



# International Symposium on Single Photon Ultra Short-Lived Radionuclides

The objective of this Symposium is to define the current role and state-of-the-art of development and clinical applications of generator produced single photon ultra short-lived radionuclides (USRN).

During recent years there has been a significant increase in interest in this area. Advantages of USRN include the following:

- Significantly lower radiation dose to patients
- Improved studies with high photon flux
- · Possibility of repeat studies or rapid sequential studies
- · Possibility of multiple radionuclide examinations within a short time

This Symposium will emphasize the phases of generator production, quality controls, dosimetry, instrumentations and clinical applications of USRN. Prinicipal focus will be on the Ir-191m, Au-195m and Kr-81m radionuclide generators. The sessions are designed to encourage active participation and discussion.


