Dear Mr. Self:

I have received your letter and want you to know how much I appreciate hearing from you.

One of the primary goals of the President's Program for Economic Recovery is to stimulate the creation of new jobs in the private sector, by means of a careful coordination of tax and regulatory relief. I certainly enjoyed having the chance to chat with you at the dinner honoring the President of Venezuela last Tuesday night.



I was told by Ron Fox to send you information on MADD. I am enclosing a great deal of information on our organization so you may become familiar with what we stand for.

I would also like to clear up a misunderstanding regarding the purpose of the Blue Ribbon Commission panel. This commission would be established to set up national guidelines on the drunk-driving problem, and would not interfere with states' rights. These guidelines would be legislative, administrative and judicial. The states would be encouraged to implement these guidelines; and, very importantly, the federal government would show an active interest in seeking solutions to this national epidemic. ↙

There was a great concern by the White House on the murders of the black children in Atlanta, as well there should be, and an allocation of \$1 million to help solve this crime. Today 70 people will die in alcohol-related crashes, and I would like to see some concern from the White House.

I have been trying to see the president on this issue for some time, without success. I would like to see Mr. Deaver, if possible, since I understand he is very close to the president. I feel this is a problem that requires immediate attention, and I would appreciate any assistance you may give to me, our organization and our cause.

Scandal? What Scandal?

WHAT IS ONE NEWSPAPER'S meat is another newspaper's poison. There's just no telling what you may find on any day on some paper's front page. Allowing for this wide disparity, it was still quite a jolt to read a headline the other day in the New York Times that read: *U.S. Issues 3 Leases for Oil Exploration in Wilderness Area.*



As it is illegal to build so much as a one-lane dirt road in a wilderness area, it looked as if the Times had really bagged itself a mighty national scandal. Everything that had been said about Interior Secretary James Watt had now been confirmed. It would be high time for President Reagan to give him the immediate heave-ho.

Closer reading of the front-page story — and its 14-inch jump to an inside page — would indicate that instead of a hot exclusive, the Times might not have had much of a story at all. At any rate, it had been available on the wires and was quite thoroughly ignored by other papers.

★ ★ ★

AS THE TIMES finally told it, three leases had been issued for 9000 acres near the Capitan Wilderness. This is near Roswell, New Mexico, which is not very near anything. Of those 9000 acres, 700 are *under* the Capitan Wilderness.

From their leasehold, the oil companies could slant-drill into the wilderness. But neither squirrel nor backpacker would ever be cognizant

of what might be going on under their feet. No derricks would go up.

Slant-drilling under 700 acres is not quite an environmental calamity. Even drilling on top of that acreage, while illegal, is hardly sacrilegious. The land involved is only 4/10,000th of a single percent of the entire area that has been declared wilderness. And that ain't much.

There was nothing venal in what the Times did. Working journalists everywhere will sympathize with our only national daily newspaper of general circulation. You can be sure the editors will hear about that wilderness story.

★ ★ ★

STOCKHOLDERS IN oil companies will be indignant at the Times for unnecessarily stirring up the Sierra Club and the Wilderness Society, who always operate at a near boil. That certainly was not the paper's intention.

It's just that journalists are romantic folk who, although limited by the strictures of the facts, strain mightily to make the most of what is at hand. The absconding tycoon often turns out to be a worried businessman with a large mortgage on his house and a larger debt at the bank. The sexy blond in trouble is, often as not, badly in need of a strong rinse and the help of a plastic surgeon.

And whatever the striving editor prints — the rape of the land or the trials of the blond, he goes off to a dinner party only to hear his partner on his right ask: "Why do you print all that junk?" His only certain solace is in strong, steady circulation figures.
