Dear Jim:

Thank you for your letter of December 17th concerning the need for a long-range review of the financial services industry, with particular emphasis on the structure of federal regulatory agencies. As you know, the Administration recently announced the formation of a Task Group on Regulation of Financial Services to study these issues and to recommend any appropriate legislation to the President. Vice President Bush will serve as Chairman of the Task Group, and Treasury Secretary Regan will serve as Vice Chairman. In addition, the Group will include the heads of all federal financial regulatory agencies.

I appreciate your interest in serving as a member of the Task Group, and I am sure that you would be able to contribute a great deal to its work. However, participants in the Group will be limited entirely to the Executive Branch, and in this respect the article to which you referred concerning private sector membership in the Group was simply erroneous.

Although the membership of the Task Group will be limited, I know that the Vice President is interested in the views and suggestions of all interested parties, especially those without any "turf" to protect. Richard Breeden, who is the Vice President's Deputy Counsel, will be directing the working committee of the Task Group. I am sure that he would be interested in hearing from you directly regarding the issues which you have raised.

As you suggest, recent changes in the nature of the financial services industry have extremely large consequences for our overall economy. The current system has obviously grown excessively

complex and restrictive, and we are determined to review proposals for change both expeditiously and comprehensively.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this letter is to put in writing some of the thoughts I have discussed with you verbally on the desirability of the administration taking the lead in analyzing the need for structural and regulatory changes in the financial services industry. I am also requesting that you consider me as an outside member of the proposed "Glass Steagall Task Force (see attached Wall Street Letter article).

THE NEED

Several months ago we discussed the need for a thorough analysis of the financial services industry, particularly the need to study the regulatory structure and the necessary changes required to insure that the United States continue to have a viable financial system and capital markets structure. Not since the 1930's has so much strain been put on our financial system and the potential for widespread harm greater. Although deregulation continues to progress we are risking unnecessary disasters by approaching many problems in a patchwork fashion. As you know, Representative Timothy Wirth has proposed his own task force that Congress would oversee. In my opinion, his proposed task force is a hodge-podge designed to include anyone who might have a political interest. (See H. R. 7014 for composition and objectives of that task force.) John Shad has also proposed a one year study task force which has met with varying degrees of enthusiasm, but now has the support of most leaders of the Securities Industry. These are extremely important issues for the nation and they need the leadership, thought, construct, and guidance of the administration itself. Therefore, I'm happy to hear that the formation of a task force has been approved by "senior White House officials".

DANGER

There is a danger I see in any task force formation. It is the possibility that they may address current or yesterday's issues while glossing over or ignoring important future issues. These future issues are the ones that will put pressure in our financial systems in the mid to late 1980's.

Let me give you an example. Recently, the SEC held a conference on Major Issues Confronting the Nation's Financial Institutions and Markets in the 1980's. Chairman Shad should be commended for beginning a process of information sharing. However, the sessions on industry structure dealt for the most part with current or past issues and little time was spent on many future issues which may dramatically impair the ability of our financial system to meet our Nation's capital needs. Almost no time was spent discussing the dramatic changes we can expect to see in the delivery mechanisms for all financial products such as home delivery, use of personal computers, and direct access to markets domestically first and worldwide thereafter. One commentator said we all have learned over the years "that stocks are sold, not bought". This in the face of the industry witnessing a new growth segment which has already captured 10% of the retail market, will probably capture 25 to 30% in the next few years and where individuals must initiate their own orders, provide their own advice and are not sold anything.

Little time was spent on the issue of capital adequacy given the changes we are likely to see. For example, as different financial service firms find new ways to compete aggressively for market share nationally, they are likely to do so at the expense of short term profitability. We have seen this in the past when brokerage firms began offering "transaction type" accounts (i.e., CMA). Now we see it again in the competition for the new money market deposit accounts. When this happens, financial firms, at the time that profit margins are shrinking, have to expand their balance sheet leverage in order to preserve returns or equity and increase their asset base. These divergent strategies will be magnified in the future because at the same time firms will have to dedicate large chunks of capital to technology development and expand their fixed assets through the purchase of computer and computer related equipment. Are our financial institutions adequately capitalized to support these changes? Will they be able to find the increasing capital needed? At what cost to them? At what cost to the rest of society? These are just an example of questions a panel should seek to review when looking at needed structural and regulatory questions concerning the financial industries.

QUALIFICATIONS


I believe, Mike, that I am qualified to participate on a commission or task force concerning the future of financial industries and that I could make a worthwhile contribution. Attached is a sheet of qualifications that I believe to be relevant to serving on this panel. These are in addition to the fact of always being willing to be of service to the President and yourself whenever possible.

While at SRI, Mr. Fuller was the principal author of the study entitled, "The Future Of the Securities Industries into the 1980's". That study, the most comprehensive study ever completed in this industry, accurately predicted most of the changes occurring in the industry today including banks entering the discount brokerage business, Cash Management Account®, the explosion in the options and financial future markets, and developments which would lead to a National Market System. Mr. Fuller was the co-author of the Merrill Lynch Cash Management account which most observers agree was the beginning of the pressure for the competitive response now approved by DIDC and the resultant money market deposit account at banks. WRISTON, BALL, DENUNZIO, LINTON TO BE ON GLASS-STEAGALL TASK FORCE. Walter Wriston, chairman of Citicorp; George Ball, ceo of Prudential-Bache Securities; Ralph DeNunzio, president and ceo of Kidder Peabody and Robert Linton, newly elected chairman of the Securities Industry Association and head of Drexel Burnham Lambert, are going to be invited to join the Glass-Steagall task force headed by Vice President George Bush, high-level sources told Wall Street Letter. What has not been decided yet is whether the industry representatives will be voting members of the task force consultants.

Private sector members join by "invitation only," sources emphasized. Sources added that more private sector execs are likely to be invited so as to provide an equal representation between bankers and brokers.

The task force has been cleared at the senior political level of the White House, sources added, and a formal announcement is due any day now.

As you move through this term, I want you to understand that the President, you, and the others have my full and complete support. Should the President wish to run for another term, that support will absolutely continue. You all know that I have a close relationship with George Bush and hope someday that he may become President of the United States. I would like to help him do that. There's no question in my mind, or his for that matter, that the country needs the guidance of this President right now and for as long as he feels he can provide it to us. I hope 1983 begins to move more rapidly toward the goals which I believe are important and absolutely necessary for my grandchildren. I want this to be a sound, self-governed Republic when they hit my age!

I am not returning to academia from whence I came in 1978 to become Governor. I have accepted the Presidency of the Sentry Insurance Corporation which has its world headquarters in Stevens Point, Wisconsin. Consequently, Joyce and I get to return home and with an exciting new career and life ahead of us. From that vantage point, I should be able to continue to press ahead on the economic policies set in motion by the President and all of you, but from a platform related to the financial community. I will continue to speak out as loudly as I have as Governor. Maybe it will be heard better by the financial community when I speak as a corporate president rather than as a governor. Time will tell.


