Mr. President:

I am writing to pledge TRW's full support of your Economic Recovery Program in all its aspects.

We believe it is crucial that all Americans and all segments of our society, including the business community, recognize the need to accept some short-term sacrifices in order to achieve long-term economic recovery and growth.

We are willing to do so. Some of the budget reductions your Administration has recommended, particularly in energy and space programs, will have an adverse impact on our company. For example, in fossil-fuel research, every TRW project is significantly affected by the cuts. 

Just a short note to give you the particulars of the African trip. The plan now is for Steve Parks, Bill Ready and myself to leave here on April 27th and fly to Nairobi with a six hour layover in London. After two days in Nairobi with friends (or the new ambassador) we'll fly down to Zimbabwe for two or three days as guests of the game department and on May 4th will arrive at the Victoria Falls Hotel. I'd love to see you be able to do the whole trip but if you can't then I would suggest that you join us on the 4th at the hotel. At that point, Charles Williams of Safari South will be flying up from Maun, Botswana, to pick us up for the bird shooting part of the trip. Dear Mr. Meyer:

We have received a congressional inquiry concerning recent solicitations of funds for the purpose of redecorating the White House.

This inquiry is as follows:

"Since decontrol by the Administration, I understand that a group of non-Federal employees using facilities and office space in the Old Executive Office Building reportedly solicited a number of corporations and individuals in the energy industry for funds to redecorate the White House. Reportedly over \$250,000 was donated for this purpose from energy interests.

"These funds are provided to the White House Historical Association which, I understand, is a non-profit organization established years ago. I also understand that the Director of the National Park Service is on the Board of the Association and that another Park Service employee is the Secretary to the Association. It appears that the Association and the Park Service are very closely intertwined.

"I request that the GAO examine these matters to determine what laws apply to this solicitation activity, whether these solicitations were carried out in a manner consistent with all applicable law, and whether the persons soliciting the funding with the use of Federal facilities and supplies violated any laws."

Before we respond, we would like to have the benefit of your comments. In order that we will be able to consider them, please provide any comments by May 1. If there are any further questions concerning this matter please contact Richard Parsons (275-5544).

This is written as a follow-up to our recent telephone conversation regarding your attempts to obtain certain Selective Service documents which would warrant the reconsideration of your application for the correction of your military records.

Dispenza, Deputy Executive Secretary, AFBCMR on 20 September 1978 that the AFBCMR is not aware of or in receipt of *classification* any 1943 Ford Company Illinois Selective Service File which you claim establishes your affiliation with the Army Reserve. I again advise you that even if such a file were found, it would not necessarily establish Reserve status. To count the period 3 July 1943 to 2 April 1952 as satisfactory years of federal service, Reserve status must first be established. Then, with respect to the period 1 July 1949 to 2 April 1952, it would be necessary to establish that you earned 50 retirement points (that is, 35 points beyond the 15 given for Reserve membership alone), for the years ending 30 June 1950 and 1951, and a proportionate number of points for the period 1 July 1949 - 2 April 1952. *DoD - Navy Policy - Grants years of service from date of discharge to 1 July '49 for retirement purposes. In any case additional years - enough*

You indicate that you made a promise to the Army that you would keep secret *for pension* your duties during the period in question. Mr. Plant advises that he has *with back* informed you that the Army would have no grounds upon which to hold you to any "promise", or to object to your "release". TRUE. *20 years total.*

I again advise you that the AFBCMR may reconsider an application upon the submission of newly discovered relevant evidence which clearly demonstrates the existence of error or injustice. If you have any substantive evidence in your possession in the form of a copy of an Army order which shows that you were transferred to the Army Reserve in 1943, you should forward it to the Board for consideration. However, in the absence of such evidence, a further review of your application is not possible.

The rationale provided in the Air Staff advisory and the numerous letters from applicant and associates are noted.

Applicant's claim that Army Reserve Orders (classified secret) were issued by the Adjutant General's Office in 1943 transferring him to the Army Reserve for the purposes of a special assignment during the period from 4 July 1943 to 3 April 1952 is not convincing. His records contain no evidence of any such orders ever being published nor is there any documentation available which relates to his ever being transferred to the Army Reserve or possessing a status in the Army Reserve during the period in question. No substantive evidence has been submitted to show that an error or injustice exists in this case. His request to show he was credited with AUS reserve service during the period claimed is denied.

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THE BOARD DETERMINES THAT:

The applicant be notified that insufficient relevant evidence has been presented to demonstrate the existence of probable material error or injustice; that his application was denied without a hearing; and that he is privileged to submit newly discovered relevant evidence for consideration.
