Per your request, we are starting a process of daily themes for the use of those U.S. officials authorized to deal with the media while we are in Geneva. Provided you agree, we will do five sets of themes of about two pages each:

- 1. The setting before the meetings.
- Tuesday, emphasizing fundamentals and arms control.
- Wednesday, emphasizing regional and bilateral issues, including human rights.
- 4. Thursday, a wrap-up, putting the emphasis on the major accomplishments.
- 5. Immediate post-Geneva.

At Tab I for your approval are proposed themes for the first stage, the setting. These emphasize in particular what got us to Geneva, how the President's policies have put us in a good position to deal realistically with the Soviet Union, and our broad summit objectives. Per your request that we take up Ken Adelman's offer to work with us in preparing the themes, I have shared these proposed themes with him--but, pending your approval, with no others beyond the NSC.

Proposed Scene-Setting Themes

Background

- --A lot of hard work in preparation. President has prepared himself thoroughly and is ready for the hard work ahead. Fine contribution from the agencies involved: State, Defense, JCS, ACDA, USIA, intelligence community.
- --Meetings will reflect broad US/Soviet agenda: regional issues, human rights, bilateral matters and security and arms control issues. All these areas relate to our overriding aim: to begin the long-term effort of strengthening the peace.
- --President cautiously optimistic. Cautious because he is deeply aware of vast differences between our systems, values, international conduct and the way we treat our own citizens. These differences present serious obstacles to progress.
- --But President prepared do his part to put relationship on more constructive long-term footing. Part of his long-standing foreign policy strategy. Success of this strategy shown, in part, by fact of meeting, and fact that Soviets are now back at the negotiating table. Basis for progress in US/Soviet relations has been set by President's success in strengthening the US politically, militarily and economically, as well as in reinvigorating our alliances.
- --This dramatic renewal of Western strength, unity and ability to deter aggression contrasts markedly with 1970's when US unilaterally let its strength slip. This weakened our alliances and led to increased Soviet risk-taking.

Objectives

- --President seeks to chart a course for the conduct of the relationship fundamentally different from that sought by his predecessors. He has studied carefully what has worked and what hasn't worked in fashioning a more constructive relationship and hopes to build upon past experience.
- --Meeting should not be judged by whether there are any signed agreements, or some kind of "agreed statements" with Soviets. What we seek instead is long term progress, to make relationship more stable and predictable, and perhaps to provide a "roadmap" for pursuing negotiations in all four areas. Meeting is not a substitute for those negotiations, but can provide highest level direction and impetus for them.
- --Will do our part to find reasonable common ground, but it will take comparable effort on Soviets' part.
- --Could be some months, in some cases years, before we know how successful this summit has been. As President emphasized in November 13 address to nation, he is seeking improvements in the relationship which last well beyond his own Presidency.

--Important that people of democracies look at this realistically. We wish to chart a careful, predictable course that brings steady progress without leading to the extreme public moods about the relationship sometimes exhibited in past, fluctuating from periods of anxiety that we may be on brink of conflict to new euphoria that we may be able to bridge most of our differences.

--We have already made specific proposals in each agenda area, and will have more to say in Geneva on each.

--In his address to UN, President laid out his initiative for resolving major regional conflicts which are undermining the prospects for improved US/Soviet relations. In arms control, President authorized new set of US proposals to be presented at Nuclear and Space Arms Talks in Geneva at beginning of November. And in area of people to people contacts, he set out far-reaching new initiatives in his address to the nation on November 14.

Specific Areas: Key Objectives

- --Regional Issues: US and allies determined maintain our deterrent strength. We want to build a safer, more stable world, and this means countries must stop trying to expand their influence through armed intervention and subversion.
- --Human Rights: President acutely conscious that he represents a free society with deep respect for human rights. As leader of a free people, he seeks peaceful expansion of human liberties globally. Bottom line is that freedom and democracy are best quarantors of a stable peace.
- --Bilateral Issues: Already making some progress in improving communications between us. Seek further improvement, and dramatic expansion people-to-people contacts. President wants to build genuine constituencies for peace in both countries.
- --Security and Arms Control: President seeks to strengthen the peace on global basis. One of principal goals in this area is to reduce danger of nuclear war through deep, equitable and verifiable reductions in offensive nuclear arsenals, as well as through research to identify defensive technologies which would threaten no one.
- --In all areas, meeting in Geneva represents an important new phase in this process. Our efforts to reach these ambitious goals will continue.

This meeting again emphasized the need for coordination at all levels in Geneva and the need to do as much spade work prior to leaving in figuring the scheduling of the various participants (the master plan) as well as identifying key daily themes for public spokesmen. Tasks:

- 1. Master schedule (Action: Miller). First draft due Thursday. Should include a) President's activities b) RCM schedule c) Coordinating meetings for substance (ie. providing papers to the President) d)Coordinating meetings for debriefs/staff meeting (ie. giving level B participants sufficient information from meetings to ensure proper coordination of substantive documents) e)coordinting meetings for public diplomacy (senior officials briefing dozen other spokesmen on key issues/themes to stress. f)coordinating meetings on agreements/activities of morning of 21st, etc. and g)schedule of other key principals including Shultz, Regan, Speakes. - 2. Presidential memos in Geneva: Clearly, we will have to update the day books in light of the meetings. To do this we will need to debrief the substantive team and produce a meeting memorandum for the President for the next's days meetings. This will be particularly critical on Tuesday night (key issue: arms control) and Wednesday night (Brussels remarks, characterization of meeting results). David Chew has indicated that we need this as early as possible the day before. Action: Cobb/Linhard.
- 3. Public Diplomacy Themes Dennis Thomas made a point of saying that we need daily themes for briefers. I think that we should look at themes for weekend talk shows, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday. These can be adjusted on the road, but we might be able to get some basic themes down on paper in advance of Geneva. In addition we will need a common outcome set of talking points which characterizes the results of Geneva, to be used by the dozen spokesmen as well as Asst. Secretaries heading to the far corners of the globe. Action: Steve Steiner Comment:
 Miller, Small.

4. Agreements - While we should not appear that we are pushing for final agreements/signing ceremonies in the eight or so areas, we need a central point of coordination. Fact sheets and q's and a's. Action: Cobb Comment: Thompson, Martin.

We will have a larger than usual NSC contingent traveling with the President for the Geneva meeting between the President and General Secretary Gorbachev. Staffing and logistical decisions have been weighed very carefuly to ensure NSC's ability to provide maximum support for the President and Mr. McFarlane with the absolute minimum required resources. The staffing and procedures to be followed in support of the Geneva mission are outlined below:

NSC Staffing in Geneva The NSC Staff will have a separate fully functioning office in support of Mr. McFarlane. Wilma Hall will provide direct support for Mr. McFarlane; Carol Cleveland and Kay Zerwick will provide direct support for the Executive Secretary's office. Stella Brackman will be the NSC support person to provide secretarial support for NSC staff officers in Geneva.

Executive Secretary Staffing The NSC Executive Secretary's office in Geneva will be staffed from 7:00 a.m. local time Geneva until 9:00 p.m. or later as circumstances require.




