPONSIBLY IN AN INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE ON THE MIDDLE EAST.

L3. SECRETARY SHULTZ SAID HE COULD AGREE WITH
EVERYTHING THAT THE PRIME MINISTER HAD SAID BUT THAT
NEVERTHELESS IT STILL LEADS TO THE QUESTION OF HOW TO
PROCEED. HE THEN PROCEEDED TO LAY OUT HIS ANALYSIS OF
KEY FACTORS AFFECTING PROSPECTS FOR A MIDDLE EASTERN
PEACE PROCESS, WITH PARTICULAR EMPHASIS ON THE ISRAELI
SIDE OF THE EQUATION. HE SAID THE KEY IS THAT THERE
MUST BE BROAD SUPPORT WITHIN ISRAEL FOR THE PROCESS AND
FOR THE SPECIFIC IDEA OF AN INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE.
THAT BROAD SUPPORT MUST INCLUDE LIKUD SUPPORT, AT LEAST
IN PART, AS WAS THE CASE IN THE CAMP DAVID ACCORDS AND
THE SINAI SETTLEMENT. THEREFORE, THE US APPROACH IS TO
SEEK TO FIND A WAY OF GETTING SHAMIR AND LIKUD ON BOARD
IN FAVOR OF AN INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE LEADING TO
DIRECT TALKS BETWEEN ISRAEL AND THE ARABS.

THE SECRETARY SAID WE WOULD BE CONCERNED ABOUT AN APPROACH THAT WOULD SEEM TO SUPPORT PERES AGAINST SHAMIR IN A DOMESTIC ISRAELI PARTISAN OR ELECTORAL SHOWDOWN WHICH THE SECRETARY SUSPECTED THAT PERES WOULD THE SECRETARY CONTINUED THAT NOTWITHSTANDING PERES' CHARM, THE ARABS HAVE TO REALIZE THAT SHAMIR IS PRIME MINISTER AND MUST BE BROUGHT INTO THE PEACE PROCESS IF IT IS TO SUCCEED. THEREFORE THE US IS LOOKING AT A PACKAGE THAT WOULD HAVE SOMETHING IN IT FOR SHAMIR. SHAMIR NEEDS GUARANTEES THAT THE STRUCTURE OF AN INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE WILL NOT RESULT IN ISRAEL'S BEING GANGED-UP ON BY THE RUSSIANS, CHINESE AND ARABS TO RETURN TO THE 1967 BORDERS. THE SECRETARY ADDED THAT THE SOVIETS TALK ABOUT THE CONFERENCE NOT INTERFERRING WITH BILATEAL NEGOTIATIONS BUT TURN RIGHT AROUND TO INDICATE THAT THE PALESTINIAN ISSUE IS NOT BILATERAL AND THEREFORE MUST BE DEALT WITH BY THE THE SECRETARY NOTED NEVERTHELESS THAT THE CONFERENCE. SOVIETS DESPERATELY WANT TO PARTICIPATE IN AN INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE ON THE MIDDLE EAST, AND WE THUS HAVE SOME LEVERAGE.

LS. SECRETARY SHULTZ SAID THAT ANOTHER ANGLE THE US IS USING ON SHAMIR IS TO UNDERSCORE THE IMPORTANCE OF AN INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE FOR SOVIET JEWRY. IF THE SOVIETS MEET THE ISRAELI PRICE FOR A CONFERENCE EDIPLOMATIC RECOGNITION, BETTER EMIGRATION RECORD, BETTER TREATMENT OF SOVIET JEWS} WE ARE ASKING SHAMIR IF THIS ITSELF WOULD NOT JUSTIFY HIS GOING TO GENEVA

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FOR A COUPLE OF DAYS. THE SECRETARY SUMMARIZED HIS REMARKS BY UNDERSCORING OUR VIEW ON THE NEED TO REDUCE THE RISKS FOR SHAMIR, TO OFFER HIM A LEADING ROLE IN DEVEOPING AN APPROACH, AND TO DEVELOP BROAD SUPPORT FOR AN INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE WITHIN ISRAEL INCLUDING WITHIN LIKUD.

MRS. THATCHER ASKED THE SECRETARY WHETHER HE THOUGH THAT SHAMIR EVER INTENDS TO NEGOTIATE OVER THE WEST BANK OR JERUSALEM OR WHETHER IN FACT IT IS SHAMIR'S VIEW THAT ALL OF BIBLICAL ISRAEL BELONGS TO MODERN ISRAEL. IF THE LATTER, SHAMIR IS SIMPLY HOLDING THE ENTIRE WORLD RANSOM AND THERE WILL NEVER BE NEGOTIATIONS. THE SECRETARY AGREED THAT SHAMIR IS NOT PREPARED TO NEGOTIATE TERRITORY BUT IS READY TO NEGOTIATE ABOUT INTERIM ARRANGEMENTS. MRS. THATCHER CHARACTERIZED THIS POSITION BY SHAMIR AS HYPOCRITICAL BECAUSE IT DENIES BASIC RIGHTS TO THE ARABS AND REMOVES ISRAEL'S CREDIBILITY AS THE ONLY MIDDLE EAST DEMOCRACY. THE SECRETARY SAID HE HAS EMPHASIZED IN RECENT SPEECHES THE DEMOGRAPHIC CLOCK TICKING AGAINST ISRAEL IN ITS ARAB POPULATION.

THE PRIME MINISTER EXPRESSED SKEPTICISM THAT SHAMIR WOULD EVER NEGOTIATE UNLESS HE FELT HE WOULD BE LEFT BEHIND IF HE WERE UNWILLING TO MOVE. ZHE EMPHASIZED THE NEED FOR THE US TO TAKE THE LEAD AND ASKED WHETHER WE COULD NOT JOINTLY PUSH FOR AN INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE. SPECIFICALLY, SHE ASKED WHETHER IT WOULD BE POSSIBLE DURING HER VISIT HERE TO MAKE CLEAR THAT IF THE PARTIES WOULD NEGOTIATE DIRECTLY WITHIN THE FRAMEWORK OF AN INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE, WE WOULD SUPPORT THAT APPROACH. SHE HANDED THE SECRETARY A DRAFT FORMULATION OF A PUBLIC STATEMENT ON AN INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE ON THE MIDDLE EAST. THE SECRETARY INDICATED THAT HE WOULD STUDY IT TO SEE IF AGREED LANGUAGE COULD BE WORKED OUT.

THERE WAS A FINAL BRIEF DISCUSSION OF SOUTHERN THE SECRETARY COMPLIMENTED THE PRIME MINISTER ON BRITAIN'S STRATEGY OF WORKING CONSTRUCTIVELY WITH THE FRONTLINE STATES IN SOUTHERN AFRICA. MRS. THATCHER REMINDED THE SECRETARY OF THE FORTHCOMING COMMONWEALTH MEETING IN VANCOUVER IN SEPTEMBER AND EXPRESSED THE HOPE THAT THE US WOULD NOT TAKE ANY STEPS WHICH COULD MAKE DEALING WITH THE ISSUE OF SOUTH AFRICA AT THAT MEETING MORE DIFFICULT. THE SECRETARY FOR HIS PART ASKED THE PRIME MINISTER TO SPEAK OUT ON BRITISH

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
