

SUBJECT: MESSAGE FROM THE AMBASSADOR

SUBJECT: SITUATION ON GRENADA

1. THE SITUATION ON GRENADA REMAINS A BIT UNCERTAIN. BUT IT NOW LOOKS AS THOUGH HARD-LINE, MARXIST-LENINIST BERNARD COARD HAS ALREADY OR SHORTLY WILL TAKE OVER. AT THE MOMENT. THE PEOPLE'VS REVOLUTIONARY ARMY APPEARS TO BE THE DECIDING FACTOR. THIS MORNING, PRA COMMANDER HUDSON AUSTIN PUBLICLY RULED BISHOP OUT AS A SELFISH INCOMPETENT EGOTIST: BUT HE DID NOT RULE COARD IN. STILL, OUR BEST GUESS IS THAT COARD AND COMPANY WILL END UP IN POWER IN THE NEXT FEW DAYS. WHILE BISHOP WAS NO FRIEND OF OURS. COARD AND RADICALS WILL MAKE MATTERS WORSE.

2. THERE DOES NOT APPEAR TO BE AN IMMEDIATE THREAT TO AMERICAN CITIZEN INTERESTS. BUT THE SITUATION COULD CHANGE.

AND WE SHOULD BE PREPARED TO EVACUATE A MAXIMUM OF 800-1000 CITIZENS. 600 OF THEM AT THE ST. GEORGE'S UNIVERSITY SCHOOL OF MEDICINE CAMPUSES AT GRAND ANSE AND TRUE BLUE. WITHOUT INTENDING TO SOUND A PREMATURE ALARM. I WOULD RECOMMEND THAT WE REVIEW OUR CONTINGENCY PLANS AND PERHAPS TENTATIVELY IDENTIFY THE MILITARY ASSETS THAT WOULD BE CALLED UPON SHOULD AN EVACUATION RECOME NECESSARY.

3. IT OCCURS TO ME. AS IT DOUBTLESSLY HAS TO YOUR THAT THE POLITICAL TURMOIL ON GRENADA MOR POSE AN OPPORTUNITY AS WELL AS A PROBLEM. THE POLITICAL POWER SEEMS TO BE SOLIDIFYING IN COARD'S FAVOR, BUT THINGS WILL NEVER BE THE SAME AGAIN. THE PEOPLE OF THE REGION HAVE WITNESSED A CYNICAL AND SELF-INTERESTED STRUGGLE. THE PEOPLE'S REVOLUTIONARY ARMY HAS ENTERED THE PICTURE: BECOMING A SIGNIFICANT POLITICAL FACTOR. EVEN IF COARD SUCCEEDS: BISHOP RETAINS SUBSTANTIAL SUPPORT. AND THEN THERE IS THE QUESTION OF WHAT COARD WILL DO WITH BISHOP. CLEARLY: THE PEOPLE'S REVOLUTIONARY GOVERNMENT CAN NO LONGER BE SEEN AS THE MONOLITH IT PREVIOUSLY APPEARED TO BE. THE CONFUSED SITUATION OF DIVIDED LOYALTIES POSES AN OPPORTUNITY FOR A THIRD FORCE REPRESENTING DEMOCRACY AND FREEDOM. IF WE EVER ENTERTAINED THE OPTION OF SUPPORTING: COVERTLY OR OTHERWISE, SUCH A FORCE, NOW WOULD SEEM TO BE THE TIME TO ACT. IF WE HAVE DEVELOPED A WORKABLE PLAN IN THIS REGARD, I URGE FORWARD MOVEMENT. THE NEXT TEN DAYS PROVIDE A WINDOW OF OPPORTUNITY. I FURTHER RECOMMEND THAT WE GET REALLY SERIOUS ABOUT ECONOMIC SANCTIONS. PERHAPS THERE ARE WAYS WE COULD DIMINISH THE SUBSTANTIAL PLOW OF REMITTANCES FROM THE U.S. . OR ME COULD GET REALLY HARDNOSED IN THE INTER-NATIONAL FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS AND MULTILATERAL DEVELOPMENT BANKS. WHO KNOWS: A LONG LOOK MIGHT TURN UP A NUMBER OF UNIMAGINED WAYS TO MAKE LIFE UNCOMFORTABL FOR THE PRG.

- PURPOSE: This meeting has been called to consult with the Congressional leadership regarding the use of U.S. military forces. This meeting fulfills requirements of the War Powers Resolution.
- BACKGROUND: On October 12, a violent series of events in Grenada led to the death of Prime Minister Maurice Bishop, a number of his cabinet colleagues, and at least 18 civilians. A revolutionary military council is now running the country.

We have 800-1000 American citizens on Grenada, most of them students at St. George's Medical School. There are indications of continued unrest and the safety of U.S. citizens cannot be guaranteed. Additionally, the new regime is a hard-line, doctrinaire, pro-Cuban, communist group.

On October 21, seven Caribbean democracies, including the Organization of Eastern Caribbean States (OECS), and Barbados and Jamaica, requested our support and participation in restoring peace, order and democracy to Grenada. Antigua, Dominica, St. Kitts/Nevis, St. Lucia, and St. Vincent, as well as Barbados and Jamaica, have promised to send contingents in a collective security force.

We have agreed to provide requisite transport and logistic support to these forces and send in approximately 1900 U.S. personnel to participate in this operation. Our objectives are straight-forward:

- Protect American lives.
- Restore democracy to Grenada.
- Prevent further Cuban/Soviet influence.

Secretaries Shultz and Weinberger and General Vessey will provide the details on foreign policy and the U.S. military operations. Your talking points are at Tab A.

TALKING POINTS FOR USE BY THE PRESIDENT

MEETING WITH RESTRICTED CONGRESSIONAL LEADERSHIP

- Thank you for coming at this late hour. What I am going to tell you is extremely sensitive information that affects the lives of U.S. servicemen. I ask that you hold it solely to yourselves until tomorrow.
- -- On October 12, the coup in Grenada resulted in the overthrow of the government, which led to the death of the Prime Minister, five cabinet members, and at least 18 civilians.
- -- The Organization of Eastern Caribbean States (Antigua, Dominica, St. Kitts/Nevis, St. Lucia, St. Vincent) asked us to help protect lives and restore democracy in Grenada.
- -- These states recognize that the new radical regime in Grenada is a threat to their security, and poses a potential threat to the stability of the entire region.
- -- In response to this threat, I have authorized U.S. military forces (1900) to participate with seven Caribbean democracies in a multi-lateral action to protect lives, including U.S. citizens, and to help restore democracy in Grenada.
- -- I reached this difficult decision to use U.S. forces for one reason: to protect the national security interests of the United States. We simply cannot permit the Soviet Union and Cuba to impose their will on nations whose security is so closely linked to our own.
 - -- Bud, would you please lead off?

GRENADA TALKING POINTS FOR MR. MCFARLANE

Meeting with the President and Congressional leadership 8:00 p.m., Monday, 24 October.

Background

- Grenada is an island country with a population of 85,000.
- In 1974, it became an independent member of the British Commonwealth.
- On March 13, 1979, Maurice Bishop overthrew the existing government.
- Before, during and after Bishop's coup, <u>Cuba's Ambassador</u> was one of Castro's most skilled covert action operatives, Oswaldo Cardenas (the same Cuban who helped the Suriname dictator murder the democratic opposition there in December 1982).
- Bishop's New Jewel Movement became increasingly doctrinaire, pro-Cuban and repressive.
- Under the guise of non-alignment, the Bishop dictatorship worked increasingly close with Cuba and the Soviet Union.
- Currently, an estimated 600 Cubans and 30 Soviets are on the island.

Negative Consequences of the Bishop Regime and its Successor

- Repression for the people of Grenada with thousands fleeing the country.
- Cooperation with <u>Cuba</u> and Libya in <u>subversive activities</u> directed against neighboring Caribbean democracies.
- Completion of a new airfield with a 9,000 foot runway meant that the Soviet Union might land nuclear capable bombers there -- perhaps one way of carrying out their threats to respond with "analagous measures," to the coming INF deployment in Europe.
- The port of St. Georges is capable of accommodating Soviet nuclear ballistic submarines and their tenders -- another possible Soviet response to INF.
- The most hard-line, marxist-leninist group staged a coup against Bishop on October 12 leading to his death along with five of his Cabinet ministers -- producing an even worse government.

PUBLIC STATEMENT FOR THE PRESIDENT AFTER THE OPERATION HAS BEGUN

Ladies and Gentlemen:

Early this morning, forces from six Caribbean democracies and the United States landed on the island of Grenada in the Eastern Caribbean.

I ordered American participation in this multinational effort, which was organized at the urgent, formal request of the five democracies in the Organization of Eastern Caribbean States. Forces from seven countries, including contingents from Antigua, Barbados, Dominica, Jamaica, St. Lucia, St. Vincent and the United States are now on Grenada.

We have taken this decisive action for three reasons:

first, and of over-riding importance, to protect innocent

lives, including up to 1,000 Americans whose personal safety

is my paramount concern; second, to forestall further

disorder; and three, to assist in the restoration of democracy

Let there be no misunderstanding: this collective action has been forced on us by events that have no precedent in the Eastern Caribbean, and no place in any civilized society.

American lives are at stake. What appears to have begun the evening of October 12, as a struggle for power among contending factions of a dictatorship, degenerated into widescale murder. In the midst of this extraordinarly dangerous situation, the only visible act of authority has been imposition of a shoot-on-sight curfew. We have witnessed a complete disintegration of any organized authority.

The Caribbean democracies and the United States have since 1980 - been concerned by Grenada's tightening links to
Cuba and the Soviet Union. The tragic events of the last ten
days, appear to have had no direct relationship to either the
Soviets or the Cubans. We do know, however, that Grenada's
self-proclaimed military leaders are hard-line Communists with
close and long-held ties to Moscow and Havana. These new
rulers have not succeeded in establishing peace or stability.

Last weekend, Grenada's neighbors in the Organization of Eastern Caribbean States were still unable to receive reliable information or assurances. They decided they had to take collective action to restore constitutional and democratic order in Grenada.

The Organization formally appealed for assistance to their Caribbean neighbors and friendly governments. They pointed out that the stakes include not only the physical safety of the people in Grenada, both foreigners and citizens of that country, but the peace and security of the entire Eastern Caribbean region.

We had been following the situation as closely as possible. Between 800 to 1000 Americans, including many medical students and senior citizens, make up the largest single group of foreign residents in Grenada. From the start of these latest troubles, we have consciously sought to calm fears. We were determined not to make an already bad situation worse, and increase the risks our citizens faced.

But when I received reports that a large number of our citizens were seeking to escape the island, thereby exposing themselves to great danger, and after receiving a formal request for help from neighboring states, I concluded the United States had no choice but to act strongly and decisively. I thus agreed to the urgent requests from Grenada's neighbors to participate in the joint effort now underway.

Let me repeat, United States' objectives are clear: to protect U.S. citizens, to facilitate the evacuation of those who want to leave, and to help in the restoration of democratic institutions in Grenada.

I understand that several Caribbean states have already asked that the Organization of American States consider the situation in Grenada. Our diplomacy will work in close cooperation with the Organization of Eastern Caribbean States and the other countries participating in this multilateral effort.

I. <u>PURPOSE</u>: This meeting has been called to consult with the Congressional leadership regarding the use of U.S. military forces in Grenada. This is a follow-on to the restricted leadership meeting held last night.

II. <u>BACKGROUND</u>: On October 23, 1983, seven Caribbean democracies, including the Organization of Eastern Caribbean States (OECS), Barbados and Jamaica requested U.S. support and participation in restoring peace, order, and democracy to Grenada. This request resulted from the recent coup in which Prime Minister Maurice Bishop, at least 3 of his Cabinet, and as many as 18 civilians were killed. A revolutionary military council under General Hudson Austin is now running the country. There are 800 to 1000 Americans on the island, most of them students at St. George's Medical School.

In response to the request from the OECS and evidence of continued instability and threat to American citizens, the U.S. agreed to the plea for assistance. At about 5:00 a.m., October 25, 1983 (this morning), approximately 1,900 U.S. Marines and soldiers landed on Grenada as part of a multi-national force. The objectives of this operation are to:

- -- protect American lives;
- -- restore democracy to Grenada; and,
- -- prevent further Cuban/Soviet influence in Grenada.

TALKING POINTS FOR USE BY THE PRESIDENT

MEETING WITH CONGRESSIONAL LEADERSHIP

- We now have approximately 1,900 U.S. Marines and soldiers on Grenada as part of a multi-national force to restore order, peace, and democracy to these suffering people.
- As some of you undoubtedly know, the recent coup in Grenada resulted in the death of Prime Minister Maurice Bishop, 3 of his Cabinet members, and at least 18 civilians.
- We have been seriously concerned for the safety and lives of our 800 to 1,000 American citizens on the island.
- On October 23, we received a formal request from the Organization of Eastern Caribbean States (OECS: Antiqua, Dominica, St. Kitts/Nevis, St. Lucia, St. Vincent), as well as Jamaica and Barbados, for U.S. participation and assistance in this endeavor.
- In response to this request for help and the threat to our citizens, I authorized U.S. military forces to participate in this operation. Approximately 250 allied troops are now or soon will be on the ground with our units.
- In making this difficult decision, I weighed, with my advisors, the risk to our citizens, the evidence of further radicalization of Grenada, and the obvious indications of increased Cuban intervention/influence.

CONCERNING SAFE PASSAGE, ADCM STATED THAT ANY CITIZENS WHO WISHED TO LEAVE GRENADA WOULD BE ASSISTED IN DOING SO, BUT THAT NO INFERENCE SHOULD BE DRAWN WITH REGARD TO ANY "OCCUPATION" OF GRENADA.

- 4. BESSMERTNYKH THEN ASSERTED THAT THE US WAS PERPETRATING "AN ACT OF UNPROVOKED MILITARY AGGRESSION" AGAINST A SOVEREIGN STATE. HE SAID THAT THERE WERE, IN FACT, SOVIET CITIZENS IN GRENADA AND THAT THE UNITED STATES WOULD BEAR FULL RESPONSIBILITY FOR THEIR SAFETY. FINALLY, BESSMERT-NYKH STATED THAT THE US WAS PRIMARILY RESPONSIBLE FOR WHAT WAS A CLEAR VIOLATION OF INTERNATIONAL NORMS AND WAS USING OTHER COUNTRIES' PARTICIPATION IN AN ATTEMPT TO DISGUISE THIS. HE SAID THAT JUST BECAUSE THIS ACTION WAS TAKING PLACE "IN THE US' BACKYARD" DID NOT EXCUSE THE US FROM OBSERVING INTERNATIONAL NORMS. FINALLY, HE UNDERTOOK TO REPORT OUR APPROACH TO HIS SUPERIORS.
- TELEPHONED THE CHARGE TO DELIVER A PROTEST AGAINST
 THE "INVASION OF 7,000 AMERICAN TROOPS." JACOBS
 SAID HE WAS DELIVERING THE PROTEST AT THE INSTRUCTION
 OF GENERAL AUSTIN. HE ADDED THAT 1,000 AMERICAN
 TROOPS HAD ALREADY BEEN KILLED AND IT WAS THE POLICY
 OF THE GOVERNMENT OF GRENADA TO KILL ALL OF THE AMERICAN
 TROOPS ON THE ISLAND. HE ALSO SAID THAT NINE U.S.
 HELICOPTERS HAD BEEN SHOT DOWN AND THAT 700 GRENADIAN
 TROOPS HAD BEEN KILLED. CHARGE IMMEDIATELY REJECTED
 THE PROTEST AND SAID THAT THE ACTION WAS BEING TAKEN
 AT THE REQUEST OF THE ORGANIZATION OF EASTERN
 CARIBBEAN STATES AND WITH THE PARTICIPATION OF FORCES
 FROM THE MEMBER STATES, BARBADOS, AND JAMAICA, AS
