I respectfully urge you to support, and to work for, the abolition of affirmative action.

DEAR MR DEEVER
WE SINCERELY AND URGENTLY REQUEST THAT NO ACTION BE TAKEN TO INCREASE THE EXCISE TAX ON LIQUOR. OUR INDUSTRY IS ALREADY THE MOST HEAVILY TAXED IN OUR NATION. NO OTHER PRODUCT HAS 47 PERCENT OF ITS RETAIL PRICE MADE UP OF TAXES 26 PERCENT OF WHICH IS FEDERAL. 100 MILLION CONSUMERS OBVIOUSLY INCLUDE LOWER AND MIDDLE INCOME CLASSES STATE REVENUES WOULD ALSO SUFFER. 

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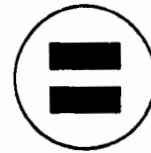

Dear Mr. Deaver:

The National Urban League recently released our annual State of Black America report, an assessment of the overall status of blacks in these United States. Its findings were not heart-warming.

In releasing the report, NUL President John E. Jacob said: "Never in that time (since the report was first issued in 1976) has the state of Black America been more vulnerable. Never in that time have black economic rights been under such powerful attack. Never in that time have so many black people been so alienated from their government."

Reasons for Mr. Jacob's deep concern are examined in the eight major papers that compose State of Black America 1982. Because of the document's significance, I am enclosing a copy of the report for your consideration. If anyone can impact upon the course of the precipitous path we are traveling, it is you--our decision- and policymakers.

Dear Sir:

For the past four years, I have been functioning as a senior aide, involved in home care for the elderly, homebound person, under the Oakland, Livingston County Human Services Agency.

I am 73 yrs old, a retired registered nurse, not able to work in a full time capacity. The 20 hr. week program allows me to supplement my income, & do work related to my skills. I make an average of 10 calls a week to my patients' homes, ranging from 92 yr old blind, arthritic, cardiac, & diabetic etc. I give them personal care, prepare a meal, walk & visit with them. I know my visits are emotionally & physically valuable to them, and they are able to be at home (alone) longer. If this program is cut, they will be in nursing homes much sooner & much more expensive. Thank you - Martha R. Preene.

One of the most fundamental concepts upon which our income tax laws are based is that the percentage of gross income which is withheld from the wage earner should be proportional to the amount of income which the individual earns for a given year. Dear Mr. Deaver:

We appreciate your decision to stop the I.R.S. from making its own rules in regard to removing tax exemption in cases such as Bob Jones University.

However, we are shocked that you could propose legislation that infringes upon religious beliefs contrary to the constitution.

Religious freedom is allowed in most countries when the definition is used that interprets religious freedom to mean the right to believe only what you are allowed to believe.

Regardless of our approval or disapproval of interracial dating, action taken against groups and institutions that believe this way is restricting their religious freedom. There are laws that permit divorce and remarriage. However, many churches, pastors and institutions refuse to accept it because of religious conviction. Wouldn't this be discrimination also?

The premise that granting a tax deduction to such institutions as Bob Jones University is in effect giving "a government subsidy" against integration, implies that tax exemption then is a government subsidy. Would not this violate the first amendment? When do all churches and religious institutions pay property taxes as well as income tax? How can any contribution be allowed as a tax deduction?

We can only trust that this legislation be recalled or that safeguards for religious freedom be added to preserve the rights granted to us in the first amendment.

Dear Mr. Deaver:

We are writing this letter as members of the Livingston County Older Workers Programs, a coalition of concerned agencies working for the betterment of employment opportunities for residents of our county who are over fifty-five years of ages.

We are asking that the proposed phaseout of Title V Employment programs as recommended by the Dept. of Labor and the Office of Management & Budget be axed. Of special concern to us is the employment program Senior Aides which would be eliminated with the drying up of these funds.

We have learned in our experience working with older workers that their employment situation is invaluable to them in many ways. It is obviously, beneficial to them financially, but, more important than that it also benefits them psychologically in developing their own feeling of self-worth and esteem.

Also of great importance are the inestimable benefits to those who work with Senior Aides experience, such as the value of Seniors wisdom, conscientiousness and dependability.

Without this work experience many seniors would find it impossible to even meet their daily needs of food/shelter/clothing that the meager welfare or Social Security benefits cannot provide. Additionally, many proud self-supporting seniors would be reduced to relying solely on welfare benefits to provide those needs, causing an additional burden on that strained resource and diminish that fragile pride.

We cannot justify omitting training programs that can provide job training opportunity to work in needed tasks and financial assistance as well, to a so neglected part of our society.

We trust your support will follow in this matter.

I'm delighted to provide you with the enclosed report to the President, which briefly describes the extraordinary achievements of our first year in office.


