

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



SUBJECT: Proposed Reply to Letter from Trudeau

Prime Minister Trudeau on June 22 sent you a letter (Tab B) expressing concern that unilateral US decisions on budgets and proposed amendments to the Clean Air Act might prejudice satisfactory resolution of transboundary air pollution problems of great concern to Canada. He asked for a high-level meeting between US and Canadian officials.

In your meeting in Ottawa with Trudeau you agreed that we would seek answers to these problems through technical studies and negotiation. This process is underway. In addition, Secretary Watt and others have met with senior Canadian officials on several occasions.

Nevertheless, the Canadians believe that we now are unilaterally proceeding with legislative proposals for reducing standards of environmental protection, prejudicing our capacity to carry out the measures that may be indicated by the technical studies and negotiation.

After we received the Trudeau letter, Anne Grosuch agreed to a consultation with Canadian Ambassador Towe on June 26. She told him that she would be glad to meet further with the appropriate Canadian minister or other representative designated by the Prime Minister on July 6 or 7, if they so desired.

Your reply to Trudeau need only confirm this forthcoming response. The proposed reply has been cleared in substance by Watt and Gorsuch and in text by State and the speechwriters.

Prime Minister Trudeau on June 22 sent a letter to President Reagan (Tab II) expressing concern that unilateral US decisions on budgets and proposed amendments to the Clear Air Act might prejudice satisfactory resolution of transboundary air pollution problems of great concern to Canada. 

It is clear, however, that restating our firm commitment to creating the necessary framework for private financing of the pipeline will not be enough. The pipeline companies have now requested the required waivers, and it is unlikely that the US government will grant all the waivers necessary to guarantee private financing. You have a separate memo on this subject.

Subject: Canadian Prime Minister Trudeau's Visit to Washington, July 10, 1981

The Department understands that the President has agreed to Prime Minister Trudeau's proposal to visit Washington on July 10 to discuss the Ottawa Summit. We understand that the White House plans a meeting at 11:30, followed by luncheon.

Trudeau will be accompanied by Alan Gotlieb, Deputy Foreign Minister and Personal Representative for the Summit; Peter Towe, Canadian Ambassador to the US; and Michael Pitfield, Clerk of the Privy Council and Trudeau's closest assistant.

The principal issues to be discussed during the visit are:

-- Ottawa Summit: Our objective will be to obtain Trudeau's assessment of the views of Schmidt, Mitterrand, and Thatcher, his views on the agenda in light of these discussions, and to present our views on the Summit. Trudeau's purpose will be to underscore his belief that North/South issues must figure as prominently as East/West and macroeconomic and possibly to continue his push for endorsement of global negotiations. He will seek to enhance his role as an intermediary between us and the developing world.

-- Transboundary air pollution: The US objective will be to demonstrate sensitivity to Canadian concerns, despite the constraints of evolving US environmental policy and to minimize the impact of Canadian disappointment regarding this issue on other aspects of US-Canadian relations. Trudeau's objective will be to underscore the political importance of this issue in Canada and the potentially serious adverse effects on the bilateral relationship in the event that the US appears to be insensitive to Canadian concerns.

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-- Alaska Gas Pipeline: We should make clear our firm commitment to creating the necessary framework for private financing of the pipeline. Trudeau will stress his political vulnerability on this issue, and will seek reassurance.

-- Other international issues, such as the Multinational Force in the Sinai and the US Caribbean Basin initiative, may be discussed, depending on the evolution of those issues in the next two weeks.

We propose that State Department participation in the meeting at 11:30 a.m. and in the luncheon include the following: Secretary Haig, Under Secretary Rashish, Ambassador-designate to Canada Robinson, and Assistant Secretary Eagleburger.
