Bolstering Our Defenses against Palestinian

Terrorism

The President's note on your daily report (Tab A) inquires whether we have taken any action to respond to radical Palestinian threats at certain overseas missions. In short, the answer is yes. The question is, "Is it enough?"

Since the beginning of the Lebanese conflict, the IG/T has met four times and the Terrorism Incident Working Group has met twice. All meetings dealt, at least in part, with the terrorist impact of the Invasion on US interests -- and what we should do about it.

As a result of these meetings the following actions have been taken:

- All overseas posts / missions (military and diplomatic) have been alerted, and queried re:
 - adequacy of local (in-house) security arrangements
 - Marine Security Guard procedures, rotations and enhanced presence
 - Route variations and domicile security procedures for assigned personnel
 - Adequacy and procedures for indigenous security force response to threats
 - Local intelligence on dissident / radical activity that could pose a threat.
- DCI, DIA and State are increasing collection efforts in concert with Allied services to pinpoint the threat.
- Embassies / Missions that appear to be most likely targets have been site-surveyed by State Regional Security Offices.

• Where warranted, improvements are underway (alarms, better gates and doors, CS gas grenades, etc.).

To a certain extent we should expect that the increased number of reports we are seeing result directly from our interest (i.e., Washington wants reports — therefore it gets them). This is not to infer that there is no threat. We have, for example, identified more than 20 overseas missions that may be at risk and which could be targets for radical Palestinian action. Though CIA, DIA and State cannot categorically prioritize which posts are most vulnerable (since most of the intelligence is sketchy at best) — the IG/T and TIWG membership generally feel that Amman, Dacca, Islamabad, Georgetown (Guyana) and Sanna are highest on the risk list.

It must also be pointed out that specific threats to individual missions are difficult to pin down and verify (for example, last month's "hard intelligence" on the plans to assassinate our Ambassador in Athens turned out to be bogus). Furthermore, countermeasures to assassination, bombings, kidnappings, generated "public disorder," etc. vary widely. Thus simply adding more Marine Guards from a very finite supply is not necessarily an appropriate remedy.

There are several conclusions that should be drawn from all this:

- A major Israeli action to destroy the PLO would likely result in an attempt by radical Palestinian organizations to exact simultaneous reprisals against Americans in multiple locations overseas. Though difficult to orchestrate, this is assessed as a possibility and would present a worse-case situation.
- There is at this time no significant threat to officials in the United States (FBI is following two leads in U.S. -- one originating in Alexandria, Virginia, and now in New Mexico, and another in Florida).
- We cannot, without the overt assistance of local governments, protect our overseas missions and personnel from a concerted terrorist effort.
- Our own response capability (JSOC) is limited to dealing with two (possibly three) incidents concurrently and further constrained by host government willingness to permit their involvement.

Our options under these circumstances are very restricted. There are, however, three pre-active measures which may yield results in <u>preventing</u> an incident (as distinct from responding once an incident is certain or occurs).

-- Reduce public rhetoric about the fate of the PLO (newscasts today carry a statement attributed to a "White House spokesman" that the "PLO will be crushed if they do not soon leave Beirut." While all this may indeed be true, it is not helpful).

- -- Use ICA / VOA assets to broadcast statements (white propaganda) citing the futility of terrorist actions.
- -- Send a series of high-level démarches from Secretary Shultz or even the President to those capitals that may be "reluctant" to come to our assistance if one of our missions is threatened. We have asked State to explore this possibility. (Tab C)

There are, of course, additional measures that can -- and would be -- taken if the threat becomes more tangible. We could, for example, reduce the size of the mission -- as we did in Buenos Aires during the Falklands Crisis. The background above and the proposed talking points at Tab I are for your use in responding to the President's question at Tab A.

Recommendation

That you use the talking points at Tab I to respond to the President.



Talking Points for Use in Responding to the President's Query on Terrorism

- -- You asked if we were "bolstering our defenses" to meet a potential terrorist threat.
- -- As you know, we have two groups that deal with terrorism:
 - -- Interdepartmental group on Terrorism long-range policy
 - -- Terrorism Incident Working Group manage incidents
 - -- Both have met to determine our options.
- -- More than 20 posts and missions have been threatened since the Lebanese conflict started two months ago.
- -- Some indications that PLO / Radical Palestinian Groups may attempt concerted, simultaneous action if Beirut invaded.
- -- Most vulnerable posts: Amman, Dacca, Islamabad, Georgetown (Guyana), and Sanaa.
- -- Following actions underway as a result of IG/T and TIWG action:
 - Increased Marine Security Guard assets and rotations.
 - Warnings to mission personnel re routes and schedules.
 - Requests to local governments for increased security and response capability.
- -- Most critical item is local government support. State has been asked to assess value of démarche to high-risk capitals, citing our concern.
- -- Also exploring utility of using VOA / ICA assets to stress futility of terrorist action.

- -- We are also looking at downplaying US commentary on consequences to PLO if they do not agree to withdraw.
- -- Will continue to watch situation -- system alerted to respond but assets (JSOC) limited.
- -- Next preemptive step is to start reducing size of missions at high-risk posts not a desirable step to take (e.g., Buenos Aires during Falklands crisis).

the delegation accompanying Prime Minister Gandhi on her visit was very pleased with the results and that it had served to reconcile Indo-U.S. misunderstandings.

- o The delegation was pleasantly surprised by your positive attitude toward India and your cordiality and friendliness.
- o A breakthrough had been made which marks a new chapter in relations with the U.S.

U.S. Air Operations North of Libya

on July 27 and August 1, there were no Libyan reactions to penetrations of the Tripoli FIR by U.S. aircraft; no notices of intent were issued. However, on July 8, when a notice was issued, Libyan reactions included propaganda denunciations, military alerts and deployment of 11 naval units to patrol the Libyan coast. (TSC)

Message From Liberian Head of State

Liberian Head of State Samuel Doe has thanking you for your recent congratulatory message on the occasion of Liberia's 135th independence anniversary. Doe also states he is looking forward to meeting you to discuss bilateral and international issues.

Regarding Doe's upcoming visit to Washington,
Doe's foreign minister, who would like
to see Liberia move away from its special relationship with the
U.S., may undermine the visit by loading the agenda
with last-minute assistance requests which he knows have little
chance of U.S. acceptance.

o Foreign Minister Fahnbulleh proposed assistance projects to be discussed during the visit.

According to State Department, Doe apparently is not inclined to make specific requests of you and is likely to block his foreign minister's attempts.

Anti-American Terrorist Threat

The PLO office in Sanaa, North Yemen, has
to "retaliate" if the Israelis enter West Beirut by
attacking U.S. property and killing U.S. citizens, according to a
reliable diplomatic source. In addition, the Democratic Front
for the Liberation of Palestine reportedly is considering
anti-American terrorism in South Yemen and Jordan.

o According to State Department, this is the second indication in two weeks that the PLO office in Sanaa is planning to attack the U.S. presence in the event of an Israeli attack on Beirut.

SUBJECT:

Bolstering our Defenses against Terrorism

Please regard this as an informal note -- not through Secretariat channels.

The President has asked "are we bolstering our defenses?" re the radical Palestinian threat to our overseas missions. I have provided him a brief, assuring that we are, but noting that at the bottom line, we are dependent on indigenous security forces -- provided at the pleasure of the host state.

Despite numerous international conventions, treaties, bilateral agreements, we are, of course, ultimately vulnerable if a local regime decides that it is in its own best interest not to respond when a U.S. mission is threatened. It would appear that we could well be faced with the situation -- particularly in the Islamic countries -- or those with large Palestinian populations. Would it, in your opinion, be useful to send letters to some of these leaders (or foreign ministers) expressing our concerns, etc.?

This is <u>not</u> to propose blanket cables or mailing. Rather, if your most recent survey indicates that some posts are particularly vulnerable -- or that certain governments are being less than fully responsive -- we might wish to prod them into action with a carefully crafted note from Secretary Shultz or even President Reagan.

Your views on this proposal would be appreciated.

Terrorism Exercise

State Department, OSD/JCS and NSC are currently involved in planning a joint US/UK combination counter-terrorism CPX/FTX from 7 to 10 November 1982. The exercise will be conducted at Hurlbert Field, Eglin Airforce Base, Florida.

The British are planning to simulate the COBRA. I have told State that we will simulate the TIWG. Basic guidance per our conversation last night is that since the British are playing at the working level, we will too. A simulated TIWG will be established at Hurlbert Field on the 7th and played throughout the exercise. While I do not believe the exercise deserves your full attention, it probably would be useful for you to visit the site during the exercise. This would also serve to answer to Noel Koch's concerns about more active TIWG intervention.

Prior to the US/UK exercise, we should have the TIWG TABLETOP (four hours). I have gone through the basic scenario and while complex, it should suffice. A Saturday or Sunday would probably be most appropriate to run the exercise.

If you agree, I will raise these points at the IG/T meeting on Friday.

Recommendations

That you choose a date for the TIWG TABLETOP.

Invitation to Attend Capabilities Demonstration

Attached at Tab A is an invitation from Secretary Weinberger for you to attend a capabilities demonstration of the Counter Terrorist Joint Task Force (CTJTF). This unit provides the primary U.S. military response capability for dealing with terrorist activities against the U.S.

As indicated in the scheule on the invitation, the total program, including travel time, will take about 15 hours from before noon on October 7 through return shortly after midnight on the 8th. Other invitees include Secretary of State, Secretary of Treasury, Director/FEMA, Chairman/Joint Chiefs of Staff, Commandant/US Marine Corps, and various other officials. Secretary Weinberger has already seen the demonstration and will not be attending.

Given the Administration's stance on terrorism and a forthcoming JCS proposal re Special Operations for the Defense Guidance, there should be someone conversant at the White House/NSC level with these capabilities. Although I was originally scheduled to attend the "dress rehearsal" on the 6th and 7th, I have since been deemed to be "too junior." It is, thus, even more important that someone attend the demonstration on the 7th and 8th.

Since you are already committed on the 7th, the proposed response at Tab I leaves a space for your designated representative to attend in your stead. Considering the apparent concern for protocol and based on availability, your representative should probably be selected from among Messers. McFarlane, Poindexter, or Boverie.

That you select a representative, sign and transmit the attached memorandum to Secretary of Defense.

SUBJECT: Capabilities Demonstration (U)

- 1. (S) In view of the ever increasing threat of international terrorism, I believe it essential that selected individuals from the Department of Defense and principals within the US Government be thoroughly familiar with our military capabilities to counter this threat. As a result, I would like to invite you to participate in a large-scale capabilities demonstration to be conducted by the Counterterrorist Joint Task Force (CTJTF) on 7 October 1982. Activities will be conducted at Ft. Bragg, North Carolina, and North Field, South Carolina, emphasizing tactics and techniques developed by the CTJTF since its activation in October 1980.

Dr. Ikle called by secure line this afternoon and made points along the following lines:

- DOD is trying hard to do all it can regarding counterterrorism.
 - Two CPX's are coming up with the British and the Germans.
- State is taking a different view from that of DOD (i.e., State is not pressing as hard).
- Some principals are not able to devote sufficient dedicated time to the problem.
- He would like to see Noel Koch play a more active role for the NSC. Noel could wear a second hat -- an NSC hat -- for counterterrorism.
- Suggest that this be proposed to Judge Clark. If Judge Clark agrees, Noel Koch could chair the TIWG or a new group.
- Current process is being slowed down by some people. USG should be more active. DOD has the assets. TIGW and IG are somewhat disparate. If Judge Clark approves, Noel Koch could devote dedicated time and make this work for the NSC (coordinating with other agencies).
