




I used to see more when I was a reporter than I did in my five-month tour of duty here under the aegis of Bill Clark and Dave Gergen.



After representing the East Kern Airport District for the last ten years and dealing with your brother on many occasions, I almost feel that we are personal acquaintances. In any event, I think I "know you" well enough to pass along the following ideas.

It has been suggested, with a good deal of persuasiveness, that high interest rates are directly related to the amount of borrowing and interest rates paid by the United States Government. The administration's Herculean effort to reduce the budget deficit in a responsible manner is well documented. Apparently, however, the administration has not addressed the question of whether the interest rate paid for federal borrowings may be limited. Our experience in California suggests that an interest rate limitation may mitigate some of the impact of the projected borrowings.

California public agencies are limited by State law in the amount of interest which can be paid on short or long term borrowings. Over the years, we have negotiated loans on behalf of our many public agency clients. We have always found it useful to point to the statutory maximum interest rate even when the statutory maximum was slightly less than the market rate. On those occasions where the disparity between the statutory limit and the market rate became too great, the legislature was called upon to amend the law setting the maximum rate. However, given the uncertainties of the legislative process and the time delays inherent, potential lenders seemed to have relied upon the statutory change as a last resort.

In other words, California's statutory maximum interest rate for public entities has had the effect of improving the agency's bargaining position and slowing down the rate of interest rate increase. I doubt that California has developed any statistics to prove the foregoing. I have no idea whether other States with statutory interest limitations have experienced similar

results. I do not know whether it is possible to compare States with the statutory limits to States without a statutory limits in order to develop a statistical case.

Despite the apparent lack of hard data, I would suggest that a federal statutory interest rate limitation could prove to be quite beneficial. Even suggesting such a program should have the effect of immediately moderating the federal governments cost of money. In the short term, lending institutions would be highly motivated to make loans to the federal government even if the statutory limit is slightly below market. In the long run, it appears unlikely that lenders would ignore the most significant potential borrower simply because the market rate is slightly higher.

Finally, what I am suggesting is, of course, simply another method of controlling monetary policy. A Congress which refused to establish a maximum interest rate, or a realistic maximum interest rate, could therefore be held accountable for failures of monetary policy.

As an attorney specializing in the representation of local governmental agencies, I am obviously not qualified to do more than suggest that the foregoing appears to have some merit at least on its surface.

Thank you for the opportunity to address you in this matter.
