Thank you for your recent letter concerning proposed tax increases being considered by the United States Congress. I appreciate your support for President Reagan's policies and your concern for their future success.

Last year President Reagan signed legislation providing one of the largest tax rate reductions in our nation's history. The bill which is currently pending in Congress substantially supplements the Economic Recovery Act of 1981 by providing better mechanisms to insure compliance with the law as it now stands. 

Dear Mr. Deaver:

When I wrote you about a year ago, you responded promptly and I thank you for keeping my name on file.

While my expertise over the years has been in the field of credit & collections, peaking when I served as the President of the California Association of Collectors; now, being semi-retired, this letter is prompted by the current situation of the average family of today.

A good part of it boils down to the fact that a goodly portion of the money we used to spend on other things, all kinds, we now spend these dollars filling the gasoline tanks of our automobiles. It used to cost \$20.00 per month per car not too long ago- now it's \$80.00 per month per car.

So in my opinion, and many others agree, it's not the cars or interest rates- it's the cost of the fuel. (I really haven't read anywhere that interest rates keep people from buying Toyotas and Datsuns- even though they don't really like the small cars)

If my memory serves correctly, during World War II Fulton Lewis Jr. used to tell us on the radio how, our country, struck by oil shortages, took all the surplus corn, grain, etc. and from it made alcohol to help our military machine.

The enclosed articles, published one day apart, tell the story of how incredible things can get. You would think someone in political office or in business would take the idea and run with it. Just think- we would have clean air again, large (profitable to sell) U.S. cars again, and probably a booming economy again- and the money spent on fuels would stay here in the U.S.A..

I know, it probably is too simple- but here in Los Angeles they just "discovered" that police on horseback (hardly a new idea) can keep excellent crowd control!



I have been asked by the Prime Minister, the Right Honourable Mr Malcolm Fraser, to enquire whether it would be possible to bring to President Reagan's notice an attempt that is to be made by an Australian businessman and private citizen to carry out a solo around-the-world helicopter flight. The Australian in question is a Mr Dick Smith who is a very successful self-made businessman and the proprietor now of a large retail company in Australia known as Dick Smith Electronics Pty. Ltd. with its headquarters in Sydney. Following representations from Mr Smith, the Prime Minister has agreed to be a patron of Mr Smith's solo helicopter flight and I understand that the large media company News Ltd. will be a major sponsor.

Mr Smith will be taking delivery of a Bell Jet Ranger helicopter at Fort Worth on 23 July and plans to arrive in Washington on 6 August. He would hope to depart on that same day for his trans-Atlantic crossing via New York, Canada, Greenland, Iceland and the Shetland Islands to London. In London he is expected to be received by His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales on 19 August - this arrangement having been made through Buckingham Palace following representations made by the Governor-General of Australia.

→ I have been asked to enquire specifically whether there would be any possibility of President Reagan finding time in his schedule either to farewell Mr Smith on his departure or, if that is out of the question, to receive Mr Smith for a few minutes while he is in Washington. If the President is unable to do this, the query has been put to me that perhaps another

member of the Cabinet of the Administration might be willing to be associated with this exploit. For example, the Secretary for Transport, Mr Drew Lewis, might be interested in the event. In passing I might add that the thought was put forward also that Mr Smith might be permitted to take off from the White House lawn but I have informed the appropriate people in Canberra that such a concession would be quite out of the question for a private citizen and amateur pilot, no matter what his nationality.

I realise that this request is unusual and, given President Reagan's extraordinarily busy schedule from day to day, that there could be difficulties in trying to make such an arrangement. As I said above, however, I have been directed by the Prime Minister to put the request to the President mainly because the Prime Minister regards Mr Smith as an outstanding example of what the free enterprise spirit can accomplish in our sort of society. Another characteristic of this exploit is that a solo helicopter trip around the world has not been attempted before and therefore it remains one of the few frontiers of aviation that has yet to be crossed. It might be relevant also to point out that the attempt is to be made in an American designed and built helicopter. If Mr Smith does succeed in his attempt, it would say much for American aeronautical design and engineering.

Given these considerations I would be most grateful if you could consider my request and advise me of the reactions of the President towards being associated with this event or whether it might be suggested to another member of the Cabinet that he may care to extend some official United States recognition to Mr Smith in some way on or before his departure from Washington.
