1. SENTIRE TEXT.

2. AMBASSADOR SHOULD DELIVER THE LETTER BEGINNING PARA 3 FROM THE PRESIDENT TO CHERNENKO ALONG WITH THE DRAFT STATEMENT AT HIGHEST AVAILABLE LEVEL OF THE MFA ON SATURDAY. 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



July 26 Letter From Chernenko on Vienna

Soviet Charge Sokolov, under the impression I was out of town, came in today to hand over to Ken Dam a new letter from Chernenko on Vienna. The letter takes a tough line. It claims our response to their proposed announcement "does not tally" with the statement in your letter that you accept their proposal and leaves "no doubt whatsoever" that we are "not prepared to conduct negotiations with the aim of preventing the militarization of outer space." Chernenko says that they "regret that the current American position makes it impossible to conduct the negotiations," that they would be ready to "return to consideration of the issue" should we change our position, and that the Soviet position of June 29 remains in force.

Sokolov had nothing to add to this message and Ken did not comment other than to say we would forward it to you right away. The letter, with a translation, is attached.

I will have recommendations for you shortly on how we should deal with this situation.

Dear Mr. President:

In your letter of July 18, it was stated that you accept without any preconditions our proposal of June 29, and the wish was expressed that our representatives work out an agreed statement regarding the beginning of the negotiations we proposed.

Taking this into account, on July 21 we handed over to the American side a draft of such an agreed statement prepared in strict conformity with what we proposed on June 29, namely: to begin negotiations with the aim of working out and concluding an agreement on preventing the militarization of outer space, including complete mutual renunciation of anti-satellite systems, and to establish from the day of the beginning of the negotiations a mutual moratorium on testing and deployment of space weapons.

Since, as I have already noted, you wrote that you accepted our proposal of June 29, it was natural to expect that such a text of a joint statement would not meet with any objections on the American side.

However, the response which we received through the Department of State does not tally in any way with what was said in your letter. The draft statement proposed by the American side has nothing at all to do with the negotiations which we proposed. Instead of negotiations on outer space, it speaks of some "meeting to discuss and to define approaches for negotiating" and it is absolutely unclear what the negotiations will be about.

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To put it briefly, Mr. President, no doubt whatsoever now remains that the American side is not prepared to conduct negotiations with the aim of preventing the militarization of outer space.

To be candid, we deeply regret the unwillingness of the American side to reach agreement on this vitally important problem. We believed and continue to believe that now, while things have not yet gone too far, it would be easier to reach agreement on the complete prohibition of the entire class of space attack systems. Such is the objective of our proposal for the negotiations.

And the establishment of a mutual moratorium on testing and deployment of space attack weapons, as we proposed to do in conjunction with the beginning of the negotiations, would of itself be a major step showing, among other things, the commitment of the sides to the goals of strengthening strategic stability and reducing the military threat.

I repeat, we regret that the current American position makes it impossible to conduct the negotiations. Should this position subsequently change -- and we would like to hope this will happen -- and should the wish be expressed on the part of the U.S. to start negotiations with the aim of reaching agreement on the complete and unconditional prohibition of space weapons, we would be ready to return to consideration of this issue. In other words, our position, as it was presented in the statement by the Soviet Government of June 29, remains in force.

Уважаемый господин Президент,

В Вашем письме от 18 июля говорилось, что Вы принимаете без каких-либо предварительных условий наше предложение от 29 июня, а также было выражено пожелание, чтобы наши представители подготовили согласованное сообщение насчет начала предложенных нами переговоров.

С учетом этого 2I июля нами был передан американской стороне проект такого совместного сообщения, составленный в строгом соответствии с тем, что предлагалось нами 29 июня, а именно: приступить к переговорам с целью выработки и заключения соглашения о предотвращении милитаризации космоса, включая полный взаимный отказ от противоспутниковых систем, с установлением со дня начала переговоров взаимного моратория на испытания и развертывание космических вооружений.

Поскольку, как я уже отмечал, Вы писали, что принимаете сделанное нами 29 июня предложение, то естественно было ожидать, что такой текст совместного сообщения не должен был бы вызвать возражений с американской стороны.

Однако ответ, который мы подучили через государственный департамент, никак не согласуется с тем, что говорилось в Вашем письме. Предлагаемый американской стороной проект сообщения вообще не имеет никакого отношения к тем переговорам, которые предложили мы. Вместо переговоров по космосу в нем идет речь о какой-то "встрече для обсуждения и определения подходов к переговорам", причем к переговорам совершенно неясно о чем.

Короче говоря, господин Президент, теперь не остается никаких сомнений в том, что американская сторона не готова вести переговоры с целью недопущения милитаризации космического пространства.

Нежелание американской стороны договариваться по этой жизненно важной проблеме, скажу прямо, вызывает у нас глубокое сожаление. Мы считали и считаем, что сейчас, пока дело еще не зашло слишком далеко, достичь договоренности о полном запрещении всего класса ударных космических средств было бы легче. Такова цель нашего предложения о переговорах.

Да и введение на взаимной основе моратория на испытания и развертывание ударных космических вооружений, как это предлагалось сделать нами в сочетании с началом переговоров, уже само по себе было бы крупным шагом, показывающим, помимо всего прочего, приверженность сторон целям укрепления стратегической стабильности и ослабления военной угрозы.

Повторяю, мы сожалеем, что нынешняя американская позиция делает невозможным проведение переговоров. Если впоследствии

эта позиция изменится, — а хотелось бы все же на это надеяться, — и со стороны США будет выражено желание начать переговоры с целью достижения договоренности о полном и безусловном запре— щении космического оружия, мы будем готовы вернуться к рассмотрение этого вопроса. Иными словами, наша позиция, как она была сформулирована в Заявлении Советского правительства от 29 июня, остается в силе.

Dear Mr. Chairman:

Candor should be an essential feature of our dialogue given the responsibilities of our two offices. Thus, I must be frank in informing you that I am surprised by your letter of July 26, 1984, since it draws conclusions which are not warranted by the explanations I have given you.

Mr. Chairman, since receiving your proposal to begin negotiations on the "militarization of space" on June 29, I have believed that our two countries have an important opportunity to make progress in arms control in an area of fundamental importance. This is why I immediately accepted your proposal and in subsequent letters and diplomatic exchanges suggested that our representatives get down to work on developing an agreed formulation for the Vienna meeting, so that negotiations there could lead to meaningful results.

Thus, I am disturbed that in your most recent letter, you misrepresent our position. Let me once again make the US position absolutely clear. As I stated in my letter to you of July 2, your proposal for a conference on the "militarization of outer space" remains "an excellent idea." Of course, as I have indicated before, there may be differences between the two sides over the precise meaning of the concept of "militarization of outer space." But that is not unusual; throughout our experience in negotiating arms control, our representatives have disagreed over precise definitions but they have resolved these differences.

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[You referred to the proposed public statements exchanged by our representatives. We considered yours inappropriate as a public statement at this time because it contained preconditions to negotiation and sweeping commitments which, in the absence of negotiation, cannot seriously be made by either side. Since my acceptance of your proposal was without preconditions and was based on the assumption that your proposal also contained none, your text was not appropriate.]

[You have, on several occasions, proposed a moratorium on the testing and deployment of space weapons and I owe you my thoughts on this subject. I must say frankly that inasmuch as

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the Soviet Union is the only nation which has tested and developed an anti-satellite weapon, the proposal is vulnerable to the suspicion that it is designed to preserve a unilateral advantage. You will recall that, in 1978 and 1979, when our governments last conducted negotiations on this subject, it was the Soviet Union which refused to negotiate a total ban. I infer that your position on this score has changed, but have yet to receive an explanation of the reasons for the change, or the basis for your judgment that such a ban could be verified.

[Nevertheless, we both should be able to agree that, in the context of ongoing negotiations which have realistic prospects of success, neither side should take actions which would undermine the goal of the negotiations. I do not, therefore, exclude the possibility that our negotiators could agree on a formula for mutual restraints to cover the period of the negotiations.]

So, Mr. Chairman, contrary to your assertion in your latest letter, the United States is prepared to negotiate on the "militarization of outer space" without preconditions. I must remind you that it is the Soviet Union, not the United States, that seems unwilling to reach negotiated solutions to important military problems. It was, after all, the Soviet Union and not the United States that left the negotiations on Intermediate Range Nuclear Forces in Geneva. And it is the Soviet Union and not the United States that continues to refuse to cooperate on the important task of reducing strategic arms. Thus, Mr. Chairman, your latest letter raises a question in my mind about whether, having made a proposal to go to Vienna, you are now backing away from it. I hope this is not the case, for in that event I would be forced to conclude that your aim is not negotiations but something else.

If, as you say in your latest letter, your proposal still stands, I think it is time now for our representatives to work out the preparations for the meeting in Vienna, including, if possible, a joint statement. I have instructed Secretary of State Shultz to continue this effort. If your side approaches this task with the good will and serious intent which is the basis of my approach, I am confident that we can reach a goal which serves the interests of both our countries.



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Thus, I am disturbed that in your most recent letter, you misrepresent our position. Let me once again make the US position absolutely clear. As I stated in my letter to you of July 2, your proposal for a conference on the "militarization of outer space" remains "an excellent idea." The concept of the "militarization of outer space" is a broad one, and as I have indicated previously, in my view accommodates offensive as well-Thus, as where sep acid Many Times we can want to tall, at U as defensive systems. Your side may have a different concept, but the important thing at this stage is for our negotiators to meet in Vienna and work out whatever differences may exist.

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#### Joint Soviet-American Statement

As a result of exchanges through diplomatic channels between the USA and the USSR, agreement has been reached to open talks with the aim of working out and concluding agreements concerning the militarization of outer space, including anti-satellite systems and other aspects of this issue. The talks will begin in Vienna on September 18, 1984 at the level of specially appointed delegations.

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Please also comment on the possible additional statement below:

It has also been agreed that beginning with the date of the commencement of the talks in Vienna, a mutual two-year moratorium on the testing and deployment of anti-satellite weapons and related systems will be established. The Soviet side has furthermore pledged itself, with the commencement of talks in Vienna, to undertake the dismantlement of its existing anti-satellite system, a task which shall be completed by November 18, 1984.

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
