Appointment Request for the President: Subject: Samuel K. Doe, Head of State of the Republic of Liberia

Samuel Doe, Head of State of the Republic of Liberia since April 1980, has asked to meet with the President in Washington in May following official visits to South Korea, the PRC and the Philippines. In view of our strategic assets in Liberia, Doe's admiration for the President and his sensitivity at having been refused a meeting with the President last year, we strongly recommend that you approve a working visit and that an appointment with the President be arranged.

Liberia, our oldest and closest friend in black Africa, has the only airport in West Africa to which we have unquestioned military access. It is the site of a major diplomatic communications station, one of three VOA transmitter sites on the continent, and a navigation installation. These are valued at over \$300 million. The second largest block of American private investment in black Africa also is found in Liberia. These interests appeared jeopardized by Libyan and Soviet efforts to turn Liberia away from the West following a coup in 1980, but Doe acted firmly, expelling the Libyans and reducing the Soviet presence in Liberia. Doe has consistently adopted pro-Western policies. Liberia broke ranks with other OAU members to abstain in the Golan Heights special UNGA vote. Doe deeply admires the President and regards him as a father figure.

Liberia has become a prime example of the Administration's commitment to support our friends in Africa and draw the line against Libyan expansionism. The overthrow of the pro-Western, anti-Libyan Limann government in Ghana has increased Doe's security concerns. We need to buoy his spirits and resolve.





A visit to the U.S. and a brief meeting with the President will help achieve this objective. The United States has adopted a high profile in Liberia, greatly increasing our bilateral assistance in the form of a special Economic Support Fund, PL-480 food aid, and concessional military assistance, all totaling an estimated \$80 million for FY 1982.

The Doe government has made substantial progress in recent months in both the political and economic spheres. Doe has publicly announced a firm date for return to civilian rule, released all political prisoners and made a series of cabinet changes to bring in more capable ministers. The improvement in the Liberian human rights record over the past several months should allay possible criticism of a meeting from self-exiled Liberians and American friends of the former regime. On the economic front, the Doe government has undertaken tough austerity measures and has the best record in Africa on compliance with the IMF.

Doe requested a meeting with the President last fall. He was deeply disappointed at our inability to arrange one. This became a serious irritant in our relations and was finally alleviated only when he met with the Secretary of State in Cairo in November. A further rebuff to Doe would certainly do grave damage to our bilateral relations and play into the hands of leftist elements seeking to reduce Western influence in Liberia.

A meeting between the President and Doe would highlight our commitment to a close African friend and would allow us to emphasize at a high level our views on a number of pressing bilateral economic and political issues.

Recommendation:

That the President agree to a working visit by Doe to Washington in mid-May, including a 30-minute office call on the President.

During his 16 months in power Doe and his government have thwarted three countercoups, the latest of which resulted in the execution of Doe's vice head of state and four other members of the ruling People's Redemption Council on 14 August 1981.

During the past year Doe has traveled to Tanzania, Ethiopia, Guinea and Sudan. In June 1981 he attended summits of the Economic Community of West African States in Sierra Leone and of the Organization of African Unity in Kenya. Doe praises Liberia's relationship with the United States; he has significantly reduced his country's diplomatic ties to the Soviet Union, Libya and Cuba.

Doe is a member of the Krahn tribe from southern Liberia. He left high school in the llth grade and enlisted in the Army. After receiving basic and advanced noncommissioned officer training, he took combat and advanced infantry courses from a US Special Forces unit in Liberia during January-August 1979. Doe is married; he and his wife, Nancy, have two children.



State advises in a memo to you that the Chief of State of Liberia, Sam Doe, has once again requested a meeting with the President (he asked and was turned down last year). (C)

Doe will visit the U.S. on a private visit beginning 16 May, and would like to come to Washington. State strongly recommends that he be granted a working visit and be given a 30-minute meeting with the President. (C)

I fully agree with State's argumentation and recommendation. Liberia under Doe is the most pro-U.S. government in Africa and the most susceptible to our influence. We also have real strategic interests in Liberia (for example, it has the only airfield in Africa from which we could stage aircraft on a no-question-asked basis). Finally, for all his admiration of the President and pro-U.S. feeling, Doe is very young (30) and in some ways politically immature. It is quite possible that another turndown might provoke a serious reaction in him which would do real damage to our access and interests in Liberia. (C)

If it came to choosing between the Doe request and the Ahidjo (Cameroons) request, I would clearly rate Doe the more important to us. State, of course, would like both. (C)

There is one (I believe small) downside to a meeting. Black American opinion leaders are ambivolent towards him; many were connected or sympathetic to the regime he overthrew.

RECOMMENDATION:

That you sign the attached memo to Mike Deaver (Tab I) supporting the State request for a Presidential meeting with Liberia's Chairman Doe.

Schedule Outline: Proposed Presidential Meeting with SUBJECT: Liberian Chief of State Chairman Samuel Doe (U)

At Tab B is a State Department memorandum recommending that the President meet with Liberian Chief of State Chairman Samuel Doe for 30 minutes during his private U.S. visit beginning 16 May 1982. State also requests that Chairman Doe's Washington visit be granted "working visit" status.

I support this request, schedule permitting, for the following reasons:

-- The U.S. has a special relationship with Liberia, both historically and in real terms. We have several important facilities in Liberia and Liberia is a beneficiary of major Administration aid efforts.

-- Liberia under Chairman Doe has been our strongest ally and supporter in Black Africa.

-- A turndown of this second request by Chairman Doe (he requested a meeting last year and was refused) could conceivably alienate this young (30) leader and damage our interests. (C)

There is one downside to a Doe meeting. Although Chairman Doe has ameliorated his authoritarian rule considerably and, in response to U.S. pressure, released most if not all political prisoners, he did take over the government in a bloody coup in 1979. The predecessor regime had close and longstanding contacts with Black American society, and Doe is not popular with many Black American opinion leaders. However, many Black Americans do support the concept of a special U.S. relationship with Liberia. 🚫

RECOMMENDATION:

That you approve the request and forward the Schedule Outline (Tab A) to Greg Newell for scheduling on the President's calendar.

Subject: Appointment Request for the President: Samuel K. Doe, Head of State of the Republic of Liberia

Liberian Head of State Samuel Doe has enthusiastically accepted the President's invitation to pay an official working visit to Washington, but was unable to take up either of the two dates offered because of commitments he could not break (a Far East visit and Liberian National Day). He did, however, express a strong desire to come as soon as possible. We believe a date in September or early October would be well received and enhance relations with the pro-Western government. Doe's inability last year to meet with the President, who he greatly admires and regards as a father figure, created strains in our relationship which took several months to overcome. Our inability to agree soon on a date for him to visit the U.S. will damage our relationship and play into the hands of leftist elements seeking to reduce Western influence in Liberia.

Liberia, our oldest and closest friend in black Africa, has consistently adopted pro-Western positions on international issues. The Doe government has released all political prisoners and committed itself to a firm date for return to civilian rule. It has the best record in Africa of compliance with an IMF program. A meeting between Doe and the President would highlight the Administration's commitment to our friends in Africa and demonstrate our support for a leader who is adamantly opposed to Libyan adverturism and Soviet blandishments.

DOE ALSO HOPED TO MEET WITH SECRETARY HAIG AND UN SECGEN CUELLAR. DOE WILL ALSO BE VISITING THE PRC, SOUTH KOREA AND THE PHILIPPINES ON THIS SAME TRIP. THE AMBASSADOR UNDERTOOK TO REPORT DOE'S REQUEST TO WASHINGTON. THIS MESSAGE PROVIDES OUR RATIONALE IN SUPPORT OF DOE'S REQUEST. END SUMMARY.

HE ALSO RECALLED THE EARLIER FAILURE OF DOE TO BE RECEIVED AT THE WHITE HOUSE. IT WOULD BE EXTREMELY EMBARRASSING AND DIFFICULT TO EXPLAIN TO THE LIBERIAN PEOPLE SHOULD DOE AGAIN BE REBUFFED.

The State Department recommended several weeks ago that you exercise your authority under Section 614.a. of the Foreign Assistance Act to reprogram \$14.9 million of the \$20 million ESF money earmarked for Nicaragua for assistance to Liberia. All agencies agree on the urgency of this assistance for Liberia. Congressman Zablocki has indicated his desire to provide more than the remaining \$5.1 million of the money earmarked for Nicaragua to Nicaragua. This would mean of course less for Liberia. The State Department recommends, however, that we proceed to reprogram the \$14.9 million for Liberia and seek to convince Congressman Zablocki that Nicaragua can only absorb \$5.1 million.


