Attached at Tab 1 is a proposed reply to Chairman Chernenko's letter to you of July 7 regarding the proposed Vienna meeting. Secretary Shultz has reviewed this draft. In so doing, however, he noted that the seventh and, particularly, the eighth paragraphs, which deal with the question of new technologies and their potential effect on strategic stability, have important implications for the conduct of future discussions with the Soviet Union.

At Tab 2 is a revised version of the eighth paragraph containing a more cautious formulation on this issue, which you may also wish to consider.

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PARAGRAPH 8 - ALTERNATIVE FORMULATION

This means that we really face two broad problems in the arms control field: how to limit and reduce existing programs; and how to foreclose future developments having potentially destabilizing consequences. Up to now we have concentrated most of our efforts on the former problem, and we must continue to do so since we both have an interest in lowering arms levels and enhancing stability. Your proposal provides us an opportunity to address new technological developments with potentially far-reaching implications. I welcome this, and believe we should, in this context, include consideration of what might be done in regard to new offensive systems that could be developed in the next decade or so. Perhaps the time has come for us to reexamine together the strategic situation -- not only as it exists today, but as it may develop through the rest of this century -- and to explore possibilities for agreeing on constraints which could deliver our successors from the threats to stability that we have repeatedly faced in the past.

ORAL REPLY BY KONSTANTIN U. CHERNENKO (Received November 8, 1984)

Thank you for the oral message transmitted through
Ambassador Hartman. I would like to take this opportunity
personally to congratulate you on your reelection to the post of
President of the USA.

I want to reaffirm that I and my colleagues in the Soviet leadership come out firmly for reversing the present unfavorable trends in the international situation and in Soviet-American relations. We take note of your statement about the possibility and necessity of establishing more stable and constructive relations between our two countries for the long term .
