Dear Mike:

I'm disappointed that I was unable to get you on the phone but I understand how busy you are.

I was calling for two reasons. First, to talk with you about your letter to me asking me to become a Director of the Responsible Government in America Foundation. I was unable to get Joe Rogers, Bill Brock or anyone else to tell me more about it. But, fortunately Eddie Mahe called me and filled me in on the details. I have agreed to become a director as you requested and look forward to working with Joe Rogers and the other people there.

The other reason I called, at Ed Rollin's suggestion, had to do with Nancy Reagan's visit to Colorado on August 10. This visit has not been coordinated in any way with the Republican Party. As a matter of fact, we found out about it only by accident. My request was going to be that we schedule a brief meeting with the First Lady with some of our important contributors in a way that would be very dignified and give her an opportunity to thank the people that have given in the past and will, in the future, be largely responsible for carrying Colorado for the President.

In talking with Holly Coors, it appears that this is a lost cause. She has been trying to do the same thing and she is perhaps even more upset than I am that this particular group has not coordinated in any way with us or any of the other people that we feel would be appropriate for the First Lady.

Frankly, I am feeling a little downhearted. As you know, President Reagan has visited Colorado twice since he has been President. On both occasions we were unable to have even five minutes for him to visit or even wave at the people who have done so much and care so much for him. The damage to our morale is obvious when our Party people think that the only reason he didn't do this is because we didn't bother to ask. On one of those two occasions we had tentative approval for 45 minutes of the President's time, had it all set up with the meeting rooms, caterers, and then the visit was cancelled five days before the President was scheduled to be here.

I certainly don't want to give you anymore problems because you have a difficult task. Everyone wants the President. What we are asking is that when the President or the First Lady is coming to Colorado any way, that we have an opportunity to participate in the decision making, at least to the extent of giving our recommendations. Colorado is a target state for the U.S. Senate because Bill Armstrong's term is up this year and we have an opportunity to pickup another Republican Congressman. To do this, we have got to do everything right and the Party must be well funded. The President and the First Lady can do so much to help us and in so doing, will help themselves — that we need to work together on these rare opportunities.

We have determined that the referenced photograph, which was converted to a postcard by Coral-Lee, was taken by Michael Evans and released into the public domain on November 18, 1981, by the First Lady's Press Secretary (announcement attached). The photograph, along with two others, was released for the purpose of showing the results of your redecoration of the residence.

When a photograph is in the public domain, the White House Photography Office routinely makes it available without charge to anyone requesting it. White House photographs cannot be copyrighted.

There are, of course, limits on the permissible uses of a photograph of this sort, even if it is in the public domain. The photograph should not be used to suggest Presidential or First Lady endorsement of a commercial product or enterprise. Here the photograph is not being used to suggest endorsement of a product, in essence, the photograph itself is the product. Nor do I think we could fairly argue that there is the suggestion of endorsement of the postcard enterprise. Evans and the White House are given credit for the photograph on the back of the postcard, as they should be. It is also made clear that a private firm -- not the White House -- produced and published the postcard.

Unfortunately, producing and selling a postcard such as this is no different from gathering and publishing Presidential remarks released by the Press Office. Both items are in the public domain, and, with the caveats noted above, the public can do with them what it will. The Photo Office could adopt a policy of releasing photographs only to

news organizations or for individual use. All that a postcard producer would have to do, however, is obtain a photograph for individual use -- or have someone else do so -- and then use it to create postcards.

My own reaction is that restricting distribution of the photographs would create more problems than it would solve, not the least because of the difficulty of devising and administering appropriate criteria governing permitted distribution.

Thus, the easiest answer is careful control and supervision over the selection of photographs to be released to the public.

Please let me know if you wish me to do anything further on this.

* * * * * *

For your information, the woman who produced this postcard, Coral-Lee, is an individual in California who requests White House photographs with some regularity, and produces a limited edition of 3,000 postcards from the photographs. According to the White House Photography Office Director, Coral-Lee then distributes most of the postcards for charitable purposes, to hospitals, prisons, and the like. She believes the postcard is a unique way of recording history. Coral-Lee's last name is Sparr, and she is originally from Dixon, Illinois. She claims to remember the President as a lifeguard, and that her parents were friends of the Reagans. She was in to have her photo taken with the President on February 16, 1983.


Last year's two Diplomatic Dinners were outstanding successes and should be repeated. We were able in two nights to accommodate all of the Chiefs of Mission, their spouses, as well as the Permanent Representatives to the OAS and their spouses. Guests began arriving at 7:15 and were served cocktails. At 8:00pm the President and Mrs. Reagan arrived on the State Floor and went to the Blue Room. The guests went through the receiving line and were photographed with the President and Mrs. Reagan. The receiving line terminated at 8:30 and dinner was served. At 9:30 toasts were given by the President and by the ranking Ambassador. At 9:45 the President and Mrs. Reagan went to the Color Rooms for coffee and liquers and the Diplomatic Corps was given the opportunity to meet briefly with them both. At 10:15 the President and Mrs. Reagan left the State Floor for the residence. By 10:45 all guests had departed.

For many Ambassadors this is their only opportunity to dine with the President. The photographs taken and the evening's events helped cement many relations. The President's envolvement is approximately two hours each night. No entertainment is necessary which means less costs and time. I believe it would be a great mistake not to repeat the event in the same format. The Diplomatic community does not view a reception in the same light as a White House dinner. We should not omit the Representatives to the OAS. They were invited last year and a change would send an incorrect signal to representatives of crucial areas.

RECOMMENDATION:

That we repeat last year's two Diplomatic Dinners in the same format.




