Judge O'Connor, accompanied by Bob McConnell of the Justice Department and me, called on the following Senators today:

Mac Mathias
Orrin Hatch
Alan Simpson
Roger Jepsen
Chuck Grassley
Rudy Boschwitz.

Senator Mathias was very helpful pointing out that he, as a member of the Senate Judiciary Committee since 1969, has been involved in more confirmation hearings for Supreme Court Justices than any other member of the Republican side of the committee except for Chairman Thurmond. He pointed out that Clement Hainsworth got off on the wrong foot financially. Each new disclosure about his involvement in cases where companies in which he owned stock had an interest, damaged his reputation to the point where he could not serve on the court. Mathias said her views on abortion are immaterial and he took great umbrage at the Republican platform, which implied that Judges should be committed to certain points of view before being nominated to the Supreme Court. He expressed great confidence in her background and ability and he is highly pleased with this nomination.

During the course of an hour of discussion, he suggested that the following issues might come up:

1. Free press versus fair trail
2. Jurisdiction of the Federal Courts
3. Constitutional Convention
4. Criminal issues such as the exclusionary rule
5. Indigent representation
6. Miranda decision

7. Law Review article.

This was generally a very constructive, helpful conversation.

The meeting with Senator Hatch lasted about an hour and was a rambling monologue. Issues that he suggested might come up are:

1. Abortion and other family related issues
2. Affirmative action
3. So-called Fair Housing
4. Jurisdiction of the Courts.

Hatch did not seem to immediately comprehend that nominees to the Supreme Court must restrict their answers, so as not to prejudice participation in future cases. He intends to support her.

The meeting with Al Simpson was pleasant and included his wife, Ann. They discovered that each of them have a child who is a senior at Colorado College. Simpson agreed to be very helpful and he suggested that restriction of access to the courts in cases like busing would likely be the subject of intense questioning.

The meeting with Senator Jepsen lasted about a half-an-hour. He is not a member of the committee, but we were there in line with our commitment to see senators who request an opportunity to visit with her. His only interest seems to be the abortion issue and he does not seem to fully appreciate the importance of her restricted response.

The meeting with Senator Grassley lasted about a half-an-hour and went very well. He talked about his conservative philosophy generally and, of course, made his point on legislative veto.

A fifteen minute meeting with Senator Rudy Boschwitz was a pleasant meeting with little emphasis on substance. He is not a member of the committee and requested of me an opportunity to visit with her at the Policy Committee Luncheon yesterday. He is favorable of Judge O'Connor's nomination.

SUBJECT: Supreme Court Nominee

The Attorney General, Powell Moore and myself accompanied Judge O'Connor on her initial series of courtesy calls today to Capitol Hill.

The first visit was with Senator Strom Thurmond (R-S.C.), Chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee. This was the only visit of real substance, other than the Bob Byrd/Biden meeting.

Thurmond raised the issues of abortion, E.R.A., pornography, capital punishment, crime in general, and the drug problem.

Thurmond advised Judge O'Connor repeatedly not to let herself be "pinned down" on how she would rule as a Justice.

Thurmond seemed to be satisfied on the E.R.A. issue and indicated he himself had supported the measure in the early 70's.

With regard to pornography, Mrs. O'Connor told Senator Thurmond that she had supported legislation banning pornography sales 4,000 feet from a school, rather than a mile, because there was judicial precedent for 4,000 feet which she believed would be likely to stand up in Court.

O'Connor described herself to Senator Thurmond as "a conservative judge from a conservative state."

Thurmond raised the question of O'Connor being "alright as long as Reagan is in," implying she would vote liberal afterwards. Thurmond said this was a question he had received.

O'Connor responded that her record as both a legislator and judge will reflect her strong convictions and commitment on the issues.

Questioned by Thurmond about the death penalty, Judge O'Connor indicated she had authored the death penalty statute in Arizona, and has imposed the death penalty.

With regard to crime, Judge O'Connor called her past record on combating crime in both her professional responsibilities and as a private citizen. "I am concerned about crime and my record in the area of criminal law will reflect that I have been tough in this area; and the lawyers of Phoenix will confirm."

We also discussed timing of the nomination with Senator Thurmond and he advised unless there was time before the recess for both hearings and confirmation, he would recommend the hearings be held up until September. Senator Baker concurs in this recommendation.

Thurmond also questioned Mrs. O'Connor about being a strict constructionalist and advised her job on the Court would be to interpret the law and not make law.

Judge O'Connor then called on Senators Goldwater and DeConcini who escorted her to the office of the Majority Leader, Howard Baker.

Judge O'Connor also visited Senator Ted Stevens, the Senate Majority Whip, in his Capitol Office.

Senator Baker then escorted Judge O'Connor to the office of the Senate Minority Leader, Robert Byrd (D-W.Va.), where she met with Byrd and Senator Joseph Biden (D-Del.), ranking minority member of the Senate Judiciary Committee.

Senator Byrd stated: "From all I have heard and read about you, I intend to support and vote for your confirmation."

Senator Biden commented: "We are investigating you thoroughly with the purpose of accomodating and expediting your confirmation. I do not know of anyone on the Democratic side (of the Judiciary Committee) who is opposed. I am enthusiastically supporting you, and there will be no litmus test problems as far as the Democrats are concerned. We will focus on your judicial record and temperament."

Senator Byrd was extremely cordial and asked Judge O'Connor to remain until Mrs. Byrd arrived, and a photo taken.

We then met in the Speaker's office with Speaker O'Neill, Jim Wright, Tom Foley and Jim Jones. There was no substance here; photos and handshakes only.

The final visit was with Rep. Bob Michel, Eldon Rudd, John Rhodes, Trent Lott, and surprisingly, Henry Hyde, who posed no questions and stayed out of the photographs.

Judge O'Connor was greeted by large crowds of well-wishers at each stop.

Susan Glauwe phoned this evening with the following information which she asked me to convey to you.

1. You made the following statement before the Judiciary Committee of the Arizona Senate concerning Senate Memorial 1 on February 15, 1970:

The issue is whether we want to advocate stripping the Supreme Court of jurisdiction over certain matters because we disagree with some of its decisions. I, too, disagree with certain U.S. Supreme Court decisions in the field of pornography, but I cannot advocate limiting the Court's Appellate jurisdiction. Once we started such a procedure, where do we stop? One solution to the problem is to draft our legislation in this and other areas more carefully. Often cases are lost merely because of a failure to take the necessary time and care to draft laws which can be sustained. Another solution is to support our President in his selection and appointment of qualified judges for the Supreme Court. Appointment of judges with good legal background and experience will insure decisions which do not result in so much local distress.

2. House Bill 304, the "4000 foot bill" was passed in 1971 by a vote of 24-6. This bill required a 4,000 foot clearance

between pornography shops and elementary schools. Camping and Conlin voted in favor. Ms. Glauwe is still looking for the judicial opinion on this bill.

3. House Bill 2014, which lowered the drinking age, was passed in May, 1972. The following list of members voted in favor of the bill (and include Camping and Conlin):

There were 11 no votes, and Camping explained her vote.

4. Ms. Glauwe has located records of the "Marriage and Family Problems Commission" established by the Governor in 1961. She noted that this Commission established family conciliation courts and that you are on record as favoring a "cooling-off" period prior to divorce.

1. Mike Klipper (Mathias)

Mathias says this is "an appropriate time for a woman to be nominated." He thinks she has a distinguished record to date, but points out that her service as a jurist has been at the state, rather than the federal level. This, he feels, will put a premium on the hearings, and he intends to be an active participant. He will have questions about constitutional issues generally, court jurisdiction issues, and the constitutional amendment process. He wants to get an idea of how she approaches issues and looks forward to meeting her.

2. Joel Lisker (Denton)

Denton was concerned about early reports that Mrs. O'Connor was a proponent of abortion on demand and also her stand on ERA. He thinks that subsequent press reports have cleared up some things, but he still has questions on these issues. Lisher says they saw the Justice (Starr) memo and they felt it was not completely accurate. Denton has not made any public statements, and has an "open mind." He may ask questions on capital punishment.

3. Mike Epstein (Byrd, R.)

Says he hasn't discussed this with the Senator.

4. Ken Kay (Baucus)

Baucus is favorably disposed, but will reserve judgment pending hearings. He wants to know how she will respond to Sen. East's questions on the pro-life issue, and also her views on Roe v. Wade. Other questions on ERA, judicial membership in clubs which discriminate, judicial activism,

and attempts to limit jurisdiction of Supreme Court over constitutional issues.

Senator Don Nickles (R-Okla.) and Rep. Henry Hyde (R-Ill.) called this morning to protest the possible appointment of the Connor woman from Arizona to the Supreme Court.

Hyde also objected to the Kennedy woman's appointment.

Arguments made against Connor:

- 1) Unacceptable to pro-lifers; six times voted for unlimited abortion; favors E.R.A., and is a Mary Crisp clone.
- 2) Her appointment would cause a firestorm among Reagan supporters; a betrayal of the platform; resentment would be profound, and she was anti-Reagan.

Hyde also charged that Kennedy has issued an opinion in the Akron Ordinance case that is hostile to pro-lifers.

Senator Nickles said that if Connor is nominated, he and other pro-family Republican Senators will not support the choice.

Hyde suggested the name of Howard T. Markey, Chief Judge of the U. S. Court of Customs and Patents Appeals, for consideration.

He also said there is a woman Federal Judge serving in the St. Petersburg, Florida, area (he had no name) who has a good reputation and would be acceptable to conservatives.

SUBJECT: Supreme Court

Senator Helms called today to invite Mrs. O'Connor to appear next week before the Senate Republican Steering Committee, the conservative Senate organization which Senator Helms chairs.

The invitation will have to be carefully considered, but other Helms comments in connection with the proposal reflect a softening of his opposition.

He said that he believes such a meeting would allay the fears of conservative Senators.

Helms went on to say that he thinks the President "is right" about the nomination, and that the nomination "will be alright," and the goal should be to "get 100 Senators to vote for her."

Helms said he expects to receive "flak from the other Senators," if he supports the nomination, but gave the impression that he is now leaning that way.

Apparently Senator Goldwater has worked on Helms, because he mentioned that Barry had requested Helms help with the nomination.

As you know, Senator Helms can be changeable at times, but he sounds positive today.

1. During 1970 she supported an abortion on demand bill in the Committee on the Judiciary of the Arizona Senate and in the Arizona Senate Republican Caucus.

11. As a judge of an inferior court of a state bench she is viewed by many as inadequately experienced for the position of Justice of the United States Supreme Court.
