

Unfortunately, I could not get this ready in time for your 10 AM meeting Friday morning with Joe.

Enclosed is a copy of the position statement which the U. S. Cane Sugar Refiners' Association got up last Thursday.

Along with quotas, the Department of Agriculture is recommending target prices of approximately \$21 per cwt. which is approximately \$3 per cwt. above present levels for raw sugar and can expect a similar rise in the refined sugar and high fructose corn syrup.

I hope that your company has a pipeline into the White House because the decision on this is imminent. If you could use your cousin to put a copy of this paper in Reagan's hands, you would be the people's hero.

Dear Mr. Secretary:

After speaking by phone to Washington, we were advised to follow up with a letter, inviting you to participate in an "Institute on War and Conscience" which the University of Santa Clara is sponsoring from September to December 1982.

The University of Santa Clara, the oldest institution of higher learning west of the Mississippi, is a Jesuit and Catholic private university. Our student body numbers over 7,000, many of whom will obtain employment in the various engineering and service sectors of the "Silicon Valley" in which we are located.

The Institute will involve serious academic and university-wide reflection on the issues of politics, warfare, morality, and the formation of the informed conscience. It will consist of a number of concurrent university courses which will approach these topics from a variety of disciplines: theology, literature, philosophy, history, political science, the social sciences, engineering and biology.


We plan to supplement the courses by giving the student body and the wider community the chance to hear from a number of people connected with our government, those who are intimately involved in major decision-making. The Institute would be greatly enhanced if you could speak on American policies, hopes, and fears in this nuclear age.

I am inviting you, therefore, to address the Institute on the evening of Monday, October 4, 1982, on the general topic of "American Policy in the Nuclear World." I suggest that date as a convenient one; we were advised to offer, obviously, a number of dates, so I further suggest any day between October 4 and November 6, excluding the intervening Mondays - we have already established speaking arrangements for those days. The University will provide lodging, meals, transportation to Santa Clara and, of course, your usual honorarium.

SUBJECT: PRESIDENTIAL SUPPORT INDEX
DATE: MAY 17, 1982

The Presidential Support Index is a ranking of senators according to percentage of votes cast in support of the president's position. Only those votes on which the President announced his preference (as recorded in Congressional Quarterly) have been considered in this report.

Within the index there are three categories: agree (with the President), disagree, and did not vote. Paired or announced for is counted as yea while paired or announced against is counted as nay; a present vote is counted as a disagreeing vote.

During the 1st Session of the 97th Congress and the 2nd Session through record vote number 96, there was a total of 141 votes on which the President had a stated position. This figure is used as the denominator for calculations of percentage (e.g., 100 agreeing votes over a total of 141 votes yields a percentage of 70.92).

Dear Mr. Fox:

Thank you for your recent letter concerning proposed budget cuts for the Federal student assistance programs for the fiscal years 1982 and 1983.

The five major student assistance programs administered by the Office of Student Financial Assistance -- the Pell Grant, Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant, College Work-Study, National Direct Student Loan, and Guaranteed Student Loan Programs -- are authorized by the Higher Education Act of 1965 and by subsequent amendments. The enclosed booklet, "The Student Guide: Five Federal Financial Aid Programs, 1982-83," gives detailed information about the programs, including changes made by the Postsecondary Student Assistance Amendments, enacted on August 13, 1981. Further changes proposed for the programs, including the restriction of Guaranteed Student Loans to undergraduates, the increase of the "origination fee" for these loans from five to ten percent, the extension of the needs test requirement to all Guaranteed Student Loan applicants, and the reduction in funding for Pell Grants, will require legislation by both houses of Congress. Therefore, we cannot say at this time what the specific results of that legislation will be.

The value of these student aid programs is not being questioned. There just are not sufficient Federal resources available to fund them at levels which we all might like. Education assistance, along with other areas of governmental activity, must share the burden of budget cuts necessary to solve the economic problems facing the Nation. The goal of the changes in the student assistance programs continues to be curtailing

the rapid escalation of program costs while maintaining equity in the distribution of Federal funds. Budget revisions were made with the object of retaining our ability to provide assistance to those most in need of it.
