Canada's complaint rests on US statements made in two multilateral bodies -- the Venice Economic Summit and the IDA pledging session of the IBRD Board of Directors. The IDA VI pledge was expressly subject to Congressional action. President Carter's subsequent participation in the Venice Summit joint statement on IDA replenishment and the World Bank and regional bank capital increases was, like all such Summit declarations, a formal political commitment but not legally binding. This commitment certainly was taken seriously by our allies who thereafter put up "bridging" funds until our contribution could be paid in.

The Venice Summit declaration, cited by Peter Towe, commits the seven to help the developing countries in energy conservation and development, expansion of exports, enhancement of human skills, and tackling their underlying food and population problems. The passage Towe particularly refers to is this: "We strongly support the general capital increase of the World Bank, increases in the funding of the regional development banks, and the sixth replenishment of the International Development Association.... It is essential that all members, especially the major donors, provide their full contributions on the agreed schedule."

The last quoted sentence was added at German insistence, frankly aimed at the United States.

The US promise to contribute 27% of IDA VI was reiterated in a negative formulation last September during the US campaign to block the seating of a PLO observer at the annual meeting of the Bank and Fund. The Secretaries of Treasury and State told many governments that their voting with us to bar the PLO was essential to obtaining Congressional passage of the IDA VI bill.

The OMB International Division did outline the IDA VI commitment history in its recent budget review documents.

AMBASSADOR'S MEETING WITH RICHARD E. ALLEN

Talking Points

1. It has come to the attention of the Canadian Government, through the media and other reports, that widespread cuts might be imminent in the U.S. foreign assistance program, particularly affecting multilateral aid agencies. Specifically, there are indications that the cuts will impair the USA's ability to meet its commitments to IDA Six.
2. Without exception, successive governments of the countries attending Economic Summit meetings have attached high priority to the pursuit of the dialogue with developing countries. 5. Specifically with respect to IDA VI, it should be noted that acceptance of a final IDA agreement is regarded as a binding international commitment by other donors who have made commitments and financial payments according to the schedule in the agreement. A very real rupture with other major donors could be the primary result of a decision not to fulfil USA commitments on IDA VI. It could also severely jeopardize new negotiations to replenish virutally all the international financial institutions and to fund IFAD and the prospective IBRD energy affiliate.
6. Canada well understands the pain of the budget-cutting process, having gone through it twice in the past three years. However, despite considerable pressure, no multilateral commitments were effected in the Canadian aid-cutting process, even though the multilateral share of the budget was larger. We are reasonably certain that this is also the case for other major donors.

7. Against this background, and given our mutual interest in ensuring that developments over the next few months and at the Ottawa Economic Summit have a positive outcome with respect to North/South relations, it is the hope of the Canadian Government that the USA Administration will resist proposals which would detract from multilateral aid commitments.

SUBJECT: Canadian "Bilateralism"

Canadian Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs MacGuigan has announced in two recent speeches the Canadian Government's intention to take a more active role in developing trade and investment relations with some near-industrialized and oil-rich countries such as Mexico, Korea, Indonesia, Nigeria, Brazil, and Singapore. He called the new thrust "concentrated bilateralism." The concept is reminiscent of Kissinger's extension of bilateral economic commissions in 1975-76, but the Canadian objective seems to be almost wholly economic.

MacGuigan says: "... the world of the 'eighties will undoubtedly see an increase in these state-to-state relationships. Canada is compelled to ... respond to this phenomenon and to direct a good deal more attention to systematically developing the kind of political partnership which our development requires .... In this, all the relevant instruments of government should be called on to serve the relationship, including cultural exchanges and high-level visits .... We should encourage and facilitate efforts of the private sector to find opportunities in these new centers of wealth and influence."

"Such a policy," he concludes, "would also support our overall commitment to improving cooperation between the North and the South by intensifying concrete ties with some of the newly industrializing countries which are among our best potential partners. It would also support our efforts to increase our aid levels to the poorest countries."

My assessment of comparable US Government efforts to promote exports through joint economic-technical commissions when I was directing this program in the mid-seventies was that they can help to reduce commercial biases in favor of the former metropole in some former colonies or to reintroduce US companies after years of political estrangement. However, they add little and raise anti-trust problems in countries where US product lines already are well known. In order to make a significant contribution to our exports, such a USG program today would need the capacity of some of our competitors (France, Japan) to offer free project pre-feasibility studies, unlimited ExIm export credits, and credit subsidies in some cases. The previously unresolved dilemma is how to ration such budget subsidies.

Similar selectivity in officially coordinated scientific and technological cooperation can support our political and economic objectives in some key LDCs. This can be a relatively inexpensive and positive aspect of our North-South policy in a period of aid budget retrenchment.

Both of these instruments of targeted North-South relations -- export promotion and S&T cooperation with the new economic powers of the South -- should be borne in mind during the current budget reviews.

2. THE FOLLOWING DEFINITIONS ARE OFFERED FOR CLARIFI-  
CATION:

A. SECRETARY'S IMMEDIATE STAFF (S) - CALLED THE "S  
STAFF." THIS OFFICE IS USUALLY COMPOSED OF FOUR OR  
FIVE SPECIAL ASSISTANTS TO THE SECRETARY AND THE PERSONAL  
ASSISTANT TO THE SECRETARY. ALL TRAVEL WITH THE SECRETARY.

B. SECRETARIAT (S/S) - RESPONSIBLE FOR SCHEDULES, LIAISON  
BETWEEN THE PARTY AND EMBASSY STAFF, COORDINATION OF BRIEF-  
ING MATERIALS FOR THE SECRETARY, AND MANAGEMENT OF ALL

MESSAGE (CONTINUED):

COMMUNICATIONS TO AND FROM THE PARTY, S/S TYPICALLY STAFFS THE TRIP WITH TWO TEAMS, EACH COMPOSED OF ONE OFFICER AND ONE SECRETARY. ONE TEAM WILL ACCOMPANY THE SECRETARY WHILE THE SECOND TEAM NORMALLY TRAVELS TO POST A DAY OR TWO IN ADVANCE. NAMES OF THE ADVANCE TEAM MEMBERS, ARRIVAL DATES AND REQUIREMENTS WILL BE PROVIDED SEPTEL.

C. SENIOR STAFF -- THIS GROUP CONSISTS OF SENIOR OFFICIALS OF THE DEPARTMENT WHO ACCOMPANY THE SECRETARY.

3. ALTHOUGH ALL MEMBERS OF THE SECRETARY'S PARTY ARE MEMBERS OF THE PRESIDENT'S PARTY FOR PURPOSES OF EMBASSY ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT, THE SECRETARY AND HIS PARTY HAVE CERTAIN SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS DESCRIBED IN THE FOLLOWING PARAGRAPHS.

4. LIAISON WITH S/S. OF PARTICULAR IMPORTANCE IS THE SELECTION OF TWO MIDDLE-GRADE, SUBSTANTIVE OFFICERS PREPARED TO SERVE 12-HOUR SHIFTS AS LIAISON OFFICERS TO THE SECRETARIAT OFFICE ON A FULL-TIME 24-HOUR A DAY BASIS. THESE INDIVIDUALS, EACH OF WHOM SHOULD HAVE A GOOD GRASP OF BOTH POST AND HOST GOVERNMENT PROCEDURES, MUST BE FULLY VERSED ON PREPARATIONS FOR THE VISIT. THE TWO INDIVIDUALS SELECTED MUST BE PREPARED TO BE FULLY EMPLOYED IN THIS CAPACITY DURING THEIR PERIODS OF DUTY.

5. OFFICE SPACE/SLEEPING ACCOMMODATIONS: CURRENT PLANNING CALLS FOR THE SECRETARY AND HIS IMMEDIATE STAFF TO BE BILLETED AT RIDEAU GATE. WE ANTICIPATE ROOM REQUIREMENTS AS FOLLOWS: A) A SUITE FOR THE SECRETARY (ONE BEDROOM AND A SITTING ROOM); B) A SEPARATE BEDROOM FOR THE S STAFF; C) A SMALL BEDROOM FOR A FEMALE SECRETARY; AND D) A LARGE ROOM FOR USE AS THE S STAFF OFFICE. THE S STAFF OFFICE AT RIDEAU GATE SHOULD CONTAIN TWO OR THREE DESKS OR WORKING TABLES, TWO TYPEWRITERS, DESK LAMPS AND OFFICE SUPPLIES (SEE PARA 13 FOR SPECIFICS).

6. OFFICE SPACE AT THE SKYLINE HOTEL: THE REST OF THE SECRETARY'S PARTY WILL BE BILLETED AND USE OFFICER AT THE HOTEL. THE FOLLOWING OFFICES ARE

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MESSAGE (CONTINUED):

NEEDED:

A) THE S/S OFFICE/CONTROL ROOM: TWO LARGE CONNECTING DOUBLE ROOMS (OR EQUIVALENT) CONVERTED INTO OFFICES WITH:

- FIVE DESKS OR WORKING TABLES
- FOUR TYPEWRITERS AND FOUR STANDS (TWO IN EACH ROOM)
- DESK LAMPS
- TWO BEST AVAILABLE COPIERS (24-HOUR SERVICE), ONE IN EACH ROOM.

C) S STAFF OFFICE: ONE ROOM CONVERTED TO AN OFFICE FOR THE USE OF THE SECRETARY'S IMMEDIATE STAFF WHEN THEY ARE IN THE HOTEL. EQUIP WITH ONE OR TWO DESKS/WORK TABLES, DESK LAMPS, A TYPEWRITER AND OFFICE SUPPLIES.

THESE OFFICES SHOULD BE LOCATED IN ONE CONTIGUOUS GROUPING IN THE HOTEL.

#### 7. MEDIA REPORTS:

A) TICKER SERVICE SUCH AS UPI, AP OR REUTER WILL BE NEEDED ON 24-HOUR BASIS FOR THE SECRETARY AND HIS PARTY. TEN PACKAGES OF CAREFULLY SELECTED SUBSTANTIVE ITEMS SHOULD BE DELIVERED TO S/S BY 0600 EACH MORNING AND AT TWO-HOUR INTERVALS THEREAFTER UNTIL 2200. EACH STORY SHOULD BEGIN ON A NEW PAGE. DO NOT REPRODUCE TWO OR MORE STORIES TOGETHER ON THE SAME PAGE. THIS SERVICE SHOULD START FOUR HOURS BEFORE SECRETARY'S SCHEDULED ARRIVAL. POST SHOULD ARRANGE TO HAVE MACHINES RUN UNATTENDED OVERNIGHT.

B) TEN COPIES OF EACH OF THE LEADING DAILIES SHOULD BE MADE AVAILABLE TO S/S AS EARLY AS POSSIBLE EACH

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MESSAGE (CONTINUED):

MORNING. COPIES OF THE ICA WIRELESS FILE SHOULD BE PROVIDED TO S/S AS SOON AS RECEIVED.

8. GROUND TRANSPORTATION. AT LEAST TWO EMBASSY VEHICLES SHOULD BE RESERVED AT ALL TIMES FOR THE EXCLUSIVE USE OF THE SECRETARY AND HIS STAFF AT RIDEAU GATE. THESE ARE IN ADDITION TO TRANSPORTATION FOR SCHEDULED EVENTS.

9. GIFTS FOR THE SECRETARY. WE PREFER THAT THERE BE NO EXCHANGE OF GIFTS. IF CUSTOM MAKES AN EXCHANGE UNAVOIDABLE, POST SHOULD EXPLAIN TO CANADIAN OFFICIALS AT APPROPRIATE OPPORTUNITY US RESTRICTIONS GOVERNING RECEIPT OF GIFTS. (SEE 3 FAM 821.) AS CONTINGENCY, POST SHOULD APPOINT A GIFT OFFICER WHO SHOULD ASSUME RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE RECEIPT AND RECORDING OF ALL GIFTS AND FOR PREPARING THEM FOR SHIPMENT. IN THE EVENT THAT THERE WILL BE A GIFT EXCHANGE, AND AGAIN, UNLESS IT IS CONTRARY TO LOCAL CUSTOM, THE EXCHANGE SHOULD BE BETWEEN PROTOCOL OFFICERS.

10. SECRETARIAL/COURIER ASSISTANCE:

A) THE SERVICES OF TWO TOP-SECRET CLEARED SECRETARIES WILL BE REQUIRED FULL-TIME ON A 24-HOUR BASIS TO WORK WITH THE SECRETARIAT AND TO PROVIDE CLERICAL SUPPORT FOR OTHER MEMBERS OF THE PARTY. ADDITIONALLY, ANOTHER SECRETARY MUST BE AVAILABLE AT ALL TIMES ON A CALL-IN BASIS. A SCHEDULE SHOULD BE DRAWN UP AND PROVIDED TO S/S ADVANCE TEAM ON ARRIVAL.

B) COURIERS WILL BE REQUIRED TO LINK THE S/S OFFICES AT THE SKYLINE HOTEL WITH THE EMBASSY AND RIDEAU GATE. THREE COURIERS WILL BE NECESSARY FOR SIMULTANEOUS SERVICE FROM ALL POINTS. A VEHICLE WITH DRIVER SHOULD BE RESERVED FOR THE EXCLUSIVE USE OF EACH OF THE COURIERS. A SCHEDULE OF SHIFTS FOR COURIERS SHOULD BE PREPARED AND MADE AVAILABLE TO S/S ADVANCE TEAM UPON ARRIVAL. EACH COURIER SHOULD HAVE A LARGE BRIEFCASE TO CARRY TRAFFIC.

OWNERSHIP REQUIREMENT (COR) AND PETROLEUM INCENTIVES PROGRAM (PIP) - WORKING PAPERS WHICH HAD BEEN RELEASED FOR PUBLIC DISCUSSION AND ARE NOW BEING PUT IN FINAL DRAFT REGULATIONS BY EM&R AFTER RECEIVING OVER 100 REACTIONS FROM INDUSTRY.

4. THE NEED FOR A NEW U.S. STATEMENT ON THE NEP ARISES IN PART FROM A SERIES OF PUBLIC COMMENTS BY CANADIAN CABINET OFFICERS FROM MID-DECEMBER THROUGH MID-FEBRUARY AND FROM PRIVATE CONVERSATIONS IN OTTAWA WITH LOWER LEVEL OFFICERS, BOTH SUGGESTING THE POSSIBILITY THAT OUR CONTINUING PROBLEMS WITH THE NEP MAY NOT BE FULLY APPRECIATED BY THE CANADIAN GOVERNMENT. ONGOING EMBASSY EFFORTS TO CLARIFY OUR POSITION HAVE THUS FAR MET WITH MIXED SUCCESS. IN SOME CASES, GOC OFFICIALS WHO WERE AT THE DECEMBER 17, 1980 MEETING IN WASHINGTON ON THE NEP CLAIM THE RESULTS OF THAT MEETING SUGGEST THE USG IS BASICALLY SATISFIED WITH THE CANADIAN RESPONSE TO OUR DIPLOMATIC NOTE OF DECEMBER 5.

5. ADDITIONALLY, THE TIMING OF GOC REVIEWS OF C-48 AND THE COR AND PIP PROGRAMS, ALL OF WHICH MAY BE ENTERING THEIR FINAL STAGES, SUGGESTS USG VIEWS MUST BE PRESENTED RATHER QUICKLY IF THEY ARE TO HAVE ANY CHANCE OF INFLUENCING THE FINAL FORM OF THESE MEASURES. WHILE THE USG DIPLOMATIC NOTE OF DECEMBER 5, 1980 OBVIOUSLY CONVEYS VIEWS RELATED TO THESE MEASURES, WE HAVE NOT YET GIVEN THE GOC ANY SPECIFIC STATEMENTS REGARDING C-48, COR, OR PIP AND THIS IN ITSELF MAY BE MISINTERPRETED IN OTTAWA AS A LACK OF CONCERN ABOUT THEM.

6. IN FACT, SOME DEVELOPMENTS SINCE THE DECEMBER 17 MEETING AND THE INTRODUCTION OF C-48, COR AND PIP GIVE CAUSE FOR WORRY; PARTICULARLY ON THE TRADE SIDE WHERE THE PRIVATE ASSURANCES GIVEN TO US BY THE GOC MUST BE CONTRASTED WITH PUBLIC STATEMENTS ON THE NEP'S IMPLICATIONS FOR PROCUREMENT SUCH AS THAT BY ENERGY MINISTER LALONDE REPORTED REPTEL (A).

7. WE RECOGNIZE C-48, COR AND PIP ARE COMPLEX AND EVOLVING PROPOSALS MAKING DEFINITIVE ANALYSIS DIFFICULT. THE NEED TO GET ON THE RECORD WITH AT LEAST A PRELIMINARY STATEMENT ABOUT THEM, HOWEVER, SHOULD HAVE A HIGHER PRIORITY THAN WAITING FOR A MORE COMPLETE ANALYSIS OF THESE MEASURES. (I.E., PROVISIONS IN C-48 REGARDING THE 25 PERCENT RETROACTIVE CARRIED INTEREST AND THE REQUIREMENT FOR CANADIAN CONTENT IN GOODS AND SERVICES, AND THE GENERALLY

IF, AS CANADIAN NEGOTIATORS CONTINUALLY ADVOCATE, THE USG DELAYS OFFICIAL COMMENT UNTIL THE FINAL LEGISLATION AND REGULATION ARE IN PLACE, WE WILL LOSE THE OPPORTUNITY TO INFLUENCE CHANGES AND BE LEFT WITHOUT ANY RECORD THAT THE PROPOSAL OF THESE IMPLEMENTING MEASURES BY THE GOC CAUSED US PROBLEMS.

WE BELIEVE USG CONCERN ABOUT THE NEP SHOULD BE AN IMPORTANT PART OF THE PRESIDENT'S DISCUSSIONS HERE AND FOR THIS TO PROCEED SMOOTHLY OUR VIEWS MUST BE MADE UNMISTAKABLY CLEAR TO THE GOC AS SOON AS POSSIBLE.
