Beveridge & Diamond

Beveridge & Diamond is a full service general practice firm. It was founded by Bill Ruckelshaus and others in 1974. Mr. Ruckelshaus withdrew to join Weyerhaeuser in June of 1976.

Today the firm has 12 partners, 10 associates, 1 lawyer "of counsel" and serves national and international clientele. The practice is oriented toward the federal government, involving both federal regulatory matters and litigation.

Beveridge & Diamond is probably best known for its work in the environmental area, primarily regulatory and litigation matters. The firm represents a number of companies, industries, trade associations, and state and municipal agencies affected by regulations promulgated by the EPA under the Clean Air Act, the Clean Water Act, the Toxic Substances Control Act, and Resource Conservation and Recovery Act, the Superfund Legislation, the Noise Act, and the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act. The firm also handles cases under the National Environmental Policy Act and under state environmental statutes.

Energy law is another important area of the practice. The firm represents utility and industrial clients and proceedings involving the pricing and allocation of fuels and the development of federal and state policy for fuels, such as synfuels. It also handles proceedings involving a number of other agencies, including the Food and Drug Administration, Consumer Product Safety Commission, Occupational Safety and Health Administration, and the Departments of Commerce, State, Treasury, Transportation, Housing and Urban Development.

Another major aspect of the practice is general litigation. Litigation ranging from breach of contract, including government contracts, to security and antitrust matters. The majority of the cases are in federal courts, but opportunities to try cases in local courts arise. The firm does general corporate work and advises clients in international trade, banking, securities, tax, antitrust and corporate organization matters.

Some of the firm's experience is as follows:

LEGISLATIVE. Various members of the firm have acted or are currently acting as registered lobbyists for trade associations or domestic and foreign corporations. Substantive areas of this legislative work include energy and environmental policy and funding, and international banking. The legislative work has consisted of effecting passage of or opposition of a legislation through drafting or presenting testimony to legislative

committees and subcommittees, drafting proposed legislation, and working with Senators and members of Congress and their staffs.

ANTITRUST/TRADE REGULATION. The firm is counsel to individual companies, trade associations, representatives of a company in the Department of Justice investigation, and has defended several alleged concerted refusal to deal/price fixing actions. Counselling has included (1) compliance with Hart Scott Rodino premerger notification rules, (2) delineation of matters that can appropriately be discussed at trade association meetings, (3) assessment of possible antitrust violations on behalf of injured competitors, and (4) review of proposed contracts for possible antitrust problems. Both the private treble damage antitrust actions and the Department of Justice investigation the firm defended involved allegations concerning industry trade associations to which clients belonged. The firm has litigated a number of antitrust cases involving price fixing, group boycotting, and territorial arrangements.

OSHA. The firm serves as OSHA general counsel to a NYSE company and the firm is counsel to a number of other companies on OSHA matters. The work has included following regulatory developments at OSHA, participation rulemaking, and counselling concerning compliance with OSHA regulations and OSHA inspections.

TAX/WAGE PRICE. The tax practice of the firm has included advice to individuals, corporations, and other organizations regarding (1) tax issues arising from legislative or regulatory initiatives, (2) establishment and operation of charitable or other tax exempt organizations, such as industry research groups and political organizations, (3) tax consequences of acquisitions and dispositions of corporate stocks and assets, (4) tax planning for international ventures, (5) exchange of like kind property, and (6) deductibility of expenditure. Albert Beveridge's experience includes three years with the tax department of the Department of Justice, teaching two taxation courses as an adjunct professor at John Sherman Myers Law School of the American University. Mr. Beveridge has also represented trade associations, particularly with regard to taxation of unrelated business income, and wage price controls. A number of partners and associates have worked with Mr. Beveridge on tax matters for the firm.

CORPORATE. The corporate work has included acting as general counsel to an AMEX corporation, and providing advice to corporate clients regarding securities regulations (including preparation of registration and statements of periodic reports); acquisition and disposition of businesses, the Foreign Practices Act, and mergers and liquidations.

INTERNATIONAL TRADE. Under the direction of Harold Himmelman, the firm has been increasingly involved in trade matters and litigation. The firm has represented domestic and foreign companies in the antidumping procedures at the U.S. Treasury Department and an injury proceeding at the International Trade Commission, and has provided advice regarding a broad range of international trade issues. The firm has had experience with general activities in the administration of the antidumping laws and the laws designed to prevent market disruption because of trade and state controlled economies. The work of the firm has included ongoing representation of the clients to insure compliance with the trade laws and investigations to determine whether violations of the trade laws have occurred. At least two of the lawyers in the firm have worked closely with Mr. Himmelman on these trade matters and are experienced in the field.

MEMORANDUM FOR MARSHALL COLEMAN

Partial Summary of Contracts Litigation Experience
of Beveridge & Diamond Partners*

1. Federal court litigation: civil litigation, involving matters such as breach of warranty, breach of contract, interference with contractual relations, misrepresentation and negligence. The following is a short synopsis of some of these cases:

a. Products liability litigation for major U.S. manufacturer with respect to problems experienced with heavy turbine generators. Allegations have included loss of utility profits due to breach of warranty, breach of contract, negligence and misrepresentation by the manufacturer. (CHB)

b. Products liability and breach of contract litigation for a U.S. conglomerate subsidiary of a large British company. (CHB)

c. Representation of a large U.S. municipality in a case involving allegations of design and construction negligence, breach of contract, breach of warranty, misrepresentation and strict liability in connection with the design and construction of a large wastewater treatment plant. d. Commercial breach of contract and breach of warranty litigation for a major computer builder headquartered in Dallas, Texas. (CHB)

2. Administrative litigation: prosecution of claims of and defense against claims of defense contractors with respect to requests for price and schedule adjustments on major weapons contracts and maintenance and supply contracts, and requests to convert default terminations into convenience terminations.

a. Prosecution of an action brought against the Navy with respect to responsibility for cost overruns on the development contract for the Mark 48 torpedo. (CHB)

* Carl Eardley, who is "of counsel" to the firm, has prosecuted and defended many contractual actions for the Government as a trial attorney and as the Deputy Assistant Attorney General for the Civil Division, and has litigated and supervised contract cases while at Beveridge & Diamond. This partial summary does not include the cases Mr. Eardly has handled.

b. Prosecution of an action against the Navy for a price increase and a delivery schedule extension for the design and development contract for the Mark 27 target torpedo. (SWB)

c. Defense of an action brought by a large shipyard with respect to cost overruns on the construction of a nuclear submarine test facility. (CHB, SWB, AEM)

d. Defense of an action brought by a large supplier of nuclear components for damages and for conversion of a termination for default into one for the convenience of the buyer with respect to a manufacturing contract for a closure head for a demonstration light water breeder reactor. (SWB)

e. Prosecuting claims against the Air Force for price increases and schedule extensions for design and production contracts for hangars, shelters and containers for the Bare Base Support Program. (SWB)

f. Prosecution of an action against the Marine Corps to convert a default termination into a termination for the convenience of the Government and to set aside an assessment of excess procurement costs with respect to a contract for VHF diplexers. (SWB)

g. Miscellaneous government contract cases brought against the government or other defense contractors. (CHB, SWB, AEM)




Accelerate the tax cut. Cut federal spending. And, for now at least, ignore the deficit.

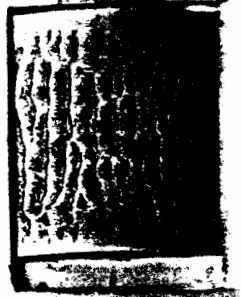

There is also a sense of Reaganian personal insecurity in some decisions.

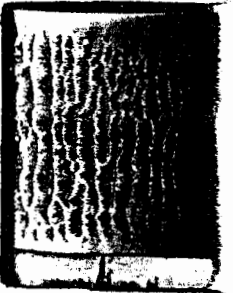
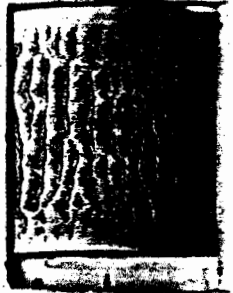
