Port Access Issue with Soviet Union

For reasons outlined in the attached paper, I strongly recommend a change in U.S. policy on the port access requirement for Soviet vessels used to carry agricultural products. Please note, I am referring solely to agricultural products -- none other.

I would prefer reducing the notice time to 4 days which is consistent with our policy for East European countries, but would be willing to live with a reduction to 7 days which is equal to the requirement for Chinese flag vessels.

I understand you may be considering this question at a meeting tomorrow in conjunction with the overall matter of the U.S.-U.S.S.R. Joint Commercial Commission.

I am asking that the port access issue for agricultural products be separated from the overall issue of a possible new Maritime Agreement. The advantage to U.S. agriculture for doing this along the lines I have recommended is that it would immediately increase our potential export sales to the Soviet Union. The Soviet Union is the only destination in the world to which we might be able to appreciably expand our grain exports in this very difficult period for farm product exports.

#### IMPACT OF 14-DAY PORT ACCESS ISSUE ON U.S. GRAIN EXPORTS TO USSR

The Soviet Union now accounts for one-quarter of all world grain trade and U.S. grain is currently at a competitive disadvantage in this market because of discriminatory requirements against Soviet-flag grain vessels at U.S. ports.

Soviet flag vessels must give 14 days prior notice before entering U.S. ports. Our requirements are much less severe for grain vessels from all other countries—for example, only 7 days for Chinese—flag vessels and 4 days for most East European registered vessels.

The extra waiting time for Soviet vessels can cost them up to \$3 a ton, assuming a demurrage cost of \$10,000 a day for a 40,000—ton capacity vessel and a full 10 day wait before entering a U.S. port. Scheduling difficulties for Soviet ships that result from this policy also add additional indirect costs. In international grain trading, a difference of 10¢ a ton can be decisive in choosing between sellers or country of origin.

Soviet grain buyers have made a strong plea to the United States to recognize that their buying agency is under considerable pressure to make more of their purchases from countries which do not discriminate against Soviet vessels. The 14-day requirement is a continuing reminder to Soviet grain-buying officials that they are being subjected to discriminatory treatment when buying from the United States.

The Soviets cancelled roughly 1 million tons of U.S. grain purchases, worth roughly \$150 million, between mid-December 1984 and February 1985. These purchases were replaced with new purchases from Argentina and the European Community. Surely, price considerations played a major role as EC and Argentine prices were especially competitive at this time. However, a cancellation related to changes in competitive world market relationships is unprecedented for the Soviets, who generally strive to avoid being seen as disruptive in U.S. markets.

The Soviets had no obligation to buy extra Argentine wheat, whereas part of their minimum commitment under the grain agreement with the United States now stands unfilled. Given the ample supplies of wheat available from other suppliers and the irritation associated with the 14-day notice requirement, the Soviets chose to make some of their purchases from other origins, where they did not face such requirements.

The positive contribution of larger exports to our agricultural sector should be encouraged in every way possible and should not be sacrificed for uncertain gains in other areas, in this case the Maritime Industry. The food and agriculture complex is our nation's biggest business, accounting for about one-fifth (\$433 billion) of our GNP and employing about one out of every five Americans. The major opportunity for agricultural growth is in exports, on which farmers already rely for about a quarter of their income. Agricultural exports have contributed a surplus of more than \$10 billion to the U.S. trade account since 1974, but in recent years they have been suffering from strong competition and decreasing export volumes, particularly in grains.

We should note that from 1972 through the termination of the Maritime Agreement in 1981, Soviet vessels were permitted access to 40 U.S. ports on 4 days notice. At the highpoint, Soviet port calls reached more than 100 per month during the late 1970's. There is no indication of any serious problem arising during this time for port and/or naval security considerations. This illustrates that a 4-day notification requirement provides sufficient preparation time for U.S. ports. Moreover, if the notice requirement were shortened exclusively for vessels carrying agricultural products, only the major agricultural shipping ports would be affected by the rules change.

Finally there is the argument that the 14-day notice requirement could be used as a concession in a new Maritime Agreement with the Soviets. In practical terms, however, it is the United States that benefits most from this action, not the Soviets. With the ample supplies of wheat on the world market, the Soviets can easily meet their needs from other sources.

Farmers, Congress, and other groups have been asking the Administration to take action to stimulate exports. A relaxation of the 14-day notice requirement would be viewed by all segments of the agricultural industry as a positive move by the Administration to improve the competitiveness of U.S. agriculture and to enhance the market access of U.S. grain to the largest importer in the world.
