SUBJECT: Liberia: Chairman Doe's Pique at US

FRED WETTERING

On May 12 the Washington Post ran a piece by Leon Dash on Liberia. In the article, the US ambassador (Bill Swing) was described as virtually the US viceroy who instructs Doe. This article, combined with the pressure Doe has been getting from us on return to constitutional rule, apparently caused Doe to lose his temper. (S)

Last Friday he attempted to telephone the President, with the purpose of complaining about the ambassador - and was not put through. This irritated him further (although it was a good call not to put the phone call through). (S)

According to veteran Liberia watchers, this will probably blow over in a few weeks. Meanwhile, both State According have instructed their people to cool it for a few weeks. (S)

## SUBJECT: Liberia: Telephone Call from Head of State Doe to the President

Liberian Head of State Samuel Doe's attempt to telephone the President on May 12 was apparently sparked by Doe's discomforture over recent newspaper articles, including one in the <u>Washington Post</u>, insinuating the U.S. is exercising undue influence over events in Liberia. Doe, who has great respect for the President and regards him as a father-figure, wanted his personal reassurance that the U.S. respects Liberia's sovereignty and dignity. Despite Doe's excellent relations with U.S. Ambassador William Swing, Doe was reluctant to raise the matter with him since it is through Swing that much of the U.S. influence in Liberia is exercised. Doe did, however, call Swing in on May 16 and, in the presence of another member of the People's Redemption Council (PRC), reprimanded him for the <u>Washington Post</u> article and for what Doe called his "aggressive" political activity.

Doe's actions were designed to accomplish a variety of objectives: assuage his own bruised ego; reassure himself of U.S. good intentions; put us on notice that there are limits even to a client state relationship; and save face with his PRC peers. Although Doe's pique may result in cooled relations for several weeks, we remain confident that over the longer term our bilateral relationship will remain healthy and the United States will continue to play a constructive role in Liberian political and economic affairs. If this breach worsens, however, we might want to recommend a Presidential letter or envoy which would probably go a long way toward repairing any continuing strain in relations.

SUBJECT: Africa: Short Term Trends and Developments

The following is my brief analysis of certain short term trends and developments in Africa arising from recent intelligence.

Africa/US: Occasionally it is useful to note instances of effective US diplomacy and policy payoff. I cite the following for your attention:

Madagascar: The Foreign Minister told us that he had instructed the Madagascar UN Rep to "stay away" from the Nicaragua debate at the UNSC in deference to our sensitivities.

Zimbabwe: The Zimbabwe UN Ambassador made a 180 degree turnaround and gave a moderate, non-polemic speech (Jeane, please take note). His speech was re-written here by the Zimbabwe Embassy following some candid talk from State and myself.

Cape Verde: As one minor point in the Libyan arms to Nicaragua stuck in Brazil incident, the Cape Verde government denied overflight and landing rights not only to the initial group of Libyan aircraft, but also denied subsequent requests from Tripoli. Kudos both to State and the Vice President, who briefed them on Libyan activities.

Central African Republic: State can share credit with the French for the expulsion of the 75 Libyan military advisors from the CAR. Both in Bangui and in WDC State officials have been beating on CAR representatives on this matter.

South Africa: A bomb explosion today in Pretoria killed several (during rush hour). If whites were killed, and it is likely, South Africa will be strongly inclined to retaliate against the ANC (the likely perpetrators), meaning a cross-border raid into a neighboring country. Some of theorize that this incident may have been directed by the Soviets to provoke just this type of reaction in order to screw up the Angola/Namibia talks. (S)

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Southern Africa Initiative: The UNSC begins debate on Namibia on May 23. French Foreign Minister Cheysson doublecrossed his own people and us and cancelled a Contact Group understanding, complicating our collective defense at the UNSC. Cheysson will neither associate nor disassociate France with the Contact Group and the Angolan talks. Cheysson also threatened to go to New York if Secretary Shultz did. Likely no foreign minister will now go from the Contact Group. It is possible that the CG foreign ministers will informally discuss this matter further at the Williamsburg Summit.

Kenya: President Moi continues to blunder and commit actions which destabilize Kenya. His latest gaffe is to claim that "a foreign power" is working with a high-placed Kenyan"traitor" to depose him. The implication was heavy that the power was the UK and the individual was the powerful Constitutional Affairs Minister Njonjo. A claque of Moi sycophants has seized on this to settle personal scores, especially against senior Kikuyu tribals. Moi has backed away from naming the "traitor" and has called for elections in September, noting that all critics will be replaced. The trend here is that Moi has opened the door to a host of anti-Kikuyu moves, and the Kikuyu factions are beginning to talk to one another. They have the real capability of overthrowing Moi if they perceive a common threat. Meanwhile, Moi continues to fudge on important economic reforms, and Kenya will likely fall out of IMF compliance next month. Moi is also showing pique that the US and UK are not giving him blank cheques to resolve his economic problems. We have a growing problem here, and talks with our Ambassador (Harrop) are scheduled next week in which I will participate. (SU

Angola/Cubans: State analysts have formally concluded that reports of major Cuban reinforcements to Angola are not true, and they speculate that these reports may be a conscious disinformation by pro-Soviet elements to upset the West. (3)

<u>Ghana/US</u>: Intelligence indicates that Ghana leader Jerry Rawlings has a tape recording of an alleged meeting between US diplomats and Ghanaian opposition elements plotting to overthrow Rawlings. The tape is a forgery, but Rawlings believes it. It is probably yet another East German or Soviet disinformation piece (the East Germans recently surfaced a forged West German diplomatic message which was accepted by the Rawlings regime as legitimate despite denials and proofs to the contrary).

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<u>Chad</u>: Habre forces lost 300 men and 21 vehicles in an abortive attack at a Libyan-supported dissident stronghold in the far north of Chad. There is to date no indication that the dissidents have followed up their successful defense, though, and foreign supporters of Habre appear to be making up materiel losses. The skirmish between Habre forces in the west on Lake Chad with Nigerian army units continues, despite formal agreements between governments to stand down. The Nigerian army, sore at losses, seems to be somewhat out of control for the moment and is seizing a few islands to salvage national honor.

Upper Volta/Libya: The putsch by President Ouedraogo of pro-Libyan Prime Minister Sankara and his supporters seems to be holding, and Ouedraogo has not started PNGing Libyans. There is some concern about two Libyan 707 flights to neighboring Ghana in the last two days and fear that Libya may run some guns and money up to stiffen the one remaining pro-Libyan unit not yet subdued. It seems unlikely, though, given the chaos in Ghana. (S)

Sudan: Loyal government troops, who are also black southerners, have suppressed two mutinies of two companies of troops in the south. The troops mutinied rather than be transferred. The situation is not acute, but shows a steady deterioration of central government control (and feel for southern sensibilities) in the south.

Equatorial Guinea: A coup plot was discovered and broken up by loyal forces. Details are lacking, but at first look there appears to be no outside involvement.

Zambia/USSR: A Soviet delegation led by a major general broke off talks in Zambia and flew home early. The Soviets were attempting to press the Zambians to repay arms debts - the Zambians have refused, citing the economic crisis.

Zimbabwe: Prime Minister Mugabe cancelled a scheduled trip to the USSR when he learned he would not be received by Andropov. Embassy Harare notes that Mugabe has declined to travel to Havana despite a year-old invitation and the Cubans have not replaced their ambassador (vacant for a year). A Zimbabwe high-level private business delegation will be touring the US in early June (I will meet them). They will carry the message that private enterprise is alive and well in Zimbabwe. (S)

Angola/USSR: Angolan leader dos Santos continues to get the red carpet treatment in Moscow. His level of reception was unique for a third world speaker, being received by Andropov, Ustinov, Tikhonov, Ponomarev, and the entire Secretariat.

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As one analyst put it to me, not only the whole first team but much of the second as well. Meanwhile, Savimbi's UNITA forces are on a tear, scoring repeated new successes in recent weeks.

France/Libya: Doubtless motivated by Libyan actions in Chad and Upper Volta, the French have come to us breathlessly noting that the Libyans seem to be working against our collective interests, and that we should do something. At the same time, Cheysson and Penne are spreading the canard that the fault is ours since we are still purchasing Libyan oil, thus bankrolling Qadhafi. A series of bilateral consultations on Libya are scheduled, but I have small hope that anything positive will come from them. (S)



#### MEMORANDUM OF CONVERSATION

On June 3, 1983, Mr. Robert Moretti, a California businessman with interests in Liberia, and a close confidante of Liberian Chairman Doe, called me to discuss Chairman Doe's recent pique at the U.S. This pique was directed at the U.S. Ambassador, primarily (according to Mr. Moretti) because the U.S. Embassy was "pushing Doe too hard" to implement his pledge of the return to constitutional rule in 1985. Doe's irritation was increased when he attempted to telephone the President and was unable to get through. Mr. Moretti asked what was my reading of the situation and what could he tell Doe on his return?

I explained to Mr. Moretti that my reading of the current situation was that Chairman Doe had calmed down; that he had a very useful meeting with Ambassador Swing which seemed to have allayed local tensions, and that I did not think anything further from our end was called for.

I further noted that if appropriate I would explain to Chairman Doe that with no reflection against our close relationship with him, we do not do business by telephone. I suggested that if Chairman Doe had an urgent thought he wished to get to the President he could do this in one of several ways:

- -- Pass it to the U.S. Embassy
- -- Pass it to his ambassador in Washington for delivery
- -- Send a special emissary

I reaffirmed that if Chairman Doe wrote to the President he could be certain of a response if one was called for.

Mr. Moretti indicated that one thing that Chairman Doe wanted a reading on was whether the White House would look with approval if he chose to run for the Presidency in 1985. I stated that the most important thing was the fulfillment of the Chairman's pledge towards returning to constitutional rule in 1985. While I was unable to predict the President's reaction on this I felt that, speaking personally, I did not see any insurmountable obstacles to this as long as proper constitutional forums and procedures were followed. I stressed, however, that this was strictly my view and should not be regarded as a definitive USG view.

Mrs. Nancy Doe, wife of Liberian head of state Samuel Doe, will be in the U.S. on a private visit during the period 15-30 June 1983. She will be in Washington June 21-23 and would like to pay a courtesy call on Mrs. Reagan while here, if possible on June 22. (C)

SUBJECT: Request for a Courtesy Call on Mrs. Reagan by Mrs. Nancy Doe, Wife of Liberian Head of State

Mrs. Nancy Doe, wife of Liberian Head of State Samuel Doe, will be in the US on a private visit during the period June 15-30. In coordination with the Phelps-Stokes Fund, she will visit New York, Washington, and Chicago. Mrs. Doe will be in Washington June 21-23. The Liberian Embassy has told us she would like to pay a courtesy call on Mrs. Reagan while in Washington, if possible on June 22.

The State Department fully supports this request. Liberia, founded by freed American slaves in 1822, is our oldest and closest friend in Africa. The Doe Liberian government is as pro-American as its predecessor. The largest concentration of US government assets on the continent is located in Liberia, including a major Voice of America transmitter, a Coast Guard navigation station and a diplomatic telecommunications facility serving nearly thirty US embassies. The country also hosts the second largest block of US private investment in black Africa, centered in iron ore and rubber, and is one of our major African trading partners. Liberia uses the U.S. dollar as its official currency and most US owned merchant shipping flies the Liberian flag.

The State Department believes it would be entirely appropriate for Mrs. Reagan to receive Mrs. Doe, the First Lady of an African nation with which we have extremely close relations.

### Background and Talking Points for Mrs. Reagan's meeting with Mrs. Doe on June 23, 1983 at 11:00 A.M.

Mrs. Nancy Doe, wife of Liberian Head of State Samuel K. Doe, is in the U.S. on a private visit through July 3. She arrived in Washington on June 21. She will also spend time in New York, Washington, and Los Angeles. This is Mrs. Doe's first trip to the U.S. She did not accompany her husband during his official working visit last year when he met with President Reagan. The meeting with Mrs. Reagan will be the highlight of Mrs. Doe's trip and will reaffirm to the Liberians their "special relationship" with the United States. It is important to note Samuel Doe has great respect for President Reagan and sees him as a "father figure".

Relations between the United States and Liberia have been close since the founding of Liberia by freed American slaves in the early 19th century. Liberia supports the U.S. closely on all major international and regional issues. It hosts the largest concentration of U.S. government assets in Africa, including a Voice of American transmission and relay station, a telecommunications relay facility that services many of our African diplomatic posts, and a Coast Guard navigation station. Liberia provides the U.S. guaranteed military access to its port and international airport, the only country in West Africa to do so. In addition, American companies have invested approximately \$300 million in Liberia, and more than 3,000 Americans reside there.

U.S. Liberian relations were strained following the 1980 coup. The new government, consisting of inexperienced military enlisted men and pre-coup opposition political figues, was initially ambivalent toward the U.S., but strong U.S. support generated a pro-American response. Our heavy involvement with Liberian efforts to rebuild the country's economy has further strengthened relations. The Liberians now consult us closely on a wide range of domestic as well as international issues. Doe has firmly rejected overtures from the Soviet Union and Libya for warmer relations with the Eastern bloc and radical third world countries.

PLEASE NOTE: Mrs. Doe speaks accented English. Her comprehension of English is also less than complete.

#### TALKING POINTS:

-- I am delighted to have a chance to meet with you on your first trip to the U.S.

-- I was impressed to learn that, in addition to seeing something of our country, you are visiting hospitals and playgrounds for children, as well as charitable organizations such as the United Way.

-- Clearly the "special relationship" between Liberia and the United States extends to such fundamental values as the care and development of children.

-- I have been told you have done a great deal for children in Liberia through your support for projects such as day care, homes for indigent children, and the construction of playgrounds.

-- I also understand you plan to establish a women's program to help retarded children. There is such a great need for that kind of help throughout the world.

(Note-Mrs. Doe might indicate a need for money for some of these activities, particularly the playgrounds. If so, you might respond:

-- I am aware of the great need for funds for worthwhile activities of this kind. I understand that our Embassy in Monrovia has made a number of suggestions on possible ways to achieve your goals.)

-- Could you tell me something about your children? I understood they range in age from two to eight.

### Background and Talking Points for Mrs. Reagan's meeting with Mrs. Doe on June 23, 1983 at 11:00 A.M.

Mrs. Nancy Doe, wife of Liberian Head of State Samuel K. Doe, is in the U.S. on a private visit through July 3. She arrived in Washington on June 21. She will also spend time in New York, Washington, and Los Angeles. This is Mrs. Doe's first trip to the U.S. She did not accompany her husband during his official working visit last year when he met with President Reagan. The meeting with Mrs. Reagan will be the highlight of Mrs. Doe's trip and will reaffirm to the Liberians their "special relationship" with the United States. It is important to note Samuel Doe has great respect for President Reagan and sees him as a "father figure".

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PLEASE NOTE: Mrs. Doe speaks accented English. Her comprehension of English is also less than complete.



SUBJECT: Liberia -- Renewed State Request for Meeting with Mrs. Nancy Doe, Wife of Liberian Leader Samuel Doe

State has forwarded a second request asking for your office's reconsideration of their request that Mrs. Reagan meet for 15-20 minutes with Mrs. Nancy Doe, wife of the Liberian Leader Chairman Samuel Doe during the week of June 20.

State bases this appeal on advice from our Ambassador in Liberia who noted the strong negative impact no meeting would have on our bilateral relations.

The NSC staff believes the Ambassador is correct in possible negative implications of no meeting. Chairman Doe is an autocrat, is quite young and emotional, and while he greatly admires the President, reacts badly to what he perceives as rejection. We support the request if the First Lady's schedule permits.

Jim, Bill Clark feels this is extremely important and strongly urges your reconsideration.

SUBJECT: Second Request for a Courtesy Call on Mrs. Reagan by Mrs. Nancy Doe, Wife of Liberian Head of State

As indicated in the first request (attached), Mrs. Nancy Doe, wife of Liberian Head of State Samuel Doe, will be in the US during the second half of June. She is now scheduled to arrive on June 19 and to remain until about July 1.

The Liberian Minister of State called in the US Ambassador to Liberia on June 16 to initiate a reclama of the earlier negative decision on a meeting between the two First Ladies. He made clear Mrs. Doe was fervently looking forward to paying a courtesy call on Mrs. Reagan and that Mrs. Doe had already selected a number of official gifts for Mrs. Reagan in keeping with the special friendship between our two countries. The Minister noted our good bilateral relations would be ill-served if Mrs. Reagan could not meet briefly with Mrs. Doe while the latter is in the US. He explained Mrs. Doe would alter her itinerary to accept an invitation from Mrs. Reagan any time between June 19 and July 1.

Liberians tend to be very serious and literal about the "special" relationship between our two nations. Chairman Doe has a very high regard for the President, considering him akin to a father figure. He will react negatively, with consequent strain in our relations, if his wife is unable to meet with Mrs. Reagan.

The State Department respectfully requests a reconsideration of the earlier decision. We strongly believe a 10-15 minute meeting between Mrs. Reagan and Mrs. Doe would have a positive impact on bilateral relations.

Mrs. Nancy Doe, wife of Liberian Head of State Samuel Doe, will be in the US on a private visit during the period June 15-30. In coordination with the Phelps-Stokes Fund, she will visit New York, Washington, and Chicago. Mrs. Doe will be in Washington June 21-23. The Liberian Embassy has told us she would like to pay a courtesy call on Mrs. Reagan while in Washington, if possible on June 22.

The State Department fully supports this request. Liberia, founded by freed American slaves in 1822, is our oldest and closest friend in Africa. The Doe Liberian government is as pro-American as its predecessor. The largest concentration of US government assets on the continent is located in Liberia, including a major Voice of America transmitter, a Coast Guard navigation station and a diplomatic telecommunications facility serving nearly thirty US embassies. The country also hosts the second largest block of US private investment in black Africa, centered in iron ore and rubber, and is one of our major African trading partners. Liberia uses the U.S. dollar as its official currency and most US owned merchant shipping flies the Liberian flag.

The State Department believes it would be entirely appropriate for Mrs. Reagan to receive Mrs. Doe, the First Lady of an African nation with which we have extremely close relations.

## BIOGRAPHY - George Toe Washington

## Republic of Liberia

George Toe Washington, the individual the Government of Liberia proposes as the next Liberian Ambassador to the United States, was born in Barclayville, Liberia on April 15, 1930. A career Liberian military officer from 1955 until 1971, he was the Chief of Staff of the Armed Forces of Liberia in the period 1965-70. He attained the rank of Adjutant General in 1965. In 1970-71, General Washington served as Advisor to the President of Liberia on Military Affairs. General Washington was educated in Ghana, Liberia, and the United States. He graduated from the United States Quartermaster School at Fort Lee, Virginia in 1956. He later attended the Command and General Staff College at Fort Leavenworth. He graduated there in 1964 with a Masters Degree in Military Art and Science. General Washington also studied at the University of Liberia Law School and the Liberian Foreign Service Institute. General Washington received a degree from that Institute in 1960.

During the 1970's, General Washington served the Liberian Government in a number of civilian capacities. He was the Special Assistant to the Minister of Education from 1973-1975. In 1977 General Washington was appointed Superintendent of Liberia's Kru Coast Territory. He remained in that position until 1981 when he was posted to Beijing as the Liberian Ambassador to the People's Republic of China. General Washington is presently in Beijing.

General Washington has received a number of awards and decorations from various organizations. He has been named a fellow of the International Biographic Association and has lectured on military logistics in several African nations. He holds military-related decorations from Morocco, Central African Republic, Togo, Chad, Mauritania, Tunisia, etc. General Washington was a member of the Liberian delegation to the OAU in 1976 and 1970. General Washington was president of the St. Thomas Episcopal Chapel Men from 1976-77.

A thorough search of U.S. Governments sources reveals no grounds for objection.
