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

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



Dear Mr. President:

Last October, in connection with the Pakistan economic and military assistance package, you certified to the Congress that Pakistan did not possess a nuclear explosive device and that our assistance would reduce significantly the risk that Pakistan would possess such a device.

Since then, a number of events have occurred which suggest that the previous certification may no longer be valid.

On February 24th, the Governmental Affairs Committee heard testimony from the author of a new report by the Carnegie Endowment that Pakistan probably has the components with which to make a nuclear weapon. He stated that independent sources in Washington with access to American intelligence information also believe this.

In addition, Ambassador Dean Hinton, in a speech delivered on February 16, 1987 in Islamabad stated that "For the future, I would note that it is open to question whether the President could so certify [that Pakistan does not have a nuclear explosive device] were he to conclude that Pakistan had in hand, but not assembled, all the needed components for a nuclear explosive device."

Finally, in a story printed last Sunday in the London Observer, Dr. Abdul Qadeer Khan, the man in charge of Pakistan's nuclear enrichment program, was quoted as saying that Pakistan now has the bomb and had produced highly enriched uranium. These statements were addressed to a respected Indian journalist and were verified by an independent Pakistani observer (the editor of the Muslim, a Pakistani newspaper) who wrote an editorial on the subject. Shortly thereafter, the Pakistani editor was forced to recant and resign his post after Dr. Khan disavowed the statements attributed to him.

In my view, the evidence points to the conclusion that all the components and the means for assembling a working nuclear explosive device are in Pakistan's possession.

As you know, I have been a staunch supporter of U. S. policy toward the Afghanistan situation. Despite my oft-expressed misgivings that we did not press the Pakistanis harder in 1979 and thereafter to alter the character of their nuclear program, I have supported U. S. assistance to Pakistan and to the Afghan rebels and refugees from the start of the Soviet invasion.

But our desire to deal with the unconscionable and illegal Soviet presence in Afghanistan should not blind us to the importance of pursuing our national interest in stopping the spread of nuclear weapons. A Pakistani bomb has the potential of starting a nuclear arms race in South Asia that in turn could have serious repercussions in the Middle East. In addition, a failure to draw the line in Pakistan will be seen by other countries of proliferation concern as a tacit admission by the United States that, rhetoric aside, its nonproliferation policy is only a facade.

I have always believed that, regardless of the fate of U. S. aid to Pakistan, it was and is in Pakistan's interest to continue to allow assistance to be provided to the Afghans. And I believe we should continue to try to provide assistance to the Afghans. But if the price that must now be paid is acceptance of Pakistani nuclear weapons production along with the continued provision of a "made in the U. S. A." delivery system (F-16s), a combination certain to ultimately erode the national security of the United States and some of its closest allies, then the price is too high.

Accordingly, Mr. President, I urge that you immediately undertake a thorough review of the situation in South Asia, including a reexamination of our information concerning the Pakistani nuclear program, and that all military assistance to Pakistan be suspended during this review.

I also urge that such assistance not be restarted until you have received reliable assurances from the Pakistanis that they have ceased producing nuclear explosive materials. I believe this will be an easier test to verify than the test of "possession" of a nuclear weapon, especially since it is apparent that some people in the Administration seem to be willing to define "possession" in terms of whether the last screw has been turned in the bomb casing.

This situation is, at present, the most critical test of America's commitment to prevent the spread of nuclear weapons. The security of future generations of Americans and other peoples of the world is dependent on whether we pass this test.
