HAND IN HAND WITH NANCY REAGAN

CASSETTE

SIDE A

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

I met Nancy Davis 33 years ago in California. She'd been my First Lady long before the White House.

NANCY:

That's me. Born in New York City on the 6th of July, 1923. I spent the first few years of my life with my Aunt and Uncle in Maryland, until I could go to live with my mother and her new husband, Dr. Loyal Davis in Chicago.

REAGAN:

Her father helped save so many lives. He was the first neuro-surgeon in the city of Chicago. When we were in Dublin last May, she was honored for her father's accomplishments in medicine. His portrait now hangs in the halls of the Royal College with the surgeons there.

NANCY:

In this portrait, my father is pictured just the way he would want to be remembered, in his surgeon's gown. Growing up as the daughter of a surgeon was very special for me...I always had the sense that I was one step away from a miracle and I'm so pleased and proud that my father's portrait is hanging here among the greats of the past and the greats of the future.

REAGAN:

I have always understood the great love she had for him. Her mother, Edith Lucket, was an actress on Broadway and quite a success. Nancy idolized her mother and followed in her footsteps to the stage.

NANCY:

I finally made it to Broadway. This led me eventually to Hollywood and MGM, and...to Ronald Reagan.

(Cut to "Hellcats of the Navy" footage)

(Music)...I was afraid you wouldn't come. Heard about Wess. Yes. Dr. Landon. Somehow I feel it was all my fault. Everything's such a mess. Let's get out of here. I'll sign out. I got a JEEP. Take over for me, will you, Frankie?.....
What are you going to do right after the war, Case? I told you a hundred times. I want to hear it once more. I'm going into the surplus business. (Music fades).....

NANCY:

Little did I know that acting would soon be in our past. I gave up the career to spend my time as Ronnie's wife and the mother of our kids. I thought I had had a public life before, but my real public life began when Ronnie became Governor of California.

(Voices under of Ronald Reagan taking the oath of office for the governorship of California)

("...I do, with no exceptions. Do you further swear...".)

NANCY:

He's given me a life I never thought I would ever have. It's marvelous.

REAGAN:

What a great job she's done. Example, furthering the cause of the Foster Grandparent Program. She played a very important part in that program taking off and growing to the extent that it has.

NANCY:

The elderly have so much to give. And so do these handicapped children. The Foster Grandparent Program just gives them a way to make the happy exchange.

WOMAN:

Today we have for you, Mrs. Reagan, this very special award which reads, 'National Religious Broadcasters extends this award to Nancy Reagan for her outstanding contribution in her drug abuse program for the youth of America. Thank you, First Lady, Nancy Reagan.

NANCY:

The Drug Abuse Problem--you're talking about the whole next generation.

REAGAN:

Now we have these Drug Treatment Centers nationwide that have been started not by Government, but started by people in the communities and all. And this is where Nancy's had a very great effect.

NANCY

If you can save one child....it's worth it.

REAGAN:

Evidently, there's a universal language that's understood between children and her. She's kind of an ambassador to the world's children..

(SONG: "To Love A Child" with photo montage)

REAGAN:

I remember, this was in the Press Room. At one of those mini press conferences. I can see with the look on my face I was right at some very serious questions there. But over here at the side and completely surprising me is Nancy with a Birthday Cake. It was my Birthday, and look at her laugh. And then she came around the corner. Everybody in the room had seen her before I did because she was visible to them, but not to me. Everywhere we go, Nancy makes the world a little better. To see her with Heads of State, people of other nations, she represents her country very proudly and she represents it well. And...she makes friends wherever she goes. I can't imagine life without her.

CLOSING SONG: "If I don't see her each day,
I'll miss her. Gee what a thrill each time I
kiss her. It's heaven when I embrace my Nancy
with the laughing face."

PRESIDENT REAGAN DOCUMENTARY

(APPLAUSE)

MAN:

Governor, are you prepared to take the Constitutional Oath?

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

I am.

MAN:

Would you place your left hand on the bible, and raise your right hand and repeat after me, I Ronald Reagan, do solemnly swear...

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

I, Ronald Reagan, do solemnly swear...

MAN:

...that I will faithfully execute the office of President of the United States...

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

That I will faithfully execute the office of President of the United States...

...and will to the best of my ability, protect, and defend...

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

...and will to the best of my ability, protect, and defend...

...the Constitution of the United States.

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

MAN:

So help me, God.

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

So help me, God.

MAN:

May I congratulate you, sir.

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

Yes, it was quite a day. A new beginning.

You know, you don't really become president. The presidency is an institution, and you have temporary custody of it.

I know that the image is that it's a very lonely job, and you're out there all on your own for everything that has to be decided or done. That's not quite true. I've always believed that the other people around you here are meant to be here and to contribute. And you know that the best counsel and the opinions and many times varied opinions, opposition as well as approval of whatever's being discussed, that you're hearing these honest views from these very capable men and women who have given up so much, so many of them, in their private lives, to come here and serve...you don't feel alone.

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

I believe that the Vice President, George Bush, is more involved in the policy matters of this administration, government in general, here in the executive branch, than any Vice President we've probably ever had.

VICE PRESIDENT BUSH:

...It's just different, the mood is different, the...the, it's not that everybody agrees with what you're doing, but there's a...certain respect for the United States of America. And it is loud, and it is clear, and I, I run into that all over the country. People say, you know, we're pleased the President's taking these strong positions. And they might, they might argue with you on one or two things if you gave 'em a chance, but they're...back. You get the feeling that the country's movin' again. A certain pride level.

MAN:

The bottom line with President Reagan is that he has brought back respect for the White House. Period. That's it.

MAN:

There's a whole new attitude in America today. And I think that that needs to be continued.

WOMAN:

It used to be the Americans took it for granted they were American. Now it seems like they're really proud...

MAN:

He put me to work. He's gonna keep me there. The man did a good job. And I hope he's gonna go for another four years. God bless America.

MAN:

I even hear songs on the radio, t.v. now, that says, I'm proud to be an American.

(MUSIC)

SONG

If tomorrow all the things were gone, I'd worked for all my life,
And I had to start again, with just my children and my wife.
I'd thank my lucky stars to be livin' here today,
'Cause the flag still stands for freedom, and they can't take that away.
And I'm proud to be an American, where at least I know I'm free.
And I won't forget the men who died who gave that right to me.
And I'd gladly stand up next to you and defend her still today.
'Cause there ain't no doubt I love this land.
God bless the U.S.A.

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

You know, the first responsibility of any President is to ensure that our nation is strong and able to protect our security and our freedom. And I have to tell you when we came into office, our military readiness was in pretty sorry shape.

We recently, as you know, were on a trip to Asia. And there, I have a memory that I think will be with me for a long time. On Sunday in South Korea, I went up to the demilitarized zone, went to the outdoor church service with our troops there.

I met with a great many of the men. I had a chance to talk with them individually. And I was so proud to hear not grumbling, or I want to go home, but to hear the pride with which they carry out their duties there.

And I have never seen such morale, such esprit de corps...such pride in their work. All of us here at home should remember all those young men and women on the frontiers of freedom.

MAN:

...I'm from Malibu, California, and I've been in Korea ten months, sir.

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

I hope that people out there recognize what a wonderful bunch of young people we've got in the military now. When they see someone in the street in uniform, I...hope they'll go up and say hello, and...maybe tell 'em they're a little proud.

MAN:

...Proud to know you too, sir.

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

If we maintain that commitment, if we stay ready, then America can and will help ensure peace throughout the world.

WOMAN:

...the President's policies, I'm a hundred percent behind because he's strong in defense.

WOMAN:

I think President Reagan is getting us back to basics...back to things that keep our nation surviving and strong. Like a good defense and a good economy.

MAN:

The economy has never been as great as it has been now in 20 years. Unemployment is down, interest rates are down, more people are buying homes than ever before...

MAN:

We're on the upward swing, and the factories are working much stronger than before...the people are getting back to work.

WOMAN:

...people are traveling more, business is better, people are on business trips, people are on vacations...they're spending more money.

MAN:

We're back on top.

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

You know, it's hard to believe that it was less than four short years ago, that interest rates were going through the roof. Inflation was, of course, the single biggest culprit and was responsible for those high interest rates. And you can understand why tackling inflation head on was one of our first priorities, and we went at it tooth and nail and brought it down and, we kept it down. It wasn't wishful thinking and it did become reality.

Since January of '81 the prime rate has been pared by forty percent, mortgage interest rates have come down four percentage points since their peak. Now that makes home ownership possible for 17 million American households that couldn't afford it just two and one half years ago. And the same goes for automobiles too. Lower loan rates have made cars a lot more affordable for a lot more people. Still, it is good to see people buying homes and cars again, to see America's automobile industry regaining its strength, taking a back seat to no one. So we're going to keep on with what we're doing; we're going to bring those interest rates down further by keeping inflation down once and for all. And here I am talking to you, you know better than anyone what those interest rates have done to people who want homes, who want cars, who want to be able to save a dollar or two.

WOMAN:

I think he's just doggone honest. It's remarkable! He's been on television. What, have I heard about 26 times? Talking to us about what he's doing. Now he's not doing that for any other reason than to make it real clear. And if anybody has any question about where he's headed, it's their fault. Maybe they don't have a television. Hard to believe.

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

When we're talking about Social Security, we're talking about my generation. I feel very strongly about my generation...that we must have a Social Security System that keeps it's promise to the people who kept their promise to America.

MAN:

The President has done a lot of things. But bringing inflation down, I think, is probably the best thing he's done for older people...for anybody.

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

I feel strongly about keeping inflation down, interest rates down; but also making sure that no one pulls the rug out from under those people who are dependent on Social Security.

WOMAN:

And I know that President Reagan is a caring man. That he cares about old people, and children and ill people.

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

There is no threat from anyone, and certainly not from this administration, to Social Security.

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

I didn't know I was shot. In fact, I was still asking, "what was that noise?". I thought it was firecrackers. And, the next thing I knew, Jerry, Secret Service, had simply grabbed me here and threw me into the car and then he dived in on top of me. It was only then that I felt a paralyzing pain and I learned that the bullet had hit me up here. When I walked in they were just concluding a meeting in the hospital of all the doctors associated with the hospital...they were all there. When I saw all those doctors around me, I said I hoped they were all Republicans!

I've been asked about a visitor that I had while I was recuperating back in March of 1981, Cardinal Cooke. What a wonderful man. A most dedicated man, and just one of the most kindly men I have ever met. And we were talking about some of the, call them coincidences, that had happened at the time of the shooting and that I had heard after I had started to recover. And he said that in view of them, God must have been sitting on my shoulder. Well, he must have been. I told him whatever time I've got left, it now belongs to someone else.

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

Our trip to Japan, Korea, and later to the Peoples' Republic of China makes you realize that the old line "Go West young man, go West" still fits. There's a new frontier out there. There is a future. And the United States is going to be very much a part of that future. One cannot meet with those people without realizing that they are tremendously capable people. A talented and energetic people. And I found there was a great longing for peace among those people.

I think we can have a fine relationship. We do already. But we can keep that and build on that relationship, whether it's with trade, cultural exchange, we can be mutually beneficial to each other.

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

They may say you never can go home again, but it developed...My great grandfather came from Ballyporeen in County Tipparary in Ireland.

And so, on our trip to the last summit, we stopped in Ireland...and I visited Ballyporeen.

You know how Irish love to tell stories. I went into the, the pub there, mainly because they've now named it after our family, and heard stories and even met a relative.

MAN:

Did you (know) Mr. President, that Pat O'Brien had come here?

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

You know, I found that out when I found out all the rest of this that I had never known. And I found it out because he and I were very close together. And he, he went in the hospital just recently, you know, for an operation. I called him...we had a nice talk on the phone. And after he was out of the operation, he died.

But, as was typical of him, he told me an Irish story on the phone. It was one of the last things that he said to me. He said now, the fellow here that was, pretended to be blind, and was on the dole...Do you know the story?

GROUP:

No.

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

No?

MAN:

I'd like to hear it. Tell it.

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

For years he'd been getting along on that, by pretending he was blind. And so one day he went into a movie theatre, sat down, and suddenly realized the fellow beside him was the administrator of the dole.

(LAUGHTER)

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

So he stood up and he said, "Well tell me, is this the bus to Carey?"

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

I had never known much about my father's family but to see the original handwriting signed in 1829 of my great grandfather's baptism. To walk the streets of that village, you know...it was quite an experience.

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

We stand on a lonely windswept point on the northern shore of France. But 40 years ago at this moment, the air was dense with smoke and the cries of men. And the air was filled with the crack of rifle fire and the roar of cannon.

Here in Normandy, the rescue began. At dawn on the morning of the 6th of June, 1944...

PRESIDENT REAGAN VOICE OVER:

Sixty-two of the rangers who scaled the cliffs there at Pointe du Hoc, now back 40 years later to the scene of their heroic action.

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

...these are the boys of Pointe du Hoc. These are the men who took the cliffs.

PRESIDENT REAGAN VOICE OVER:

It was a very moving experience. They were what General Marshall called, "our secret weapon", the best damn kids in the world.

Where do we find them, where do we find such men? And the answer came almost as quickly as I'd asked the question. Where we've always found them in this country. On the farms, in the shops, the stores, and the offices. They just are the product of the freest society the world has ever known.

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

"Someday Lis, I'll go back," said Private First Class Peter Robert Zanatta, of the 37th Engineer Combat Battalion, and first assault wave to hit Omaha Beach.

Lisa Zanatta Henn began her story by quoting her father, who promised that he would return to Normandy. She ended with a promise to her father, who died 8 years ago of cancer. "I'm going there, Dad, and I'll see the beaches and the barricades and the monuments. I'll see the graves, and I'll put flowers there just like you wanted to do. I'll feel all the things you made me feel through your stories and your eyes. I'll never forget what you went through, Dad, nor will I let anyone else forget. And, Dad, I'll always be proud.

Through the words of his loving daughter, who is here with us today, a D-day veteran has shown us the meaning of this day far better than any President can. It is enough for us to say about Private Zanatta and all the men of honor and courage who fought beside him four decades ago: We will always remember. We will always be proud. We will always be prepared, so we may be always free.

Thank you.

PRESIDENT REAGAN:

I believe in the line, "I look to the hills from whence cometh my strength." Before I reached my decision to run for re-election some people thought I'd be happy to retire to that beautiful ranch outside Santa Barbara and spend the rest of my life enjoying the simple things...riding horses, chopping wood and spending time with Nancy, being outdoors and close to all of God's natural gifts. But they forget there are so many things that remain to be done, so many challenges that must be met. I'd have felt like a quitter if I'd just walked away from getting federal spending under control once and for all; or from reforming and simplifying our tax system; from creating enterprise zones--a set of incentives that would encourage business to help rebuild the troubled areas of our country, provide hope to those who yearn for true opportunity---and something else---Sitting around in the Oval Office you look around and sometimes you can't help but choke up a little bit because you're surrounded with history that has somehow touched everything in this room. It occurs to you that every person who ever sat here yearned in the depths of his soul to bring people and nations together in peace. Four times in my life, America's been at war. It's a tragic waste of lives and it makes you realize how desperately the world needs a lasting peace.

Just across the hall here in the White House is the Roosevelt Room, named after the two Roosevelts who served here, one Republican, one a Democrat. Many decisions are made in that room. And often, as I meet with my staff, I gaze up at the five service flags, each representing one of the five military services, and draped from each flag are battle streamers signifying every battle campaign fought since the Revolutionary War. Each ribbon, a remembrance of a time when American men and women spilled their blood into the soil of distant lands. My fondest hope for this Presidency is that the people of America give us the continued opportunity to pursue a peace so strong and so lasting that we would never have to add another streamer to those flags.


Dear Tina:

This way the program can be played sometime prior to the President's and Mrs. Reagan's visit. Enclosed for your reference is a copy of Miss Orpen's letter along with my response.
