SUBJECT: USE OF MILITARY AIRCRAFT

As a general practice, commercial aircraft should be utilized for official travel by the White House Staff. Use of military aircraft will be permitted only in exceptional circumstances when such use is clearly in the best interests of the government.

All requests for military aircraft should be submitted in writing to Edward V. Hickey, Assistant to the President for Special Support Services, for initial determination of availability and scheduling.

Requests will then be coordinated by John Rogers, for my approval. Where appropriate, John Rogers will consult the Counsel's office regarding the requested use.

I will continue to review personally all requests from the Cabinet and other senior administration officials.

This supercedes all previous memoranda on the subject.

Dear Tom,

During the recent Presidential Advance, I was faced with an unfortunate security problem which was a repetition of a similar situation in 1981 during the Vice President's visit to London. In 1981, the V.P.'s lead advance and his volunteer Washington helpers admitted to me that they did not hold any security clearance. This was passed to the White House via A/EX for appropriate action.

During the President's recent trip, I became aware that the lead White House advance, Dan Morris, did not hold a security clearance. I confirmed this via Ed Hickey's office. The following day he was granted the "equivalent" of a TS clearance. Dan's four volunteer helpers, however, did not hold any clearances. Although Dan said they would not need a clearance, they worked within the White House and NSC staff offices.

It would be appreciated if this security clearance situation could be passed to an appropriate office for coordination with the White House.

Last but not least, it might be helpful for our colleagues abroad if, prior to an advance arrival, a cable could be sent to involved posts specifically stating which persons

do not hold a security clearance. At least this would cause the White House to focus on this issue and perhaps prevent embarrassing situations such as London was faced with when Dan Morris was temporarily taken off the C&R access list for classified traffic.

SUBJECT: UTILIZATION OF MILITARY AIDES  
IN PREVIOUS ADMINISTRATIONS

I have spoken with Terry O'Donnell and Steve Bull with regard to how the Nixon and Ford Administrations utilized Military Aides.

Basically, the duties they perform today are similiar to what they did in the previous administrations with a couple of exceptions.

- 1) The Military Aides would be tasked with the coordination of visitsof foreign dignataries less than heads of state when they would meet with the President. It was their responsibility to act as a liaison with State Protocol.
- 2) The Military Aides would always be very visible at all functions and ceremonies in the White House. During political functions they would take more of a low-key position.
- 3) There were times that the President would goto Camp David without staff. In this case, the Aide would act as a civilian staff member and coordinate all visitors and events for the President during his stay.
- 4) The Military Aides would divide up their areas of responsibilities:
  - a) Naval Aide would handle Camp David and the Presidential yacht
  - b) Air Force Aide would handle Air Force I
  - c) Army Aide handled all military ceremonies at the White House
- 5) One point they both agreed on was that the selection process of the Aides is very important. Due to his close proximity to the President and his staff, personality plays a great part in his job performance. An Aide must be flexible.

I refer to your letter to Mr. Michael K. Deaver dated February 13, 1982, regarding financial reimbursement to the Santa Barbara County Sheriff's Department for expenditures in assisting the Secret Service during the President's visits to his ranch.


The White House and the Secret Service are acutely aware of the financial burdens placed on local and state governments during Presidential visits and certainly share your concerns. Unfortunately, the "Presidential Protective Assistance Act of 1976", Public Law 94-524, forbids disbursement of funds other than those appropriated to the Secret Service for the protection of the President and others authorized by 18 U.S.C. 3056.

The Secret Service does not have statute authority to disburse funds to local governments for support assistance except under the conditions set forth in 3 U.S.C. 202-208. Briefly, this authorizes certain reimbursements for assistance provided by cities with twenty or more foreign diplomatic missions requiring protection.

There are a number of reasons for restricting reimbursements to local governments for these types of expenditures. The protection of the President and certain other persons is a general public responsibility shared by the federal and local governments. The administration of direct reimbursements would be extremely difficult due to the many overlapping factors relating to general public safety and specific requirements during a Presidential visit. Additionally, specific legislation authorizing federal government reimbursements of this type would open the door to massive state and local claims for expenditures which would be impossible to verify.

I certainly sympathize with Santa Barbara County for the additional burden placed on their resources as the result of the President's visits. However, under the existing laws there does not appear to be any direct remedy. If you feel it would be beneficial for a representative of the Secret Service to meet with the Sheriff to further discuss the problem, please let me know.

A serious problem has developed with regard to security assistance provided to the President by the Santa Barbara County Sheriff's Department during Presidential visits to the Western White House in Santa Barbara County.

During calendar year 1981, approximately \$50,000 was expended from the County budget for Sheriff's Department costs directly attributable to Presidential security assistance. It is estimated that the cost to the Sheriff's Department is approximately \$1,000 for each day President Reagan is in residence at his Ranch; if the President travels from the Ranch during his stay, that cost accelerates to \$5,000 per day.

It is obvious that costs of this magnitude cannot be borne by a County Department for very long. In fact, for fiscal year 82-83, the Sheriff's Department has been instructed to cut its budget an additional five percent over last year's budget.

Recently, the Sheriff's Department requested reimbursement for security assistance costs. Enclosed is a copy of the letter of refusal received from the General Accounting Office. I have spoken with Sheriff John Carpenter about the seriousness of the situation. The Sheriff has explained that although they enjoy a close working relationship with the Secret Service, and in the past have been more than willing to be of assistance by way of providing intelligence information (the Department maintains and monitors a voluminous intelligence file), making arrests, maintaining security, and the like, it appears that if these costs are not reimbursable by the United States government, these services can no longer be made available.

The residents of my District are very proud of the fact that President and Mrs. Reagan have selected Santa Barbara County as their home, and I am sure the President would agree that his Santa Barbara neighbors have afforded he and Mrs. Reagan as much privacy as is possible. The security and privacy available to President and Mrs. Reagan is a direct result of the outstanding work done by the Santa Barbara County Sheriff's Department.

We find ourselves faced with a unique situation. In all other instances, when the President visits a particular region of our country, he does so as an invited guest and it is incumbent upon the host region to underwrite the costs of local protection while the President is in the area. In this instance, however, Rancho Camino Cielo is the President's home. During 1981, he made six trips to his Ranch.

Obviously, we want the President to visit his Ranch as often as possible. However, in order to do so it is imperative that adequate security assistance be available. The County of Santa Barbara can no longer afford to make that assistance available.

I would appreciate the opportunity to discuss this matter with you further in hopes that an equitable solution to this problem may be forthcoming.


Dear Mr. Carpenter:

Your claim for reimbursement for additional expenses incurred by your Department while providing security assistance at the Western White House during Presidential visits from November through May 1981 is disallowed.

The United States Secret Service, Treasury Department is authorized to protect the person of the President of the United States, the members of his immediate family, the President-elect, the Vice-President or other Officials next in order of succession to the Office of Presidency, and the Vice-President-elect, and the members of their immediate families unless the members decline such protection. See 18 U.S.C. 3056. Also, section 8 of Public Law 94-524 known as the "Presidential Protection Assistance Act of 1976" provides that no funds may be expended or obligated for the purpose of carrying out the purposes of section 3056 of Title 18, United States Code, and section 1 of Public Law 90-331 other than funds specifically appropriated to the Secret Service for those purposes with the exception of expenditures made by the Department of Defense or the Coast Guard, which will not have to be reimbursed, and expenditures made by executive departments and agencies, which will be reimbursed by the Secret Service.

Since funds for the protection of the President clearly must come from the Secret Service and not from appropriated funds, we may not authorize payment of your claim.
