Soviet Forces In The Pacific

- Approximately one third of the Soviet Union's total forces are deployed in the East Asia-Pacific area. These forces consist of both centrally controlled strategic forces and regionally controlled theater forces.
- Strategic forces include about 30 nuclear ballistic missile submarines, approximately 380 intercontinental ballistic missiles, over 150 intermediate range ballistic missiles, 150 bombers, and additional support aircraft.
- Soviet Naval Forces: The Soviet Pacific Fleet is the largest of the four Soviet fleets. As of 1986 it included approximately:
 - 80 surface combatants
 - 90 attack submarines (majority nuclear powered)
 - 500 naval aircraft
 - 1 Naval Infantry Division (about 7000 troops)
 - Special Purpose (Spetsnaz) Forces
 - KGB Maritime Border Guards
- Soviet Ground Forces: Increased from 210,000 troops (25 divisions) in 1968 to 500,000 (57 divisions) in 1986.
 - Approximately 90% of these forces are on the border of the People's Republic of China.
 - In 1978, one division reinforced existing regular Soviet troops in the occupied Japanese Northern Territories.
- Soviet Air Forces: Increased numerically from the early 1960s (215 long range bombers and 1,050 fighter-bombers) to mid 1980s (353 long range bombers and 1,955 tactical combat aircraft).
- Most recent trends have focused on quality improvements.
 - Older Mig-21 tactical fighter replaced with much improved Mig-25 FOXBAT and Mig-31 FOXHOUND.
 - Noticeable range improvements such as introduction of the Su-24 FENCER fighter-bomber with range of 1800Km and the longer range BACKFIRE bomber.
 - SS-4 and SS-5 surface-to-surface missiles replaced with SS-20s (greater range, mobility, and number of warheads).
 - Aircraft carriers (Minsk and Novorossiysk) and latest nuclear powered guided missile cruiser Frunze.
- Soviet Power Projection: The Soviet base in Cam Ranh Bay, Vietnam has allowed expanded operations in the South China Sea, the Indian Ocean and the Persian Gulf.
 - Staging/refueling point for long range reconnaissance, anti-submarine and other combat aircraft
 - Staging/maintenance facility for submarines and surface combatants.

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
