


It was my distinct privilege to serve as Acting Chairman of the American Section at the 170th meeting of the at the US Naval Base in Key West, Florida.

# SUGGESTED POINTS FOR INCORPORATION INTO THE PRESIDENT'S RADIO ADDRESS, SATURDAY, MARCH 16, 1985

- -- Tomorrow I am taking the first trip outside the United States of my second term. At the invitation of my friend, Brian Mulroney, I am travelling to Canada.
- -- The first trip of my first term was also to Canada. Then, I went to Ottawa, Canada's stately capital of waterways and Gothic buildings. This time, Brian Mulroney has to my delight, chosen Quebec City, the capital of his home province, as the sight of the meeting.
- -- Quebec is one of the most exciting and charming corners of North America, and it is right on our northeastern doorstep. The city is older than almost any other in North America. When you walk its ancient streets you cannot but think of the City's heritage as the old capital of New France. But Quebec is modern, too, and supplies the United States with everything from subway cars to aerospace components for our defense industries. In short, Quebec is North American with a French face. Touch.
- -- I am going to Canada because of its importance to the United States -- there is no other country in the world which is more important. Sometimes we overlook that, because friendship and co-operation sometimes grab our attention, unfortunately, less than hostility and violence. But we simply cannot afford to overlook these facts:
  - Canada and the United States are each other's most important trading partner. We sell more to Canada than we do to the countries of Western Europe. We sell twice as much to Canada as we do to our second most important trading partner, Japan.
  - Canada is our principal foreign source of natural gas and electricity and our second largest supplier of oil.
  - Canada is the most important locale for our foreign investment. And as anyone who walks around downtown in an American city can tell you Canadian investors are becoming more and more important in real estate and in other parts of the US economy.
- -- We share the world's longest boundary, and the world's longest water boundary.

- -- Its almost impossible to separate the national security of the United States from that of Canada. So its no surprise that the Commander of the North American Air Defense Command in Colorado Springs is American, his Deputy, Canadian and their staff integrated with American and Canadian officers.
- -- Canada-US relations are sometimes called the "forgotten partnership." But I have another name for them: the "forgotten success". Ours are the most productive, and complex relations between any two countries in the world.
- -- But there's more to the story. Four years ago, relations between our two countries had become testy. We were forgetting how to work with one another--and we were missing some opportunities for real and productive co-operation. But, on both sides of the border we worked hard to set relations aright, so that today, the relationship is as good as its ever been in history. So Canada-US relations really are the "forgotten success" in the foreign policy of the United States.
- -- Given its complexity, the Canada-US relationship requires a lot of attention if it is to be properly managed. I have taken steps so that within the US Government, Canada-US relations have received uparallelelattention. As part of the preparations for my trip tomorrow, I directed the US government to prepare a through study, across the scope of our relationship with Canada. And I presided over two cabinet-level sessions devoted to the state of the relationship.
- -- My friend Brian Mulroney has worked hard to, as he puts it "refurbish" his country's relations with the US. Brian himself reflects some of what's best in Canada. His native tongue is English (with a Celtic touch, of course.) But he taught himself French and in fact went to law school in that language. He grew up in a lumber town and drove a truck during the summers when he was growing up. He's an articulate defender of his counry's interests, a friend of the United States and the best vote getter in Canadian history.
- -- At Quebec City, besides celebrating St. Patrick's day, there are four major items on the Prime Minister's and my agenda:

First, the economy - Canada and the United States already have the largest trading relationship in the world. The United States stands ready to enhance that relationship, if it is also Canada's desire. We stand ready to join with Canada and other countries in a new round of multilateral trade talks in 1986. It is the firm policy of my administration to resist protectionist pressures. The United States welcomes the Mulroney Government's

legislation to loosen restrictions on foreign investment in Canada--and we continue to welcome Canadian investment in the United States.

Defense - Canada is a founding member of NATO and has a proud military history ranging from Vimy Ridge in France during the Great War to the skies of Germany in the Second, to the seas off Korea during the conflict there. We have, in the past, not hidden our disappointment that Canada's expenditures on defense have fallen well below the NATO average. Nor do we hide our gratification with the commitment of the Mulroney government to significantly enhance Canadian defense spending.

Arms Control and Global Developments - Canada is a principal participant in world affairs with particular interest and expertise in arms control. The Prime Minister and I will extensively exchange views on developments throughout the world, including the Geneva arms reduction talks.

Environment - The United States is a pioneer in environmental protection. We share with Canada a special responsibility for the protection of our common North American environment. I know that acid rain is a concern of the Canadian government, and am anxious to hear Prime Minister Mulroney's views on the subject.

-- But you can say that there is another, more important agenda we will be observing at Quebec. We will be reaffirming our attachment to shared values, to healthy and productive Canada-US relations, and to a safer and more secure world.

Pignaberi is a former member of Ted Stevens' staff, and both Stevens and Murkowski had requested an opportunity for this gentleman to meet you. Stevens is unable to be here today because he is in Geneva for the arms reductions talks.
