

As I mentioned to you the other day, the Portrait Project is moving along more or less on schedule.

To date, I have completed 435 portraits. There are about another 265 that are on my list of subjects of which about 115 are on the "A" list. I suspect that I will probably get about another 120 or so before I run out of time for a grand total of around 550 portraits.

As you know, the Corcoran has scheduled a major exhibition of the portraits which will open on Monday, January 14, 1985. Dr. Alan Fern, Director of The National Portrait Gallery, and Jane Livingston, Curator of Photography of the Corcoran Museum are curating the show.

The exhibition's design is to hang 80-100 large (20"x24") prints in the second floor atrium balcony area. These large prints will be chosen by the exhibition curators on the basis of their photographic worth. In the adjoining center gallery, we plan to hang very large prints of the President, the Speaker and the Chief Justice surrounded by arrays of small prints of all the remaining (450 or so) portraits. Tentatively, I would like to hang portraits of Mrs. Reagan and Mrs. Bush on the walls of the gallery facing the three portraits described above.

Complete sets of the portraits have been accepted by the Archives of the United States ( for the Ronald Reagan Library ), the National Portrait Gallery, and I have had an informal acceptance by the Library of Congress. The negatives, of course, will also end up in the Ronald Reagan Library.

Abrams Books of New York City, the pre-eminent American photographic book publishers, are doing a book of the portraits, both in hard- and soft-cover, scheduled to come out on January 14, 1985 also. George Will has agreed to do a foreword that would establish the political context of the portraits and Fern and Livingston are doing the same for the photographic context. The deadline for photos is July 15, 1984.

Negotiations are under way with four or five other museums across the country to travel the show.

I never dreamed that I would be as successful in getting as many people as I have. I can't tell you how fortunate I have been to operate in an atmosphere that allows me the artistic freedom to document the 'Reagan Era' in new and historically valuable ways. It has been good for the historical record and a treasured experience and honor for me as well. Both Livingston and Fern think that the show will be a "landmark" in modern American photography. Your encouragement and support are in large part responsible for my success. I am most deeply grateful.



However, I do have some problems that I am trying to correct on a priority basis.

1) I did do the President's portrait last year for the Portrait Project, but for a number of mostly technical reasons, the session did not work as well as I would have liked. I would like your permission to schedule the President for 15 minutes in the Roosevelt Room, or to set up in the East Room. Of the two, the East Room makes a better studio. Can you suggest a date before July 15?

2) While I have had some indirect and informal contact with Mrs. Reagan about her portrait, she has been unable to find the time to do it. Obviously I would not hang a picture of her unless she was happy with it. Could you help me to schedule her also before July 15?





# 'Midnight jogger' of Vile Parle

AHMEDABAD, Sept. 22

To many, he is the "mad midnight jogger". For others, he is just a young college student with a strange hobby — jogging. This takes him out on to the streets at all odd hours of the day and even night, when other people are cozily asleep.

Janak M. Jani, 19, a first year B.Com student of the Narsee Moyjee College of Commerce and Economics in Bombay, is an enthusiastic jogger. His latest long venture is to jog from Bombay to Ahmedabad and back. He will be accompanied by two friends on bicycles, and a police escort.

Starting on October 13 at 8 a.m. from Vile Parle, Bombay, where he stays, he will jog his way through Shirsad, Talasari, Vapi, Chikhli, Navsari, Ankleshwar, Miyagam, Baroda, Nadiad, Kankaria and then arrive at the town hall in the city, on October 19.

What made him take to such a strange hobby? At first, he loftily announces it was the desire to gain "cultural knowledge". But on being questioned further, he sheepishly says it was his love of adventure and photography which made him take to jogging.

What began as a 20-minute had during his school days, has now become a six-hour past time. After attending morning college, he sets out for his jogging Vile Parle to Ban-

dra, a distance of 20 kms. But this is not all for the day. At 2 a.m., he once again sets out of Churchgate and back — another 56 kms. This is his daily routine.

Every Monday morning he jogs to the Siddhi Vinayak Temple, at Prabhadevi. This was done without the knowledge of his parents for the first ten months. "This is my hobby and I did not want any disturbance" says Jani. But now his entire family accepts and encourages this hobby.

"I am not a very competitive person", says Jani "I have not taken part in any competition as yet. I do it for the pleasure it gives me and not for any laurels".

But he may break this rule soon, by taking part in the international marathon, to be held in Pune next month. He will be representing his college at this meet, but only if it is held before October 13. For on that day, he will start jogging his way to Ahmedabad.

Jani has no special reasons for choosing Ahmedabad as the destination of his first long jog. Though he was born here, he has spent 19 years in Bombay. He was expected to abandon his planned trip from Bombay to Goa earlier this year, on doctor's advice.

People react in different ways on seeing Jani. While some look out of their car windows and hoot and boo him, others are more encouraging. Keep it up, they say, and you might make it to the Olympics. "I don't mind them poking fun at me," says Jani, with a nonchalant shrug. "No doubt many of them think I am mad". With all his jogging, how does he find time for studies and other activities? He shyly admits that he is an average student. On graduating, he hopes to enter the Indian Institute of Management or go abroad for an MBA. Or else, enter the cotton business. He wants to earn enough to stand on his own feet and indulge in his other hobbies. These include photography and hiking. He is also the editor of the Gujarati section of his college magazine.

His present venture will cost Jani and his team around Rs. 8,000. He hopes either his college or the Lions Club would sponsor him. Though he has no formal training to date, Jani has a Swiss friend, himself is a jogging enthusiast and a record holder, who gives him friendly tips. "If I am able to get formal training and encouragement I may even begin entering competitive events," says the young jogger.

Janak M. Jani, the 19-year-old jogging enthusiast was given a touching farewell as he resumed his jogging at 4-30 p. m. from the Town Hall in the city. After a five-day break, he is eager to set off once again.

As per schedule, Janak reached Ahmedabad on October 19 at 8-30 a.m. to a resounding welcome from his parents and friends. AHMEDABAD, March 6: Twenty-year-old Janak Jani, an intrepid young man who has run the Bombay-Ahmedabad-Bombay circuit, is on to a very ambitious project—a log from Delhi to Los Angeles for the Olympic Games.

Janak, a first year student of N. M. College of Commerce and Economics, Bombay, plans to embark on this adventure for world peace. He intends to carry this message through India, Bangladesh, Burma, China, South Korea, Japan and America. If all goes well Janak will do a lap with the Olympic torch at the Games venue.

Janak has done his homework well—he has detailed maps, weather conditions and other relevant information from agencies around the world—but one major hurdle has yet to be crossed: he needs a sponsor. Janak's middle class background does not permit him to finance his trip and he is hoping someone comes forward.

Since his "peace mission", Nobel Peace prize winner Mother Teresa will flag him off from Calcutta. Janak is hoping that the Prime Minister, Mrs. Indira Gandhi, flags him off at Delhi and is proceeding to the capital to pursue the matter.

## Jogging for world peace

Twenty-year-old Janak M. Jani wants to jog all the way to Los Angeles from Delhi carrying the message of world peace, love and harmony. The frail and bespectacled first year commerce student of the N. M. College of Commerce and Economics in Bombay hopes to leave Delhi on April 1 and reach Los Angeles after 111 days in time for the Olympics.

Jani who had jogged his way from Bombay to Ahmedabad and back last October, left here on Wednesday by train for Delhi, where he hopes to gather some backing for his adventure.

He has been carrying on correspondence with various associations and individuals seeking support. His letters to the President, Prime Minister, Sports Minister and the Indian Olympic association for sponsorship yielded cyclostyled and delayed replies. He was disappointed. Meeting them personally will get things moving, he says, and that is exactly what he plans to do in Delhi.

He hopes to get a letter from the Government saying he was going as an Indian delegate and that he be given transit visas. He is hoping that an escort car will be sponsored by some company.

In his long jogging, he will cross Bangladesh, Burma, China, South Korea and Japan from where he will take a flight to San Francisco and then continue to jog to Los Angeles to see the Olympics.



## शांति और प्यार का संदेश लेकर दिल्ली से लास एंजिल्स की दौड़

अहमदाबाद, ७ मार्च (जनसत्ता)। बंबई के २० वर्ष के छात्र जनक एम. जानी नई दिल्ली से लास एंजिल्स की दूरी दौड़ कर तय करना चाहते हैं। वे विश्व शांति, प्यार और सामंजस्य का संदेश प्रचारित करना चाहते हैं। बंबई के एन.एम. कालेज आफ कामर्स के छात्र जनक एम. जानी १ अप्रैल को नई दिल्ली से रवाना होने की योजना बना रहे हैं ताकि १११ दिन की यात्रा तय करने के बाद ओलंपिक के दौरान लास एंजिल्स पहुंच सकें।

जनक ने पिछले अक्टूबर में बंबई से अहमदाबाद और वापसी दौड़ पूरी की थी। वे आज बंबई से नई दिल्ली के लिए रवाना हो गए।

अपने दौड़ के लिए समर्थन जुटाने हेतु जनक ने विभिन्न संघों और व्यक्तियों को पत्र लिखे। राष्ट्रपति, प्रधानमंत्री, खेलमंत्री और भारतीय ओलंपिक संघ को लिखे गए पत्रों के जवाब में उन्हें देर से प्राप्ति हुए। वे इससे निराश हैं। जनक का कहना है कि व्यक्तिगत मुलाकातों से काम जल्दी और आसानी से आगे बढ़ेगा। इसलिए वे दिल्ली जा रहे हैं।

जनक को आशा है कि सरकार उन्हें अपने प्रतिनिधि के रूप में भेजने का पत्र और आब्रजन वीसा प्रदान करेगी। उन्हें किसी कंपनी से स्पॉन्सर की हुई एक एस्कार्ट

कार भी मिलने की आशा है।

वैसे वे अभी तक कई कंपनियों के दरवाजे खटखटा चुके हैं। पर सिवा इकारी के उन्हें कुछ भी नहीं मिला। एक कंपनी का कहना है कि वह क्रिकेट पर बहुत अधिक खर्च कर चुकी है। दूसरी कंपनी का कहना है कि उसका माल विदेशों में नहीं बिकता है। जाहिर है कि उन्हें किसी से भी मदद नहीं मिली।

अपनी लंबी दौड़ में जनक बंगलादेश, बर्मा, चीन, दक्षिण कोरिया, जापान जाएंगे। वहां से वे सान फ्रांसिस्को के लिए हवाई उड़ान लेंगे। वे सान फ्रांसिस्को से लास एंजिल्स तक की दूरी दौड़ लगाकर पूरी करेंगे।

जापान के बंबई स्थित वाणिज्य दूतावास ने उन्हें वीसा दिलाने का वायदा किया है। वे, जिन देशों से होकर दौड़ पूरी करेंगे, उन देशों के दूतावासों से भी संपर्क करेंगे।

जनक ओलंपिक खेल देखेंगे। वे ओलंपिक आयोजन समिति से अनुरोध करेंगे कि शांति संदेश का प्रचार करने के लिए उन्हें स्टेडियम के तीन चक्कर लगाने दें। वे अपनी दौड़ के दौरान राज्याध्यक्षों द्वारा दिए गए शांति संदेश भी ओलंपिक कमेटी को सौंपेंगे। यदि उन्हें मौका मिला तो वे ओलंपिक मशाल लेकर भी कुछ दूरी तय करेंगे।
