
I found your name in one of the many magazines I read along with a couple of other prominent people who are close to the President, and probably would not get as much mail as he.

Federal spendthrifts have pumped \$1.2 million in tax funds into the silver-lined coffers of a super-rich oil firm!

An Ashland Oil Co. subsidiary was given the stupendous sum to build elaborate, permanent buildings for a synthetic fuels project that's supposed to last only two years.

Conveniently, the facility is next door to an Ashland refinery — and can be claimed by the oil company, at no cost, when the project is completed.

"The Department of Energy's (DOE) requirement was for the design of 'prefabricated buildings with little or no embellishment,'" reported DOE Deputy Inspector General Thomas S. Williamson Jr.

"But the Ashland subsidiary has constructed permanent buildings, installed expensive utilities and changed transportation facilities — apparently to facilitate future expansion of a nearby . . . refinery."

Williamson pointed out that several of the buildings constructed at taxpayer expense were "built to last 40 years.

"Hundreds of thousands of dollars could have been saved if the Ashland subsidiary had adhered to contract specifications and DOE recommendations."

James Butler, a spokesman for the Ashland subsidiary, claimed the DOE

actually "approved our plans to build that type of building. This shouldn't be any surprise to them."

Not so, responded William Baptiste of the Inspector General's office.

"It's debatable whether anyone in DOE approved it," he declared. "They did send some plans in here — but the program manager, due to other workload requirements, didn't get around to looking at them until construction was well underway — and it was too late to change what was going on.

"The thing that's important is that a facility I considered in excess of our needs was built down there."

And an angry Rep. Ron Paul (R.-Tex.) thundered: "The entire synthetic fuel program is nothing but corporate welfare — and a waste of the taxpayers' money. This is a perfect example."

Scandal of Military Misfits

The military is squandering a mind-boggling \$27.3 million each year by dragging its feet in dismissing misfits from the service, say Congressional investigators.

"Once a guy is identified as a troublemaker and the service doesn't want him any longer, it ought to process him out faster," said Al Huntington, of the government's General Accounting Office.

He said it takes 22 days in the Army, 33 days in the Air Force, and 54

in the Navy to discharge a misfit.

"But all the time, the guy is drawing full pay and allowances until he's officially discharged. The time the services are taking is too long.

"Often processing is delayed by administrative matters such as waiting for a discharge physical or waiting for a commander to process a piece of paper."

The Armed Forces discharged more than 75,000 persons in 1979 — the latest figures available — for being unsuitable to the service.

Shocking Tabs of Former Presidents — And YOU Pay

Even though America's voters kicked Jimmy Carter out of the White House, taxpayers will be picking up big tabs for the ex-President's expenses for years to come.

And if Carter follows the stick-it-to-taxpayers style of former Presidents Richard Nixon and Gerald Ford, we'll be paying for everything from car washes to picture framing.

Under a 1958 act providing special privileges for ex-Presidents, Nixon has stuck taxpayers with such outrageous bills as:

- \$2,476 for photo processing in 1978 and 1979.
- \$214 for car washes over two years.
- \$425 for reupholstering an armchair and ottoman.

And Ford has hit taxpayers with these bills, among others:

- \$47 a month for cleaning his pool over an 18-month period.
- \$889 for a silver coffee service and \$153 for cups, saucers and glasses.
- \$1,744 for 53 wooden picture frames.
- \$2,242 for plants, plus some hefty bills for their care.

- \$1,295 for newspapers and periodicals in 1979.

Besides all these generous benefits, Carter — like Nixon and Ford — also will get an annual pension of \$69,630 a year plus \$150,000 a year for staff salaries (after 30 months, this latter amount drops to \$96,000).

It all adds up to a lot of money.

The incumbent President's salary and expenses total only \$250,000 annually — but in 1980 Nixon cost taxpayers a total of \$324,000 while Ford cost \$400,000.

"This is yet another appalling example of one set of rules for the politicians and another for the people," blasts James Davidson, chairman of The National Taxpayers Union.

"We won't deny that a former President should be maintained by the country he has served, but surely a lot of the expenses they claim could easily come out of their generous pension."

AMERICA'S BIGGEST TAX CHEAT

Louis Ostrer is the biggest income tax cheat in America's history — he ripped off Uncle Sam for millions while living like a king.

For years he thumbed his nose at the IRS and used his huge income to finance a lavish jet-set life-style.

Between 1965 and 1975 Ostrer piled up a debt to the government of a whopping \$6.8 million in taxes, interest and penalties. But he paid a mere \$800.

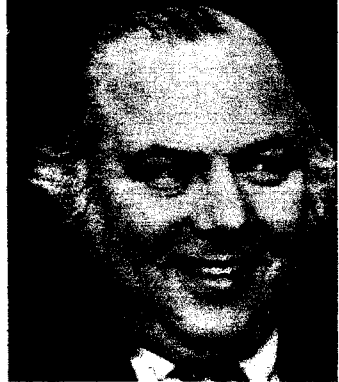
Now he is behind bars after being given a 20-year sentence for tax evasion.

Before Ostrer, 58, was finally nabbed, he lived a life of luxurious self-indulgence, according to federal sources.

On a typical day the king of tax cheats would leave his \$600,000 Long Island mansion and hop into his chauffeured Cadillac limousine for a leisurely drive to his Manhattan insurance consultant firm.

There he'd write himself a

check for \$150,000. Later, during a break from work, he'd cash it and wander around town spending thousands of dollars on his expensive hobbies — which included collecting old coins, rare stamps and antique clocks.

If the urge struck him, he'd visit his thoroughbred horse

farm in upstate New York, jet to Las Vegas to gamble heavily or fly to Miami where he owned a condominium at the exclusive Jockey Club.

He wore expensive tailor-made suits and flashy rings, and sent his three children to prestigious colleges — including, ironically, Columbia Law School.

Ostrer gained his wealth through insurance swindles and embezzlement of \$1.2 million from union welfare and pension funds, according to authorities.

"This white-collar defendant has for years supervised a veritable industry of fraud and deceit to accomplish repeated tax evasions, embezzlements and other swindles," said Asst. U.S. Attorney Philip Douglas, who prosecuted Ostrer.

Ostrer had a strange way of not paying his taxes. Each year between 1965-75 he faithfully filed returns and showed he owed a hefty amount of taxes — which totaled more than \$2 million over the 10-year period. But Ostrer simply didn't pay.

He even agreed with the IRS that he owed another \$2

million in back taxes not figured on his annual forms. But he didn't pay that, either. Interest and penalties added another \$2.8 million.

When the IRS tried to seize Ostrer's assets to settle the tax bill, agents found that everything he owned was in someone else's name. He had cleverly hidden his money in dummy corporations headed by associates and relatives.

"He was laughing at the

law while living like a king — until the law caught up with him," said an IRS spokesman.

"It's the largest evasion of payment case because the guy filed a tax return but never paid."

Ostrer declined to comment on the case.

Although the IRS got its man, it still hasn't collected the \$6.8 million he owes.

Your \$\$ Go-Go in Topless Joints

Taxpayers are being ripped off again by good Time Charlie bureaucrats who are spending government money at low rates for such worthy projects as topless go-go joints and massage parlors.

Money intended to develop manufacturing in

poor areas is also being used to finance such projects as a plush \$1.5 million country club, a luxurious \$1.4 million bowling alley and an \$8.5 million Daytona-type speedway.

"It's scandalous!" fumed Rep. Sam Gibbons (D.-Fla.), former chairman of the House Ways and Means Oversight Sub-Committee. "This shocking abuse is a prostitution of the government's intent."

The money comes from the Industrial Development Bond (IDB) program, which uses revenues from tax-free bonds to provide low-interest loans to developers and businesses.

Although intended to help struggling areas, many loans are being approved without regard for the nature of the business.

In Philadelphia a convicted pornographer with ties to organized crime got a \$400,000 loan to open a topless go-go bar — one month after he was found guilty in federal court on 27 obscenity charges!

\$Thousands Spent to Man Bridge That Never Opens

Taxpayers are being socked with a \$130,000 annual bill to pay for around-the-clock manning of a Washington, D.C., drawbridge that hasn't opened since last summer.

Not a single ship passing under the South Capitol Street Bridge has been tall enough to require it to open ever since a Navy training school for divers moved from the Washington Navy Yard to Florida last July.

100G Wasted on Dictionary Of Language No One Speaks

The National Science Foundation (NSF) has squandered nearly \$100,000 of your tax money to compile a dictionary of the long-dead Aztec language — which is spoken by nobody in the U.S. except a few scholars.

And the money was spent even though two Aztec dictionaries already exist.

Rep. Tom Hagedorn (R.-Minn.) has found a word in his own dictionary to describe the expenditure: "Shocking."

Fumed Rep. Hagedorn: "We've got to make this kind of government waste as obsolete as the Aztec civilization."

NSF gave \$76,157 in 1978 to university researchers compiling the dictionary. Last year the agency handed them another \$20,455 to make it "more comprehensive" — bringing the book's cost to \$96,612.

The grants were made, NSF explains, because the two earlier dictionaries — compiled in the 16th and 19th centuries — were lacking in "crucial" information on certain vowels and consonants.

Bridge That Never Opens

Taxpayers are being socked with a \$130,000 annual bill to pay for around-the-clock manning of a Washington, D.C., drawbridge that hasn't opened since last summer.

Did Govt. Pay Bills 2 or 3 Times in \$566 Million Snafu?

Because of an incredibly fouled-up bookkeeping system, a large federal defense supply center can't account for a mind-boggling \$566 million in payments to contractors.

In fact, it may have paid some bills more than once.

What's even more shocking, charges a

scathing report from the government's General Accounting Office (GAO), officials in charge didn't report the financial fiasco. Instead, they tried to cover it up by simply wiping out the discrepancies — a possible criminal act.

When the GAO probed Philadelphia's Defense Personnel Support Center (DPSC) — which purchases \$2 billion

worth of supplies for the armed services yearly — one investigator said it was "probably the worst mess we've ever come across."

The GAO found that the bookkeeping was so bad investigators couldn't determine if too much, too little or no money at all had been paid in 4,500 cases.

"It could have happened that the DPSC was paying the same bills two or three times," said GAO prober Anthony Pinto.

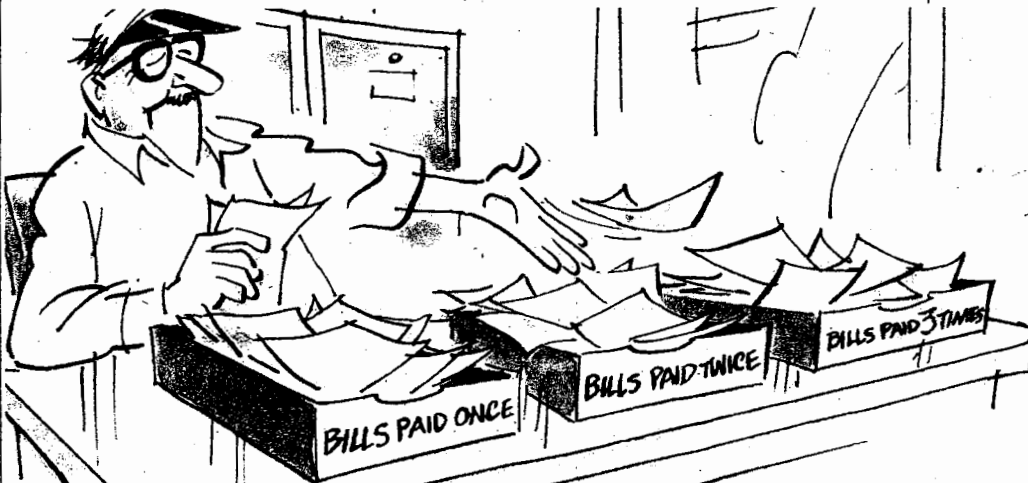
Yet DPSC officials tried to hide the whopping mess.

"Accounts were certified as correct by officials at the center ... despite their knowledge of the center's financial problems," said the GAO report. "These certifications may have violated the law."

U.S. Rep. Ron Paul (R.-Tex.) said:

"The administrators responsible for this disgrace should be held personally liable for the loss."

Nearly two months ago we requested a meeting with the President on behalf of 42 Congressmen.




Inexplicably, not only have we not been able to get a meeting scheduled, we have not even been able to get telephone calls returned by your offices.

The suggested reply is attached per your request.

Two meetings with agricultural groups are tentatively on the President's schedule: (1) March 18, 1982, to sign an Agriculture Day Proclamation and (2) March 22, 1982, to participate in a White House briefing for agricultural editors. We need to be sure that these events are preceded by a substantive meeting with appropriate Congressional agricultural leaders. A Schedule Proposal to that effect is pending, which I mentioned to you earlier today.
