SUBJECT:

Presidential Press Conferences

As you requested, we have researched the number of Press Conferences conducted by recent Presidents.

Although some data is available, we have found that the criteria used to define a "Press Conference" varies significantly with different Administrations. Presidents Kennedy, Nixon and Carter appear to have defined a "Press Conference" as a formal question/answer session called with advance notice and open to all members of the White House Press Corps. These were held in formal settings such as the East Room, 450 OEOB or the State Department.

Presidents Johnson and Ford used more latitude in their definitions of a Press Conference. President Johnson counted impromptu sessions in which he walked around the White House grounds while answering reporters' questions. President Ford counted question/answer sessions while out on the road as Press Conferences.

The following is a list of the number of Press Conferences of every President since John Kennedy using the criteria that they each applied in defining "Press Conferences."

It should also be noted that Ronald Reagan did 34 mini-press conferences. However, Jimmy Carter held 65 question/answer sessions with groups of reporters in addition to his formal Press Conferences.

Also of significance is the fact that Ronald Reagan has given 175 interviews since he has been in office. Jimmy Carter is a distant second to him with a total of 46 interviews while in office.

Jeremiah O'Leary of The Washington Times attended an off-the-record reception for members of the White House Press Corps.

Additionally, reporters from The Washington Times were included in the Air Force One Press Pool on August 11, 1982, January 26, 1983, and August 1, 1983.

In addition to these recorded contacts, it is possible that on an unscheduled basis, a member of the Senior Staff could have taken James Whelan into the Oval Office. Although these unscheduled meetings are usually included in the Presidential Diary, a brief spontaneous meeting may not have been recorded.

Dear Mike,

I enclose for your information details of a women's group I am forming in Canada. The name of this organization will be "ENTENTE" (an International Understanding For Group Action). The hasis of the organization will be the Parliamentary Spouses Association of Canada and the Congressional Club of America. I have contacted Mr. William Gressman of the State Department, Faith Whittlesey, Sherry Cooksey and Pam Bailey concerning this organization, to ensure that I proceed in the proper manner with regard to mu position as an amhassador's wife.

I have been advised by all that they are most enthusiastic that I pursue this idea, and I seek your approval to ask Mrs. Reagan if she would be the honorary chairwoman. I would like to have the next Prime Minister of Canada's wife as the Canadian honorary chairwoman.

As it now appears, the Canadian elections will probably take place in September or early October, and consequently I would like to have the official founding of "ENCENCE" in early to mid-October. I have asked Faith Whittlesey if she would kindly come to Ottawa to speak to the founding group, but have yet to determine the exact date.

The purpose of this organization is hasically non-partisan, but I believe that having Mrs. Reagan as honorary

chairwoman would greatly enhance its possibility of success.

I originally thought of this organization with regard to the President's North American Accord, which I have always believed was a concept that we should continue to pursue. I had hoped to include Mexico in the group, but think that perhaps I would be encroaching on a country that I am not directly involved with. However, if Mrs. Reagan would like to approach this organization from the standpoint of "ENCENCE" encompassing the three countries, I think it would greatly add to its effectiveness to have the members of this organization directly involved with the North American Accord. I leave that entirely to Mrs. Reagan's discretion.

I will he calling Sherry Cooksey again, hopefully after I hear from you with regard to your approval, and will then proceed to see if somehow we can ensure that this women's group will he representative of the Reagan administration. My efforts to form this group are entirely for the President and for our hopefully heing able to export a dialogue on the positive aspects of the democratic system. Hopefully, it could also enhance the concept of women being more directly involved in the Reagan administration.

As I know you are terribly husy with the election, I only ask that you or someone from your staff provide Mrs. Reagan with some hackground on this organization before I write to her personally. I shall contact you later with more details, and until then send you and your family my very best wishes.



Here's my follow-up to our telephone conversation on Monday.

NBC News is already planning and preparing two prime-time hours on the Republican ticket and the Democratic ticket to be broadcast in September, 1984.

The executive producer of the two broadcasts is Bob Rogers and the senior producer is John Holland. I will be the correspondent.

The broadcasts will be major undertakings by NBC News and will be serious, informative, and interesting contributions to the political campaign.

I would like to be able to interview separately President Reagan and Vice-President Bush as soon after the Dallas convention as possible and in any place reachable by land, sea or air.

In addition, we would like access to the White House and the Executive Office Building for a day or two so that our informal pictures of President Reagan and Vice-President Bush would be fresh and not re-worked footage from the library.

An early response would be very helpful to me.

I need not tell you -- but I will -- how much I hope your reply will be an affirmative one.

The Interview Request Meeting Today

The following is a synopsis of the requests we discussed this morning:

- . Larry Speakes will check further into the two Dallas papers and get back to us.
- . We have agreed to do the proposed luncheons and cocktail sessions.
- . We agreed to do the two (2) TV interviews on the 19th of August, and to continue to work with Jim Lake on the interviews by other spokespersons at the Convention.
- . We agreed there would be a color news writer with the President at the Convention and we are looking at George Skelton.
- . We agreed that the President would do the color interview with Hugh Sidey at the Convention.
- . We approved the concept of the interview with 22 stations and 5 interviews prior to the Convention with the location of the 5 interviews to be decided after campaign input.
- . We approved the Ladies Home Journal request and to have speechwriters charged to write it.
- . We approved the Nation's Business request with the speechwriters writing it.
- . We agreed that you would continue to consider the Barbara Walters request as it's after the campaign.
