- EMBASSY HAS BEEN TOLD BY EXECUTIVE OF ALSTHOM ATLANTIQUE (AA) THAT SOVIET SIBERIAN GAS PIPELINE PROJECT AUTHORITIES HAVE CALLED A MEETING IN MOSCOW JULY 6 AND 7 WITH REPRESENTATIVES OF MANNESMANN AND CREUSOT-LOIRE TO DISCUSS THE EFFECTS OF THE U.S. EMBARGO OF TECHNOLOGY ON THE PROJECT. THE AA EXECUTIVE BELIEVES THAT THE SOVIETS INTEND AT THAT MEETING TO TAKE DECISIONS ON ALTERNATIVES TO THE USE OF U.S.—ORIGIN TECHNOLOGY FOR THE PIPELINE COMPRESSOR STATION EQUIPMENT.
- AA EXECUTIVE WAS ASKED ABOUT POSSIBILITY THAT BROWN BOVERI OF SWITZERLAND, IN LIGHT OF RECENT SOVIET DISCUSSIONS WITH THE FIRM, MIGHT PRODUCE TURBINES FOR THE PIPELINE USING ITS OWN AND PERHAPS SOVIET TECHNOLOGY AND WITH THE ASSISTANCE OF ITS LICENSEES. 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USSR: Grain Prospects Worsen

The Soviets probably can hope for a total grain crop this year of only 185 million tons. (S NF WN)

Sustained hot, dry winds struck the principal grain regions of the USSR from 13 to 19 June, severely damaging winter grains, especially in the Volga Valley. The spring grains were in a less susceptible growth stage.

Comment: If the hot winds persist or are followed by drought, the total crop could be in the range of the 158 million tons harvested last year. It will be possible to make a more precise estimate of the crop by mid-July. (S NF WN)

To avoid consumer unrest, the regime probably will continue to import as much grain, feedstuffs and quality foods as scarce hard currency and port capacity allow. The USSR reportedly has lined up more than 17 million tons of grain from non-US sources for delivery during the year beginning on 1 July. These sources could provide possibly another 15 million tons, but Moscow will have to look to the US if it is to buy much over 32 million tons. (S NF WN)

By purchasing some 50 million tons and harvesting 185 million tons, Moscow could avoid distress slaughtering of livestock and increase output of livestock products slightly in 1982. With imports of meat at the record levels of last year, per capita consumption of livestock products could be sustained at the same levels. (S NF WN)

If the grain crop is much below 185 million tons, the resulting lackluster agricultural performance will aggravate the controversy over President Brezhnev's food program. This would become an important issue among those competing to succeed him. (S NF WN) -CIA, NSA-

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HUNGARY: Financial Crisis Looms

Hungary may be in deep financial difficulty despite its reputation for having the best managed economy in Eastern Europe. (C)

Hungarian data show that in the first quarter of 1982 Budapest's hard currency reserves dropped from \$1.8 billion to \$375 million--less than one month's worth of imports. The Hungarians have received \$210 million from the Bank for International Settlements to meet obligations during the second quarter, but they need at least \$450 million to cover debt repayments and \$500 million to rebuild reserves during the last half of the year. (C)

The Hungarians have made slow progress in lining up funds. Hungary is seeking \$250 million from Western banks, \$300 million more from the BIS, \$100 million in guaranteed trade credits, and \$500 million from the IMF. At least some of the IMF funds would have to be used to pay off the BIS. (C)

The US Embassy in Budapest reports that many Western banks remain unenthusiastic about the commercial loan and are waiting to see whether Hungary obtains more money from the BIS and improves its trade performance. The BIS, in turn, reportedly will not release more funds until Hungary receives the commercial loan from Western banks. (C)

Comment: If Hungary fails to arrange these credits, it may have to request a rescheduling of its debts in the next few months. Even these loans may be insufficient. Hungary's borrowing needs may be as much as \$300-400 million greater than it expects unless it makes difficult reductions in its imports soon. (C) -CIA, DIA, NSA-

- 4. OVERALL, HOWEVER, MCCARTHY THOUGHT THE PROSPECT FOR SUCCESS OF THE LOAN LOOKED "PRETTY GOOD." MANUFACTURER'S HANOVER WILL TELEX THE TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF THE PROPOSED LOAN TO PROSPECTIVE PARTICIPANTS IN THE NEXT FEW DAYS, ASKING FOR FORMAL COMMITMENTS BY BANKS.

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
