


I wanted to acknowledge your request for an interview with the President which Jerry Carmen brought to our attention.

Terry and Howard: His widow or not, she gets cash

Q Actress Terry Moore, 53, says she has been recognized as the legal widow of the late Howard Hughes and that his estate acknowledges that fact and has made a large financial settlement with her. Is this true?—V.F., Waco, Tex.

A The Howard Hughes estate has not recognized Terry Moore as Hughes' legal widow. The estate, however, has settled with Moore for \$390,000—largely to get rid of what one lawyer calls "her nuisance suit" in order to facilitate distribution of the estate to Hughes' 21 surviving cousins. The estate is said to be worth at least \$50 million.

Q How does the world of literature rate Robert Lowell? Is he the greatest American poet of this century or truthfully a notorious schizophrenic wife-beater?—Elaine H. Smith, Cleveland, Ohio.

A Robert Lowell (1917-77), a Boston Brahmin and the winner of two Pulitzer Prizes, was surely one of the outstanding American poets of his time. Unfortunately, he was a manic-depressive with a supine father and a dominating mother. Much of his adult life was spent in and out of sanitariums. He had three wives: the novelist Jean Stafford, whose nose he twice broke; the essayist Elizabeth Hardwick, to whom he invariably returned after bouts with his mistresses; and Lady Caroline Blackwood, an Anglo-Irish heiress. For further details of his tormented life, read "Robert Lowell," by Ian Hamilton, an excellent biography.

Q Ever since Jane Fonda's workout book hit the list of best-sellers, publishers have announced beauty and exercise books by Linda Evans, Raquel Welch and Victoria Principal. When is Nancy Reagan coming out with her book of exercises and diets for older women?—Deborah F., Cape May, N.J.

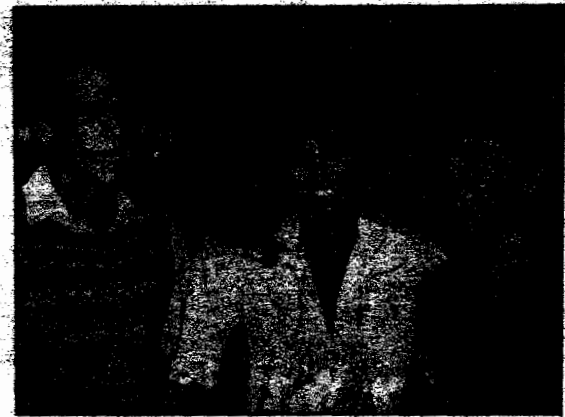
A The First Lady is planning no such book at this time. Michael Deaver, the President's deputy chief of staff, has a diet book in the works, however.

Q Please, before we come to blows, is Joan Collins of the "Dynasty" series pushing 50 or is she not? I say she is; my three friends say she is not. Who is right?—Millie Masiello, Wilmington, Del.

A You are.

Q What does actress Farrah Fawcett have to say about her lover, actor Ryan O'Neal, knocking out the teeth of Griffin O'Neal, his 18-year-old son? And is she sure she wants to marry someone like Ryan?—Norma V., Gila Bend, Ariz.

"I selected the most popular foods, calibrated the amount of calories each would have in an average portion, and developed a series of cards whose width reflected the amount of calories.

"I used it on myself and lost 10 pounds. I don't know if I lost from using it or working on it. But it looked like a game to me."

Test Run

And so he created Calor-Ease. He put it through a hakedown run at some 20 reducing camps this summer, and the reception was good. He's not quite sure if he's going to produce and market it himself or work through an established company. He does know that he'd dearly love to get the idea on television—a sort of blackjack game in which the contestants guess the number of calories in foods, losing if they go over their allotted portions.

Calor-Ease consists of a sort of board, with various slots. Cards of varying widths, representing various foods, are fitted into these slots. There's the meat, fish, poultry category; the vegetable, fruit, dairy category; the baked goods category, and so on.

Also there's the ethnic category—Chinese, Irish, Italian, Russian, Jewish, soul food, Spanish.

Calorie Slot

Along the bottom of the board there is a slot with calories numbered up to 2,600. There's also a height chart for males and females. Suppose you are female, five feet three inches: You would take in 1,600 calories a day on the average, but less if trying to lose weight. You set a marker at whatever figure your doctor suggests.

Suppose you start the day off with a shot of Scotch. Take the Scotch card out and put it in the bottom slot. That's 120 calories. Then how about a nice chocolate sundae with whipped cream? Find that card and place it beside the Scotch card. That adds another 320 calories; so now you've got 440 calories. That ought to do you for breakfast.

Now for lunch you might start out with an ice cream soda. That card reads 340 calories. How about an egg roll? A mere 100 calories. Put the egg roll card in the bottom slot.

Well, you get the idea. It's a graphic way to keep track of your calories and maintain a balanced diet.

New Game Charts

Battle of the Bulge

About a year ago, Herbert Stone of South Hackensack decided he was putting on too much weight. So he bought a diet book.

"I started to collect the foods that I wanted," he recalls, "and I found I had more calories than I wanted. I had to take out some of the foods and recalculate. It got to be a bookkeeping business."

It was then that Calor-Ease, a new diet game, was born.

Stone is an industrial engineer who once was superintendent of a factory. In recent years, he has been a consultant for a number of manufacturers. He's the slide-rule type.

Uses Programming

"I figured," he says, "that, since I have a background in programming, that maybe I'd make an individual card for each food, and if the program didn't come out right, I'd take out that card and substitute another card.

"Then the thought occurred to me that if I made the cards of different sizes I could, at a glance, recognize a wide card from a thin card. A wide card means a wide belly, a thin card a thin belly.

Dear Mike,

I trust this letter will find you safely back in Washington, D.C. from what must have been an exhausting but successful trip. It was nice seeing you in Hong Kong last Sunday and Monday and my only regret is that your short stay did not make it possible for me to show you a bit more courtesy.

While you were in Japan, I took the liberty of telexing you through the U.S. Embassy to get a little more information on the dates of the President's forthcoming visit to countries in the Far East, especially Japan and The Philippines. I realized that at this stage, there might be a need to keep these confidential but as I was pressed to commit myself to an important personal engagement in Hong Kong on Tuesday, November 15, I just wanted to be sure that there is no conflict with my intended schedule in Tokyo and Manila at the time.

Should you think it is still premature for specific dates of the Presidential trip to be made public, perhaps you could just let me know through Paul Lee whether November 15 presents a problem so far as my intended presence in Tokyo and Manila are concerned. I will then see if I should try to shift around my Hong Kong commitment.
