

- (b) If introduced within 30 days after the submission of the report required by paragraph (2) of subsection (a), a resolution under paragraph (3) of subsection (a) shall be considered in the Senate in accordance with the provisions of section 601(b) of the International Security Assistance and Arms Export Control Act of 1976 and in the House of Representatives in accordance with the procedures applicable to the consideration of resolutions of disapproval under section 36(b) of the Arms Export Control Act.
- (c) The prohibition contained in subsection (a) does not apply with respect to assistance which is furnished solely for humanitarian purposes.

(d) The provisions of this section may not be waived under any other provision of law.

(e) Section 404 of the International Security Assistance and Arms Export Control Act of 1976 is repealed.

On January 21, the President completed calls to six Allied Heads of State: Prime Minister Pierre Elliot Trudeau of Canada, Prime Minister Arnaldo Forlani of Italy, Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher of the United Kingdom, President Valery Giscard d'Estaing of France, Chancellor Helmut Schmidt of the Federal Republic of Germany and Prime Minister Zenko Suzuki of Japan.

The calls lasted uniformly less than five minutes, and during the course of the conversation the President indicated that he looked forward to working with the Allied leaders on problems of mutual concern to the United States and the respective countries. Highlights of the calls are:

Canada - Our countries share an historic friendship. The President attached great importance to close relations between the United States and Canada, with cooperation between the two countries a priority for the Administration. The President looks forward to meeting with Prime Minister Trudeau at an early date.

<u>Italy</u> - The Administration intends to consult closely and regularly with friends such as Italy. The common heritage and shared values of the people of the United States and Italy are very close, and it is the responsibility of leaders to see that the relationship remains close and cordial.

United Kingdom - Emphasizing the special importance that is attached to the relationship between our countries, the President thanked Mrs. Thatcher for her message of congratulations. It is necessary to work closely on mutual problems, and the President said that he and Mrs. Reagan are especially looking forward to welcoming the Prime Minister to Washington next month (February 25-28). The President also asked the Prime Minister to thank the Queen for the message in connection with the release of the hostages.

France - The relationship between France and the United States is vital for the two countries, and a close and cooperative relationship is of central importance to our security. It is hoped that an early meeting will take place, but in the meantime, "We can use the telephone for any conversation." The President indicated he looks forward to the opportunity to meet with Prime Minister Barre and Foreign Minister Francois-Poncet, who will be paying an official visit to Washington on February 21-23 to meet with Secretary Haig.

Germany - The President conveyed to Chancellor Schmidt that the Senate had confirmed Secretary Haig 93 - 6, noting that Secretary Haig is a close friend of the Chancellor. He expressed his intention to work closely with Chancellor Schmidt, to build on the close ties between our governments and peoples. He indicated that Secretary Haig had told of Foreign Minister Genscher's plans for a visit in March, recalled meeting with him in November, said he would look forward to seeing him when he was here. There was brief mention of the forthcoming Economic Summit Conference in Ottawa (July).

Japan - The President's five minute discussion with Prime Minister Suzuki stressed the close alliance between Japan and the United States. The President indicated he looks forward to working with and seeing Prime Minister Suzuki.

These highlights are for your background, and it would seem appropriate for you to characterize the calls in general terms without reference to the specifics mentioned here.

The key points of your telephone conversation this morning are summarized below:

- -- Schmidt asked your concurrence in an immediate public announcement that if "either internal or external" violence were used against Poland, there would be no Western economic assistance for that country. You concurred.
- -- The Soviet Ambassador to Germany had told Schmidt last week that Brezhnev wished to visit Bonn. Schmidt requested your concurrence in giving a positive reply "in principle," but that the visit would not be possible until late July, after both his visit here in May and the Ottawa Summit. You agreed on this reply, which is to be relayed to Moscow by Foreign Minister Genscher during his visit there next week. (2)
- -- Schmidt offered to send the Deputy Foreign Minister to Washington next week to relay the results of Foreign Minister Genscher's trips to Warsaw and Moscow. You told him such a visit would be welcome. (2)
- -- Finally, Schmidt said he had read that Secretary Haig was scheduled to visit London and Madrid on his Middle East trip. Schmidt said that a visit to Madrid was "O.K.," but that a visit to London without including Paris and Bonn "might be misinterpreted." You said that you would relay this information to the Secretary of State. (C)
- -- Schmidt said that on the German side press briefing of the phone call would include only the information on Poland, that the discussion of all other subjects would not be released. (2)


