HIS EXCELLENCY CHUN DOO HWAN PRESIDENT OF THE REPUBLIC OF KOREA

DEAR MR. PRESIDENT:

ON BEHALF OF THE AMERICAN PEOPLE, LET ME EXPRESS TO YOU AND TO THE KOREAN PEOPLE OUR SORROW AND CONDOLENCES OVER THE ATTACK ON KOREAN AIRLINES FLIGHT 007. I AM SHOCKED AND DEEPLY SADDENED BY THIS DASTARDLY ACTION, AND MY EMOTIONS ARE SHARED BY ALL OF MY FELLOW COUNTRYMEN.

OUR HEARTS AND OUR PRAYERS GO OUT TO THE FAMILIES, FRIENDS AND LOVED ONES OF THOSE WHO HAVE PERISHED. IT A TRAGEDY FOR BOTH THEM AND FOR THE WORLD THAT INNOCENT IT IS LIFE SHOULD BE SO NEEDLESSLY AND CRUELLY TAKEN.

IN AN AGE WHICH PRIDES ITSELF ON ITS ACHIEVEMENT AND CIVILIZATION, THIS OUTRAGEOUS EVENT SERVES TO REMIND US OF THE CONTINUED BRUTALITY IN OUR WORLD, AND OF THE WILLINGNESS OF THE SOVIET UNION TO DEFY THE NORMS OF ACCEPTABLE INTERNATIONAL BEHAVIOR. IT SHOULD ALSO REMIND US OF THE CONTINUING NEED FOR COOPERATION AND SUPPORT AMONG FRIENDS AND ALLIES IN THE FREE WORLD.

OUR GOVERNMENTS WILL REMAIN IN CLOSE TOUCH AS TOGETHER WE PURSUE THIS ISSUE IN THE SECURITY COUNCIL AND THROUGH OTHER APPROPRIATE ACTIONS.

Secretary Regan is going to head the U.S. delegation to the fourth session of the U.S.-China Joint Economic Committee in Beijing the week of March 19. He will meet with Premier Zhao while in Beijing and with President Chun of Korea during a stop there. Attached are suggested letters from the President to Premier Zhao (Tab A) and President Chun (Tab B) which Secretary Regan would like to hand deliver. The speechwriters have cleared the texts of the letters.

Since Secretary Regan will be leaving early Saturday, March 16, we will need to have the signed letters back by <u>Friday afternoon</u>.
