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PRESIDENTIAL REMARKS: PRESIDENT CHUN OF KOREA
DEPARTURE STATEMENT
FRIDAY, APRIL 26, 1985

President Chun was the first state visitor of my Presidency. It was my pleasure to meet with him again today for a useful discussion of international and bilateral issues. The ties linking the Republic of Korea and the United States are many and strong. Our security ties -- which I reaffirmed today -- remain a lynch-pin of peace in Northeast Asia.

I vividly recall standing at the Korean Demilitarized Zone 16 months ago; perhaps nowhere in the world is the contrast between our shared democratic values and communism clearer than it is there on the D.M.Z. And nowhere is it clearer that strength is the surest path to peace.

In reference to his country's security, President Chun and I share concern about the continuing forward deployment of North Korean forces toward the Demilitarized Zone. We agreed that this deployment heightens the need for vigilance on our part.

The two Koreas today stand apart, but this may not always be so, and we pray it will not be.

I expressed support, to President Chun, for the Republic of Korea's creative approach in engaging North Korea in direct talks. We share the conviction that the key to reducing tension lies in direct dialogue between the parties.

The Republic of Korea is a growing economic power, and President Chun and I discussed the contribution that economic development makes to stability and security on the Korean Peninsula. President Chun and I agreed on the need to defend

and expand the free market in our own relationship and multilaterally. I expressed appreciation for the steps Korea has already taken in this regard, and we agreed to intensify the close consultations between our Governments.

President Chun explained the steps his government has taken to further promote freedom and democracy. I welcomed the considerable progress that has already been made and expressed continuing support for such steps, which, with moderation on all sides, are contributing to the attainment of political progress commensurate with Korea's remarkable economic growth. I reiterated our support for President Chun's commitment to a peaceful transfer of power at the end of his term in 1988.

President Chun also discussed another event of momentous importance which is coming to Korea in 1988: the Seoul Olympics. I expressed our complete support for Seoul as the Olympic site and offered to share our experience from the 1984 Olympics to help make it the best ever.

The United States and Korea enjoy an especially warm relationship, and that was reflected in our talks here today. We agreed that in addition to the annual U.S./Korean security consultative meeting, the two governments should intensify their consultations on political matters in Northeast Asia.

The President and Mrs. Chun will be stopping in Hawaii on their way back to Korea. Nancy and I wish them a safe and pleasant journey home. We send with them greetings to our friends, the Korean people.

SUBJECT: A MAJOR PROBLEM FOR KOREA: RESOLUTION OF THE
M-16 ROYALTY/LICENSE FEE PAYMENT DISPUTE
WITH COLT FIREARMS.

Colt Firearms has been attempting to collect payments due it under the MOU and other agreements made with the ROK.

Under the MOU and other agreements, the Koreans were allowed to produce the M-16 rifle under license from Colt.

Colt was paid by Korea to build and set up the production facility, an initial payment, and then Korea agreed to pay Colt a per item fee for each rifle produced.

Suddenly, the Koreans stopped such payments, claiming (quite spuriously) that Colt no longer held patents to many M-16 parts (they had expired) and therefore Korea was under no obligation to continue to pay Colt.

In making this claim, the Koreans conveniently overlooked the contractual obligations it had and continues to have under the MOU and other agreements, to continue to pay Colt a per item fee.

The matter in dispute is less than \$2 million, as I understand it.

Colt had made every reasonable attempt to recover what is rightfully its due, but the Koreans have frustrated every Colt attempt. The matter is subject of a lawsuit and an arbitration. Meanwhile, Colt has not recovered what is due it.

No American company should be forced to resort to the legal remedies that Colt has had to use: no American company should face the interminable delays and other tactics used by the Koreans.

I have attempted to talk some sense into the Koreans. I have journeyed there twice and am on my way there again.

Meanwhile, Colt's patience is wearing extremely thin. Rightfully so.

If the Koreans do not settle this matter, Colt plans to make a full court press in Congress. That could well open up a pandora's box that will be difficult to close.

The matter was at a point of resolution after General Park Choon Sik's visit to Washington in early March. General Park met with Colt officials in New York and reached agreement to negotiate the matter in good faith. Colt was pleased and sought immediate negotiation. They were rebuffed.

Unfortunately, all of General Park's actions, including the written agreements reached with the U.S. government regarding the Rokit tank as well as the agreements with Colt, were repudiated by the Koreans on Park's return there. He now allegedly has been removed from office and disgraced.

Colt only wants the matter resolved. It does not want to be forced to go to Congress and try to seek a legislative remedy. It does not want to try to fiddle with Korea's FMS assistance or seek other punitive measures.

But the Koreans are about to leave Colt with no other choice.

This matter could be resolved quite easily by President Chun during his visit. If Colt goes to Congress, with the sentiment against Japan already stirred, it would take very little to stir up a larger firestorm against the Koreans, who are far less popular and far more vulnerable than the Japanese.
