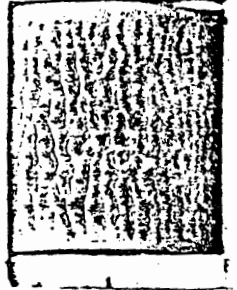

Thank you for your recent message. It was good of you to take the time to bring your views to my attention.

This Administration is deeply concerned about the situation in the Middle East. Profound changes have occurred in this region over the past several years. Since 1978, the world has witnessed the upheaval in Iran, the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan, and the spread of Soviet influence to the Horn of Africa and the southern periphery of the Arabian Peninsula. Most recently, the Middle East has been marred by the outbreak of hostilities along the border of Lebanon. Let me assure you that the policy of this Administration is to restore peace and stability to the entire region. With regard to the conflict between Israel and its neighbors, we seek a resolution which is just and fair to all the concerned parties.

You will be happy to know that many of your suggestions for tax reform were included in the Administration's tax-cut bill which was recently approved by Congress. I have enclosed a copy of the President's televised address on his tax-cut plans which I believe you will enjoy reading.

Finally, I am grateful for your comments and proposals concerning defense policy. You can be sure that they will receive serious consideration by this Administration.

Thank you for your memo, dated July 17, 1981, with respect to Presidential Delegations.

Joe Canzeri will be responsible and the main contact for the White House.

I agree with your memo, but hope that you and Joe can get together to re-define the fine points; and also establish a procedure for the type of delegation that can be handled on short notice.

I have spoken with Joe about the above and he is looking forward to hearing from you at your convenience.

It would be also helpful when the State Department notifies Jerry Bremmer and Dick Allen, that Joe Canzeri be notified.

With respect to Item 2, doesn't the Secretary of State's Office provide for a White House Liaison, and if so, wouldn't the better procedure be for Joe to work with that person who would in turn coordinate with the desk officers and other officials in the State Department?

With regard to spouses, this may be better handled on a delegation by delegation basis.

SUBJECT : Handling of Presidential Delegations

I believe it would be most helpful to everyone if a procedure for planning Delegations could be developed. ✓

It appears that the least amount of confusion would occur if one person at the White House could be designated to not only liaison with the State Department but also coordinate the composition of the delegation with the various offices at the White House.

I would appreciate your thoughts on the following procedure.

1. The State Department (via the Bremer/Allen channel) will notify the White House of an upcoming Delegation and make recommendations to the White House as to whether or not the President should be represented. *OK*
2. Once it is decided that a Delegation should represent the President, the designated person at the White House should start working with the State Department Desk Officer from the country to be visited to determine appropriate representatives for the President as well as who should head the delegation. *OK*

3. Once the White House has decided who they would like to ask to represent the President, the coordinator at the White House should personally call these people and invite them on behalf of the President to represent him. *OK*

4. Once a potential delegate has agreed to go, the coordinator at the White House should then call the Protocol Officer assigned to the delegation and tell him/her who has agreed to go on the delegation and advise how the delegate can be reached. The Protocol Officer would then liaison with the delegate to make all logistical arrangements.

In the past, spouses have been kept to a minimum with only the Head of the Delegation having his/her spouse accompany. You may want to continue this practice to allow more space for people the White House is particularly interested in involving in this type of an event.

I am, of course, available for any further discussion on this subject.


