Beveridge & Diamond

Beveridge & Diamond is a full service general practice firm. It was founded by Bill Ruckelshaus and others in 1974. Mr. Ruckelshaus withdrew to join Weyerhaeuser in June of 1976.

Today the firm has 12 partners, 10 associates, 1 lawyer "of counsel" and serves national and international clientele. The practice is oriented toward the federal government, involving both federal regulatory matters and litigation.

Beveridge & Diamond is probably best known for its work in the environmental area, primarily regulatory and litigation matters. The firm represents a number of companies, industries, trade associations, and state and municipal agencies affected by regulations promulgated by the EPA under the Clean Air Act, the Clean Water Act, the Toxic Substances Control Act, and Resource Conservation and Recovery Act, the Superfund Legislation, the Noise Act, and the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act. The firm also handles cases under the National Environmental Policy Act and under state environmental statutes.


