SUBJECT: Possible Canadian Meeting

Ambassador Paul Robinson telephoned today from Canada to recommend that the new Canadian Prime Minister be invited to Cape Canaveral on October 1 (date uncertain) for the NASA launch that will include a Canadian astronaut. He was ambivalent about the wisdom about also inviting the PM to Washington.

As you know, bringing the new Canadian PM here is high on our post-November 6 agenda. There are three options open:

- We could authorize an invitation to him to travel to Florida and back without a Washington stopover.
- We could have him visit Washington for either a get-acquainted visit or a full working visit enroute to or returning from the Cape. This is not attractive since it would mean hastily organizing what should be a well-prepared visit.
- We could forget the whole thing. Since the Canadians have not said anything, this is a viable option.

Since this proposal would impact greatly on the President's campaign schedule, I am reluctant to recommend serious consideration of the proposal.

President Reagan's Suggested Statement
Following Meeting with Canadian Prime Minister

25 September

It was with great pleasure that I welcomed back to the White House Brian Mulroney. He was here this past June and now returns as Prime Minister of Canada -- America's neighbor, ally, most important economic partner, and friend. I congratulated him on winning a decisive and historic electoral mandate from the people of Canada. As the "other" North American Irishman I wished him well in his new responsibilities. He has had a busy first week on the job.

The Prime Minister and I exchanged views on a broad range of global issues. I told him that in our efforts to build a lasting structure of peace and security, we shall continue to value the experience, counsel, and participation of our Canadian allies.

A healthy North American economic relationship is essential to the prosperity of our two countries. We discussed some potential ways of fostering trade and investment between us. Canada is by far our largest trading partner.

The Prime Minister impressed upon me the importance his government attaches to the question of acid rain.

Frequent consultations are one of the hallmarks of the relationship between our two countries. I told the Prime Minister that I look forward to continuing the fruitful dialogue we held today. In addition, I have asked Secretary of State Shultz to continue the series of regular meetings he has had with his Canadian counterpart.

The Environment/Acid Rain

The United States and Canada have a full and generally productive environmental relationship. Many water issues are handled routinely through the International Joint Commission (IJC), a binational advisory body. Other issues of mutual concern, now being managed with considerable success, include the Garrison Diversion Project, Great Lakes pollution, and Niagara River toxic chemical pollution.

The most visible item on the Canadian environmental agenda -- acid rain -- is also the one where US-Canadian differences are widest. Canadian public concern has been aroused by the threat to lakes, streams, and possibly forest resources. The Canadian Government advocates immediate steps leading to a 50 percent cut in sulphur dioxide emissions by 1994. Although funding for additional research into acid rain continues, the Canadians publicly assert that enough is known to begin a cleanup now. The US, by contrast, ended an extensive policy review in January 1984 by rejecting for now any additional cleanup plan, but significantly increasing research efforts. Remaining scientific uncertainties about acid rain are so large, in the judgment of US experts, that heavy additional cleanup expenses cannot be justified at this time. However, this US position remains subject to review, as new scientific evidence accumulates.

Canada's acid rain policy is a reasonable reflection of its national interest and enjoys wide support. Canada is very dependent on forest resources and has large areas with acid-sensitive geology. In our judgment, the Mulroney government is unlikely to make substantive changes in the acid rain positions inherited from the Liberals. After a "honeymoon" period with the US, we foresee a real chance that Mulroney will pick this topic as suitable to demonstrate his independence of Washington. His recent appointment of an obscure freshman M.P. as Environment Minister may indicate his intention to manage the acid rain issue personally. During his June visit to Washington, acid rain was the one topic on which he expressed criticism of US policy.

The Canadian economic recovery this year is fairly strong, with GNP expected to be up 4% (second strongest among the summit countries). The best performance is in the export sector, benefitting from the strong rise in US demand and a Canadian dollar at record lows. Weaker elements include Canada's high unemployment (around 11%) and a lag in investment demand.

Two-way trade between our countries is flourishing, expected to be \$120 billion this year. Canada -- the #1 trade partner of the US -- will have a bilateral trade surplus of almost \$20 billion, but this is expected to be nearly offset by our surplus on services. With trade of this magnitude (80% of Canadian exports and 20% of US exports), there are bound to be trade disputes -- most US actions affecting trade involve Canada. The major action this year was the President's decision on carbon steel imports, which was welcomed in Canada. Steel imports from Canada, while large (\$2 billion), have not been accused of unfair trade practices. Consequently, the Canadians do not anticipate the President's decision will result in restrictions on their trade.

Canadian energy policy is evolving toward a more market-oriented approach which may stimulate lagging Canadian gas exports to the US market. Bilateral consultation mechanisms on energy and trade are working well. Responding to a Canadian initiative last year, Ambassador Brock has been holding talks with them on free trade arrangements in selected sectors (agricultural equipment, informatics, transit equipment, etc.) We welcomed this initiative as an opportunity for near term trade liberalization and a means of advancing our mutual objective of achieving fuller multilateral liberalization. While Mulroney has spoken in favor of trade expansion, he has not specifically endorsed the bilateral talks.

Canadian policy toward foreign investment has also been evolving favorably. The approval rate of the Foreign Investment Review Agency (FIRA) has gone up while delays have gone down. On the campaign trail, Mulroney recognized the need to attract investment and suggested revamping FIRA. Although short on specifics, this could include an investment promotion function. Canada's national energy policy involves the most egregious example of discrimination against foreign-owned firms, the retroactive "back-in" which gives the Government the right to take 25% of certain petroleum finds. Mulroney sharply criticized this,

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and has promised to do away with the back-in. Canada's need to increase investment spending is a powerful lever favoring better policies toward foreign investors.

Recent developments in the transportation sector are also positive. The GOC has taken the first steps toward deregulation of air services. If the new government continues this policy (popular with the Canadian public), it could ease bilateral route negotiations and present opportunities for new transborder services. Similarly, trucking policy is also moving toward allowing more competition, although licenses for at least two major US operators are still being held up in Ontario.

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TALKING POINTS FOR THE PRESIDENT'S MEETING WITH
BRIAN MULRONEY, PRIME MINISTER OF CANADA

COURTESY POINTS

-- It is a pleasure for me to welcome you back to Washington so soon, this time as Prime Minister.

-- I have followed the Canadian campaign with interest, and was particularly pleased to hear your strong defense of the free-market, expanded international trade, and private investment.

-- I know that you were under considerable pressure during the campaign over the nuclear freeze question, and I appreciate the responsible manner in which you dealt with this most serious issue.

EAST-WEST

-- I will use my meeting with Gromyko to underline interest in placing our relations on a more constructive and businesslike basis. I doubt Gromyko will have a brief to negotiate or accept our suggestions on the spot, but we want him to carry back to the Politburo an understanding that we can and should do business over the next four years.

ARMS CONTROL

-- Bilateral Talks: The Soviets seem determined to ensure that there are no bilateral negotiations -- nor real progress -- on major arms control issues, before the election, although they have been ready to move on some lesser bilateral issues (Hot Line improvements, exchanges, etc.). However, I believe that at some time the Soviets will have to reconsider their obstinacy and more actively seek opportunities for serious dialogue.

-- Vienna Space Talks: The prospects for the Vienna space talks are not bright. I regret they refused to take "yes" for an answer and meet this month in Vienna. Nonetheless, internal USG preparations for the talks are moving ahead, and we remain prepared to meet with the Soviets for serious talks; now, or later if they prefer.

ATLANTIC ALLIANCE

-- NATO has held together well through the INF experience -- one of the toughest political/military challenges in its history. The consultation process on INF has been an important source of strength for the Alliance.

-- NATO Secretary General Lord Carrington has just completed a useful visit to Washington. I am pleased that he is taking vigorous charge of his new duties.

-- The Soviets have not slackened their conventional build-up while we have all been concentrating on nuclear problems. We need to turn our energies to trying to correct the conventional imbalance.

-- We know we can count on Canada as the Alliance works to strengthen both nuclear and conventional deterrence.

CENTRAL AMERICA

-- The newly revised "Contadora" agreement is an improvement over the first draft, but problems remain and the member countries are showing fatigue. We are encouraging them to persevere.

-- Nicaragua remains unwilling to deal with key issues like arms reductions, democratization, and verification.

-- Without the participation of the opposition "Coordinating Group", the November elections in Nicaragua will be a sham.

-- Anti-Sandinista activity continues even with the US aid cutoff, evidence that the armed insurgency is not an artificial, US creation.

-- Western unity in support of a comprehensive regional settlement is important.

-- We have welcomed European interest in the region; the democracies in the region need and deserve support.

MIDDLE EAST

Peace Process

-- We continue to support direct negotiations among the parties concerned in accordance with UNSC Resolutions 242 and 338.

-- We believe the peace treaty between Egypt and Israel is a key building block for the peace process.

-- Despite Peres' public invitation to Jordan to join the peace process, it would be unrealistic to expect a serious Arab reaction or effort to move the process forward until after November, if then.

-- In the meantime, we are looking at approaches we might make to help the resumption of negotiations early next year. The first step will probably focus on autonomy for the Palestinians in the occupied territories.

Iran-Iraq War

-- The war remains stalemated with neither belligerent capable of delivering a decisive blow.

-- We seek a negotiated settlement which assures the political and territorial integrity of both belligerents.

-- To prevent a widening or intensifying of the conflict, we have worked and will continue to work to prevent arms resupply to both sides. We have also encouraged and supported mediation efforts by other countries.

Libya-Morocco

-- We are watching closely to see how the treaty between Morocco and Libya is implemented and, indeed, if it survives.

-- We are concerned that the treaty might be viewed as according Qadhafi a form of legitimacy.

-- Although we value the close US-Moroccan cooperation, we have expressed our concern over the treaty directly to the Government of Morocco at the highest levels.

Lebanon

-- We were somewhat encouraged in July by the progress made toward implementing the security plan for greater Beirut. There are still many obstacles for the next phase, however, and Prime Minister Karami is having difficulty holding his national unity government together.

-- The Israeli Government has made clear its desire to withdraw from southern Lebanon, subject only to arrangements for the security of Israel's northern border.

-- We continue to believe that direct contacts between Lebanon and Israel offer the best means of developing satisfactory security arrangements.

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Pakistan/India

-- The recent downturn in relations between India and Pakistan raises concerns about a possible outbreak of hostilities.

-- The step-up in tension coincides with an increase in Soviet pressure on Pakistan -- paralleling a more active campaign against the Afghan resistance.

-- We have approached the Indians, and others, to convey our views on the South Asian situation and to express our hopes that Pak-Indo tensions will ease. Despite recent press speculation, we do not believe a conflict is imminent and have told this to the Pakistanis and the Indians.

ECONOMIC ISSUES

US Economy

-- We are very pleased with the strong, but non-inflationary, growth being shown by the US economy. It is providing substantial support to the Canadian economy, as well as to the global recovery and the alleviation of the international debt problem.

International Development

-- The record of the developing countries which have relied on a market-oriented, free enterprise approach to development is clearly superior. We would like to work with Canada in promoting this view, which is very much in keeping with the traditions of our two countries.

Foreign Investment

-- Canadian policy toward foreign investment was widely discussed in the recent campaign. We would be interested to know how you will be implementing your policies in this area.

Trade Negotiations

-- We continue to favor movement toward trade liberalization, both multilaterally and bilaterally. What are your thoughts on this subject?

Steel Decision

-- We appreciated your very positive reaction to our decision last week rejecting quotas on steel imports. In this difficult situation, we count on Canadian support for the restraint agreements USTR will be negotiating.

Energy Policy

-- I am sure you have noticed the initiative this Administration has taken to reduce government interference in the free market and deregulate important industries. I am pleased to see that you are considering similar initiatives, notably in the energy area. Our experience with deregulation has been highly positive.

Pacific Salmon

-- As you know, our two countries have been trying for years to reach agreement on managing West Coast salmon fisheries.

-- We have asked Ed Derwinski, a former Congressman and now a senior State Department official to work with his Canadian counterpart to push these negotiations along.

-- I am pleased to announce that the talks will resume in December and have told our team to do all they can to resolve our differences.

Gulf of Maine Boundary Dispute

-- I am confident that the International Court of Justice's upcoming decision on the Gulf of Maine will be fair and that both parties have had a full opportunity to present their views and have them considered.

-- It may be well for us to coordinate our public statements about the decision to prevent any unintended political repercussions in the wake of the Court's decision.

ACID RAIN

-- We have made a policy decision not to support percentage reductions in sulphur dioxide pollution at this time.

-- Our decision is open for review, as scientific evidence accumulates.

-- I am personally committed to responsible stewardship of our common environment.

CANADA'S DEFENSE ROLE

-- I appreciate your willingness to increase Canada's defense budget, to better meet Canada's Alliance obligations in the area of conventional deterrence.

MANAGING THE RELATIONSHIP

-- I look forward to meeting frequently and productively with you, as we work together to manage the broad agenda of global and bilateral issues.

-- I know that Secretary Shultz intends to continue his recent tradition of meeting four times yearly with the Canadian Foreign Minister, if you agree that this remains helpful.

-- Beyond that, I believe you and I ought to commit our two governments to more intensive and frequent consultations in the future, on both multilateral and bilateral issues.
