

My dear Lucky:

Thank you for your sweet note. As always, it was a delight to spend time with you and especially being able to deliver up the glories of the Four Seasons for the first time.

As we discussed, I am the current Chairman of the International Chapter of the Young Presidents' Organization. This Chapter has a limit of 60 members out of a total YPO membership of several thousand. It is a group of exceptional business people, both men and women who have achieved substantial success under the age of forty.

President Reagan was kind enough to have this group to the White House for cocktails on October 4th or 5th of 1982. It was clearly a remarkable experience for all of us and revealed the President to be as charming, bright and committed as any of us could have ever hoped. He is, indeed, the sort of person one dreams of having to dinner!

Which brings me to my point. We are planning an International Chapter meeting in New York for May of 1985. 

SUBJECT : Gift of Painting for the President's Trip to
China

I approached Andrew Wyeth through his wife, Betsy, and he has agreed to make available one of his works for President Reagan to take to China as a gift from the American people to the Chinese people.

If he donates it outright however, there is a problem:

Artists cannot take a tax deduction if they give their own works to charity. I have looked into the status of a law at the Treasury Department which is designed to correct this serious inadequacy which discriminates against painters, sculptors, and other artists. Leonard Silverstein, an expert on this subject, tells me that there is no way to get around the present law and the future correction is no where near conclusion.

Mr. Silverstein volunteered to get a group of buyers together to raise the money to purchase a Wyeth at a reduced price to be negotiated with the Wyeth family. He would only do this if the President and Mrs. Reagan really wanted him to.

The other alternative is to have a museum give a painting and have it replaced by other means to wit:

There is a museum in Greenville, South Carolina which has the largest numbers of Wyeths in the country. If they would give one perhaps a group of people could get together and buy another one from the Wyeths to replace the one given by the museum.

A Wyeth today might sell for upwards of \$300,000. If sold through his agent in New York, the agent would take one-third. Wyeth, himself, would realize \$200,000. If in addition Wyeth wished to make a special price for this one occasion, perhaps the price could be reduced to \$150,000 depending on the picture and the size of it. This means that Mr. Silverstein

might have to raise \$150,000 or more. I see two problems:

- a) Could a group of "rich" friends buying a painting for the President to give cause a certain amount of backlash similar to the redecorating of the White House?
- b) Would the President and Mrs. Reagan really want to be beholden to anyone for this particular donation?

My own feeling is that it would be preferable to have the museum in Greenville or the Brandywine Museum in Pennsylvania give a painting that the President can take to China. This way the gift comes from the museum. If a group of private citizens wish to replace that gift later with another Wyeth that is their business and it need not be publicly acknowledged.

Obviously, the only other possibility is for Mr. Wyeth to give a painting outright without this roundabout method. But in my conversations with Mrs. Wyeth I do not get the feeling that he is prepared to do so because it represents an enormous financial sacrifice to them.

Would you instruct me as to what should be my next move.

Tiffany Chippendale Tray

A sterling silver tray engraved with the outline of the U.S. and Hawaii. A star and city name mark each stop on the Premier's schedule. The tray is placed in a blue presentation case with Presidential Seal.

A personally inscribed photograph of the President and First Lady in a blue leather frame with the Presidential Seal in gold leaf.

For Premier Zhao and his family:

Appalachian Spring "Log Cabin Pattern Quilt"

Red, white and blue, 100% cotton quilt. The pattern imitates the construction of the first shelters built by the colonists of America. The quilt blocks for the Log Cabin pattern are composed of a square center patch surrounded by strips of material or "logs", which overlap at the corners in much the same way log cabins were built. The center patch of each block is red to symbolize the hearth as the heart of the center of the home.

In our inventory we have a beautiful old-fashioned red, white and blue quilt--an excellent example of American handicraft. I suggest that we give this on one of two occasions.

- 1) As a gift to Premier Zhao in January (to take back to his wife and family since they are not coming) as a gift from Mrs. Reagan.
- 2) Or, for the Reagans to take with them on the trip to China as a possible gift for one of the top wives there.

My preference would be to give it here since we do not have much in the way of gifts in January, and we are saving our most dramatic efforts for April.

RECOMMENDATION

That we give the quilt in January to Premier Zhao to take back to his wife and family.

The following is background on giving an animal to the Chinese.

In February of 1972 a pair of musk oxen was given to the people of the People's Republic of China by the President and the people of the United States. Musk oxen were chosen as they are strong animals and not indigenous to China.

My office has spoken with Dr. Ted Reed, former director of the National Zoo and current advisor to the zoo; his suggestions are as follows:

Pair of American Bald Eagles

there are no eagles in China and while we don't have too many here in the U.S., they are abundant in Canada. Dr. Reed thinks we could obtain a pair easily.

American Bison

hardy animal and not too hard to obtain

Mountain Lion

Bear

either a grisly or a Kodiak. they do have a bear at the Peking zoo -- from Russia. Dr. Reed's only concern about a bear is that it is the symbol of the USSR.

David Deer

now extinct in China. they do have at least one in the Peking Zoo. might be nice to give them a pair.

Musk Ox

we might like to send another male as "Milton" died a few years after being given in 1972.

Dr. Reed was concerned about the timing of transporting any animal to China preferring not to send one in January. He felt that April would be the soonest as the trip is hard enough on the animal let alone the cold weather.

Please let me know your thoughts on this.

I had this tucked away when we went to California and have recently discussed it with Mrs. Roosevelt.
