DEAR BUD.

I AM WRITING TO CONFIRM A MESSAGE WHICH WE HAVE ALREADY TRANSMITTED TO THE US-EMBASSY TO-DAY TO THE EFFECT THAT THE FEDERAL CHANCELLOR IS VERY KEEN TO HAVE ANOTHER OPPORTUNITY OF MEETING WITH PRESIDENT REAGAN AND CONTINUING THEIR CLOSE PERSONAL EXCHANGE OF VIEWS. THE FEDERAL CHANCELLOR WOULD BE ABLE TO COME TO WASHINGTON IN THE

PERIOD BETWEEN 29 OCTOBER AND 2 NOVEMBER 1985. SUMMARY OF SITE SURVEYS IN GENEVA, SWITZERLAND

1. U.S. Mission

Possible site for meetings and dinner, but not appealing. Not a neutral site - only a last resort.

2. Soviet Mission

Same as above.

3. Chateau de Penthes

(Museum) Possible meeting site. Marginal. Would require lots of work to move displays, etc. and rooms are small. Right side of Lake. Good garden area with view of Lake. * Swiss stressing using this as meeting site.

4. La Reserve Hotel

Really not an option. Doesn't have intimacy or any particular identification with Geneva.

* Le Reposoir

Possible meeting site or residence. Would work better as meeting site. Very good atmosphere and setting and is also on the right side of the Lake. High on our priority list. Problem would be moving the families out. Swiss would have to help with this.

6. * Chateau de Bellrive

Vice President has stayed here. Good possibility as residence or meeting site. Wrong side of lake, but good setting and atmosphere and plenty of room.

7. * Eisenhower Residence ("Fermeneche ?")

Very good for meetings or residence. High on our list. Good access, right side of lake, historical, great atmosphere. Ideally, we would see possibly using this as a residence.

MacGregor Residence

Possible residence. Would work physically, but not high on our list. Stewards, Dr., Mil. Aide, and Kuhn and Shaddick could stay here, but not large enough for Senior Staff.

9. Ambassador's Residence

Possible meeting site or social event site. Wrong side of Lake, but high on our list. Dining room holds 18 people - ideal for possible dinner.

10. Palais des National

Not high on our list - only as a last resort for a meeting site. Swiss stress that they would like to avoid this site since it would associate Geneva with the United Nations, and they want to stress that Geneva has been picked as a site for US/Soviet meeting because it is Geneva and not because it is the site of the UN.

The Swiss stress that they do not want to use sites on the left side of the Lake. They also do not want the U.S. to use helicopters in their country.

- Idea of "Official Visit"

The President and Mrs. Reagan will probably arrive on November 16th for the President to adjust to the time and climate change and to participate in final briefings. Presently, both the Swiss and U.S. agree that the Swiss will be in charge of the arrival ceremony at the airport which has been agreed to be a smaller ceremony than that of a state visit. In addition, President Reagan would call on President Furgler probably on Monday morning.

The schedule would include meetings from approximately 10:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m and 2:30 p.m. - 5:00 p.m. on Nov. 19th and 20th. Lunches would be kept free. Small dinners to "get acqainted" are proposed for both evenings. In addition, there is a possibility of a larger reception hosted by the Swiss on one evening. On Nov. 21st, there would possibly be a very brief and informal departure activity, and The President would depart by mid afternoon.

We are examining ideas for this to become an "official visit." This would include some type of event (30 mins. max) based on an idea such as "democracy" or "neutrality" that personifies the Swiss.
