

Ex-Assemblyman hits the 'big time' on county board

More than 12 months have passed since Michael D. Antonovich defeated two-termer Paxter Ward as Los Angeles County supervisor for the sprawling 5th District.

Yet Antonovich sull describes his job in terms one normally would associate with a challenger, rather than an incumbent who shares the reins of power with four other members of the Board of Supervisors.

Antonovich is no stranger to government. He was a member of the state Assembly. He sought the Republican nomination for lieutenint governor in 1973, but was defeated by Michael Curb.

That experience, it would seem, should have prepared Antonovich for a new job that in many instances involves carrying out state mandates in health, welfare and administration of the justice system.

But Antonovich, 41, a former schoolteacher, said the transition from state government to county government was the equivalent of passing from kindergarten to medical school.

"The responsibilities and the demands are much greater on the Board of Supervisors level on the individual. I found the bureauerncy easier to deal with on the state level," Antonovich said recently, in an interview after nearly a year in office.

His district covers Glendale, Become the Santa Clareta Valley, the Let Virgines when and the sent the San Fernando Valley.

County officials, he said, have "a lot of resistance to change that runs counter to things as they have been in the past."

"On the county level," Antonovich said, "I find a great deal of frustration in dealing with the bursauccaey... as if the bureaucracy runs on its own agenda instead of following the policy of the poard."

When asked why this is so, Antonovich eved the growth of the county and the expectations of officials who are accustomed to getting what they wanted without having their programs

Antonovich cited a cockroach infestation in Tujunga this summer as an example of his frustration with county officialdom.

Neighbors, he said, "complained that a residence which was dilapidated had approximately one million cockroaches, which was a serious health problem. The response by the bureaucracy was, "We'll wait 30 days, and we'll get out there and we will condemn it."

The supervisor said the taxpayers "are paying for a health department to respond to emergencies. When cockroaches began to infest the neighborhood and nothing was being done, there was a great outcry."

The board, on a motion by Antonomich, asked Chief Administrative Collies of tary 1. Indicard to have to examine additions on how to examine the problems. Antonomich added that the board "wanted the people who were responsible to be reprimanded. This was a major foul-up effecting the health of the community."

A report was made, but Antonovich charged that its theme was "business as usual, as if the board was not serious in wanting to know where the foul-up was."

Eventually. Antonovich said, the super a sers changed county procedures so health officials "would be able to respond effectively the next ume."

(Hufford blamed the foulars

of Los Angeles.)

The criticism of county officials by Autonovich as well as warnings by chairman/elect Schabarian has led to speculation that there may be some shake-upa within at least a few of the more than 50 county departments. On this score Antonovich said:

"I would say that the department heads must perform as they would in the private sector—that the county is no haven for incompetency. This should be true from the department head all the way down to the lowest person on the employment roll."

The county, he continued, must make greater use of contracting and civil service reforms to cut the cost of government and to reduce the size of the county's payrold.

"Due to the liberal dominance on the previous board," Antomyvich said, "those two reforms were never truly implemented."

But he noted that the supervisors this year approved of theses in personnel rules that look away many of the Civil Service Commission's policymaking powers. He added that "the issue within the mant two or three years is not, 'Are we going to contract, as it was with the pravious board, but what we are going to contract.' We are going to contract. It will be on competitive bidding, which I think is going to reduce some of the cost and in turn improve the quality of pervice."

When asked what no trinks he has accomplished.
