The attached memorandum from George provides highlights of a very interesting meeting he had with French President Francois Mitterrand Wednesday. During the meeting Mitterrand:

- -- Stressed that the USSR had embarked on a more aggressive foreign policy line even before the KAL incident.
- -- Indicated he would work closely with us in dealing with Moscow, particularly on INF deployments.
- -- Provided an optimistic view on Lebanon's future and forecast increasing unity among Lebanese factions and decreasing Syrian influence.
- -- Indicated that France would resist any further Libyan movement in Chad.
- -- Agreed that French and U.S. interests coincided for the most part on security and East-West issues.

Although Mitterrand has consistently maintained a tough stance vis-a-vis the USSR, France has been a thorn in our side recently over several foreign policy issues -- mutual cooperation in Chad, our fire support to the U.S. MNF contingent, and Central America. However, the Secretary's very positive evaluation of his session and good personal chemistry with Mitterrand indicates a potential for real improvement in Franco-American relations. Still, given the French track record I remain somewhat skeptical.

My Meeting with French President Mitterrand

I had an especially interesting meeting today (September 28th) with Francois Mitterrand. We covered a wide range, including East-West issues, Lebanon, Chad, and the US-French bilateral relationship. Although a full record of the meeting will be sent to you and Bill Clark shortly, I wanted to give you a few highlights right away.

On East-West relations, Mitterrand believes as I do that even before the Korean airliner incident the Soviets had embarked upon a more aggressive course -- a course resulting in large part from their recognition that despite their best efforts the Western Alliance had held together and INF deployments would proceed as planned. Mitterrand said he thus saw the need for the West to prepare for a "chillier" climate internationally and not lose its nerve when dealing with Moscow. In this context, he, like us, is paying close attention to developments in Bonn and recognizes full well that Helmut Kohl is facing a difficult set of challenges in the coming months. I believe we can count on Mitterrand to be helpful in this regard.

We spoke next of Lebanon, about which he was surprisingly upbeat, saying that the next step beyond the cease-fire was for the Gemayel government to push ahead in its efforts toward promoting national reconciliation and strengthening its armed forces. Mitterrand suggested that rather than relying upon external pressure to get the Syrians out, we ought to consider adopting a longer term perspective, one which was based on his conviction that the nationalist tendencies shared by all the competing Lebanese factions would gradually bring them together. At the end of ths process, he believed the Syrian presence would come to be viewed as an irritant by most Lebanese and the Syrians would be left with few options but to withdraw. I found this vision an intriguing one, and have asked my Middle East specialists to explore it and see if it can be used to our benefit.

Mitterrand defended French policy in Chad, saying that those portions of the country now occupied by Qadhafi do not provide him a base from which to destabilize black Africa. Moreover, if the Libyans in Chad were to try to move south, France is prepared to resist. While stating that France was not going to use military force against Libyan territory for fear of being viewed as a colonial power, Mitterrand stressed his determination to thwart Qadhafi's ambitions in Africa.

When we turned to our own relationship, I made a strong pitch to Mitterrand on the need for enhanced consultation and cooperation. I added that while we would disagree at times, more often than not our interests coincide, especially in the key spheres of security and East-West relations. He seemed to agree.

In short, I came away from the session heartened. I have now met with President Mitterrand on several occasions and believe we are developing the kind of good personal chemistry that I hope can be used to minimize the misunderstandings which all too often bedevil one of our most important relationships.

Some elements of the conversation are of course more plausible than others: e.g., Mitterrand's possible desire for a meeting with Andropov. Your Meeting with Jacques Andreani -- November 14

You are scheduled for a 30-minute meeting on Monday, November 14 at 10:30 a.m. Jack Matlock will join you.

Andreani is roughly Larry Eagleburger's counterpart in the French Ministry of External Relations, where he is the Political Director.

- -- Andreani is a sharp, skillful interlocutor who speaks excellent English and is generally well-disposed to Americans. He has particular expertise in East-West relations. Although he has pronounced socialist views, he is a realist on Franco-Soviet relations.
- -- Andreani participated in Ken Dam's November 7 meeting at the Quai. You might find it useful to reinforce the Deputy Secretary's message on the central core issues of Grenada, Central America, Lebanon and the Middle East, INF and U.S.-Soviet relations.

The suggested talking points are attached at Tab A. A bio of Andreani is at Tab B.

Jack Matlow, Constantine Menges and Ron Lehman concur.

TALKING POINTS

FOR MEETING WITH JACQUES ANDREANI Monday, November 14 -- 10:30 a.m.

Soviet Relations/Andropov Health

- -- Clearly, his illness is serious; he has a history of kidney and cardiovascular problems and is probably receiving dialysis treatment. Andropov health problems would seem to set back his efforts to establish and consolidate his power.
- -- Even should Andropov live for some time, as well as stay in office, maneuvering for the next succession has begun. Increasing influence of the military is troublesome.

Arms Control

- -- INF: No change in our position regarding third country forces. Can assure you, we will not grant compensation, nor will we accept transferring the program from INF to the START negotiations, which are also bilateral.
- -- MBFR: Continuing Soviet intransigence, but some positive movement on verification.
- -- <u>CDE</u>: We should attempt to insure that the focus remains on genuine confidence building measures, and that Soviets are not permitted to use the conference as a propaganda forum. Will the French desire a common allied negotiating approach?

Lebanon/Middle East

- -- Appreciate GOF reaffirmation at the highest levels of firm commitment to MNF, political resolve to stay the course.
- -- Continued European participation in MNF and UNIFIL important; West should not be seen as folding under pressure.
- -- Continued need to support Gemayel government in reconciliation efforts.

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-- On peace process, President's September 1 proposals remain on the table and continue to represent only realistic way to proceed. We should urge moderate Arabs to seize opportunity. Craxi proposals for financial assistance are encouraging.

Arafat/PLO Situation

- -- Ironically, move by Syrians against PLO and Arafat may open up new possibilities for Reagan initiative, but will depend on what happens to Arafat. We have reports that Syrians and PLO rebels have decided compromise with Arafat no longer possible and that he should not survive.
- -- If Arafat escapes, there is a possibility he will attempt to rally new support among moderate Palestinians to join King Hussein in support of Reagan initiative; if Arafat is killed or captured by the Syrians, Hussein may find it possible to work with a coalition of moderate West Bankers.

Iran-Iraq

- -- We need to continue to explore ways to prevent escalation of fighting or primacy of Iran.
- -- Need to continue our planning for Gulf naval coordination.

Grenada

- -- Collective action brought about by threat to foreign citizens caused by violence on the island.
- -- Three independent legal bases for the American action in Grenada: request by the Governor General; action under regional security agreements (OECS), provided for under the UN and OAS Charters; humanitarian response to the plight of the U.S. nationals.
- -- The President gave careful consideration to all aspects before deciding to act, including the impact on friendly and unfriendly countries in Central America, among allies. The President made a tough decision and was unpleasantly surprised by European reactions and the votes in the UN.
- -- Believe collective action achieved its objectives; U.S. forces are being withdrawn.

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- -- We are now helping to restore democracy, maintain order and reconstruct economy.
- -- Eastern Caribbean leaders willing to take collective responsibility for their own security; they need and deserve our help.

Chad

- -- What is the current French thinking, prospects for national reconciliation in Chad?
- -- Our principal objectives remain the withdrawal of Libyan forces and preservation of Chad's sovereignty.

Andreani Meeting at the NSC

Jacques Andreani has been Political Director at the French Ministry of External Relations since 1981. He is, in essence, Larry Eagleburger's counterpart in the French diplomatic hierarchy. His particular expertise is East-West relations, but his current position involves him in the entire range of French foreign policy issues. Andreani is a sharp and skillful interlocutor, generally well-disposed to Americans. He speaks excellent English. I attach his biographic sketch.

Andreani was in Washington for bilateral consultations in March of this year. At that time he was scheduled to meet with Bud McFarlane, but I believe the meeting was cancelled at the last moment. In any event, he did see McFarlane at the French Ambassador's dinner. He also had meetings in March with Larry Eagleburger, Rick Burt, Jon Howe and Steve Bosworth at State and with Richard Perle at DOD. He expects to meet with Larry again on this visit.

Andreani participated in Ken Dam's November 7 meeting at the Quai. You might well find it useful to reinforce the Deputy Secretary's message -- from a White House perspective -- on the current core issues of Grenada and Central America, Lebanon and the Middle East, INF and Soviet relations. AS WE WOULD SAY IN THE NAVY - BRAVO ZULU. I SINCERELY REGRET WE WERE NOT ABLE TO PARTICIPATE WITH YOU. WITH ONLY A FEW HOURS MORE TIME I BELIEVE WE COULD HAVE. THE NEXT TIME WE MEET I WILL EXPLAIN TO YOU WHAT HAPPENED SO AS TO MAKE ALLOWANCES THE NEXT TIME.

SUBJECT: COMMUNICATING WITH THE FRENCH

- 1. SENTIRE TEXT.
- 2. I BELIEVE RECENT EVENTS RELATING TO CHAD AND LEBANON HAVE DEMONSTRATED BEYOND ANY DOUBT THAT THE TIME HAS COME FOR US TO CONSIDER CAREFULLY HOW WE COMMUNICATE WITH THE FRENCH AND TO DO WHAT IS NECESSARY TO ENSURE SUCH COMMUNICATIONS ACHIEVE OUR PURPOSES, RATHER THAN DEFEATING THEM.
- 3. ART HARTMAN WARNED ME ABOUT THIS PROBLEM BEFORE I CAME HERE, AND LAST WEEK I HAD A PHILOSOPHICAL CHAT (NO DETAILS DIVULGED) WITH THE OLD MASTER HENRY KISSINGER. SO NONE OF THIS IS NEW OR SURPRISING. BUT THE EXAMPLES WE HAVE HAD IN AUGUST AND NOVEMBER ARE SO STRIKING THAT EVEN THE MOST SECRETIVE AMONG US MUST ADMIT WE COULD HAVE DONE BETTER BY TEAMWORK WITH ME OR THE DCM THAN WE DID BY "DIRECT COMMUNICATIONS."

- 4. IN ORDER TO REMEDY THIS SITUATION, I HOPE YOU WILL BOTH JOIN ME IN TRYING TO ENSURE THAT THIS SORT OF THING DOES NOT HAPPEN AGAIN. THE WAY TO DO THAT IS TO USE CHANNELS OF COMMUNICATION WHICH WORK AND WHICH ENSURE AGAINST BOTH MISUNDERSTANDING AND MISFIRE. THOSE CHANNELS OF COMMUNICATION ARE THROUGH THIS EMBASSY, E.G., EYES ONLY. ROGER CHANNEL, PRIVACY CHANNEL SECURE TELEPHONE OR PERSONAL LETTER. THIS WAY WE CAN ENSURE THAT MESSAGES ARE DELIVERED TO THE RIGHT PEOPLE AND ARE UNDERSTOOD AND THAT THE RESPONSE IS UNDERSTOOD, I.E., THAT THE MAXIMUM IS DONE TO ACHIEVE OUR OBJECTIVES. THIS DOES NOT PRECLUDE THE USE OF THE DIRECT CHANNEL IN SPECIAL CASES, BUT, AS I POINTED OUT IN MY DISCUSSIONS LAST WEEK WITH JOHN POINDEXTER. EVENTS MAY WELL HAVE GONE DIFFERENTLY IN CHAD AND LEBANON HAD DIRECT COMMUNICATIONS NOT BEEN USED. WE HAVE NOT ONLY A NEED TO KNOW, BUT ALSO MORE IMPORTANTLY YOU PROBABLY HAVE A NEED FOR OUR SERVICES IF YOU WANT THE JOB DONE PROPERLY.
- 5. I WOULD APPRECIATE RECEIVING YOUR VIEWS ON THIS MATTER, SINCE THERE WILL UNDOUBTEDLY BE OTHER OCCASIONS IN THE FUTURE WHEN OUR ABILITY TO COORDINATE WILL BE TESTED.
