SUBJECT:

Responses to Threatened Soviet Imposition of Centralized Pay Plan for FSN Employees

On November 15, 1984 the Soviet Foreign Ministry circulated a note to Embassies in Moscow regarding a centralized payroll system for Soviet nationals working at Embassies (FSNs), scheduled to go into effect on April 1, 1985. If implemented, the plan would give the Soviet Government control over both the manner and form of salary payment to all FSNs, as well as permit a clearly unaccceptable degree of Soviet interference in the administrative operations of our Embassy. Furthermore, the Soviet scheme calls for advance payment in dollars for personnel services — an approach which runs counter to established USG policy worldwide and gratuitously provides the Soviets with substantial hard currency gains.

The reactions of our allies to the proposed plan have been uniformly negative, with all sharing the view that such Soviet interference with Embassy operations is completely unacceptable. While many states are looking to us for guidance and leadership on this issue, the French, British, and Canadians have already informed the Soviets that they reject the plan and intend to impose countermeasures. It is our position that only by threatening serious reprisals and exercising firm leadership over the rest of the Western diplomatic community in Moscow can we perhaps head off this highly intrusive and unacceptable Soviet plan.

On December 21, 1984, our Charge in Moscow informed the Soviet Foreign Ministry that we considered the Soviet proposals "inappropriate and unacceptable". Subsequently, during a February 13 meeting Secretary Shultz told Ambassador Dobrynin that we will not comply with the proposed system. He warned Dobrynin that should the plan go into effect on April 1, we would take retaliatory action. If the Soviets cause

disruptions in the administration of our Embassy or remove some local FSN employees, the Secretary stressed, we would do whatever necessary to maintain our operation in Moscow intact and respond in kind here.

We hope that the threat of retaliation, combined with similar demarches from our allies, will give the Soviets pause and prompt them to reconsider their position. Nevertheless, we must be prepared to carry out our threat. We are currently examining ways to carry out essential Embassy services in the event of Soviet implementation of the plan and to retaliate as necessary.

Moscow

State has reported on its efforts to resist Soviet attempts to impose a centralized pay system on Soviet citizen employees of Embassy Moscow (TAB A). In effect, the Soviets are attempting to establish a system whereby the Diplomatic Service Agency (UPDK) is reimbursed in dollars for the total salary bill, and it in turn compensates the individual employees. This would be a highly unsatisfactory situation since it would break what little employer/employee relationship which exists between the Embassy and its Soviet employees and would greatly complicate other Embassy operations. (The Embassy now pays Soviet employees in rubles acquired from accomodation exchange for American employees.)

The strong stand State is taking on this issue (supported by other Western countries with embassies in Moscow) is appropriate. At the same time, this problem highlights the fact that State has been very slow to move in implementing repeated recommendations by PFIAB and the NSC to devise a system to reduce its dependence on Soviet employees by employing more Americans for some of the tasks now performed by Soviet citizens. In responding, it would be appropriate to inquire as to the status of this proposal.



SUBJECT: Secret Service Protection for Soviet Politburo Member Vladimir V. Shcherbitskiy

The Soviets have requested Secret Service protection for Vladimir Shcherbitskiy during his March 3-13 visit to the United States. Shcherbitskiy will be here at the invitation of the Congress. Secretary Shultz has recommended that the President meet with Shcherbitskiy during the Washington portion of his trip. Shcherbitskiy is a full member of the Politburo and of the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet. In the Soviet leadership, he is equal in rank to Foreign Minister Gromyko who has received Secret Service protection.

Shcherbitskiy is also the First Secretary of the Ukrainian S.S.R. We anticipate his visit will stir considerable interest among Ukrainian-American emigre and human rights groups. The Soviets are deeply concerned about potential security incidents. We believe that if the Soviets conclude that the security issues have not been adequately addressed they may seek to adjust the travel program and perhaps scale down visit activities. This would damage the effectiveness of a trip which would be useful as a vehicle for putting American views directly to a senior Soviet leadership figure.

In light of the importance of the visit, the probable meeting with the President and high level Congressional interest in the trip's success, we believe that Secret Service protection is warranted. We ask that you convey our request for this coverage to the appropriate officials.

Subject: Presidential Meeting with Soviet Politburo Member Vladimir V. Shcherbitskiy

In response to an invitation by Speaker of the House O'Neill, Vladimir V. Shcherbitskiy, First Secretary of the Ukrainian S.S.R., full member of the Politburo and the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet, will be leading a Supreme Soviet delegation on a visit to the United States March 3 - 13. Aside from Foreign Minister Gromyko, Shcherbitskiy is the first full member of the Politburo to visit the United States since Brezhnev's visit in 1973.

As host, the House of Representatives is organizing a three day Congressional program in Washington as well as a trip to Texas and California. The House is making March 7 available for Executive Branch meetings. The Secretary plans to meet with Shcherbitskiy and to host a luncheon for him on that day.

Shcherbitskiy's visit provides an important opportunity to present our views on a number of important bilateral issues directly to a key member of the Soviet leadership, unfiltered by Gromyko. This would include arms control, the possible exchange of consulates in New York and Kiev, and our concern about Ukrainian human rights. Coming just prior to the opening of the U.S. - Soviet arms discussions in Geneva, such a meeting would be particularly timely. The President's meeting with Gromyko last September played a crucial role in the Soviet decision to resume arms control discussions. It would be extremely useful for the President to emphasize personally to a key member of the Politburo his hopes for U.S.- Soviet relations and the importance we attach to the upcoming Geneva talks. We therefore recommend that the President agree to a short meeting with Shcherbitskily on March 7. We also recommend that this meeting be followed by a longer meeting between Shcherbitskiy and the Vice President.

Alternatively, if a meeting with the President is impossible, we recommend that the Vice President meet with him.

Vladimir Shcherbitskiy has been a member of the CPSU Politburo since April 1971 and first secretary of the Ukrainian Communist Party since May 1972. His political standing almost certainly resulted from his close ties to the late CPSU General Secretary Leonid Brezhnev. Both men began their careers in the Dnepropetrovsk region of



USSR

the Ukraine, and at one time Shcherbitskiy was reputed to be Brezhnev's closest friend on the Politburo. Shcherbitskiy was referred to as "a talented organizer" in an installment of Brezhnev's memoirs published posthumously in Novyy Mir. In 1983 he published a book entitled Scientific-Technical Progress—A Party Concern and received an Order of Lenin.

Shcherbitskiy advanced through the ranks of the Ukrainian party apparatus to become Chairman of the Ukrainian Council of Ministers (the top government post) in 1961 and a candidate member of the CPSU Politburo shortly thereafter. His fortunes declined in 1963, when then CPSU First Secretary Nikita Khrushchev appointed a protege to head the Ukrainian Communist Party. Not long afterward, Shcherbitskiy was removed from the Politburo and the chairmanship of the Ukrainian Council of Ministers and sent back to a former job as first secretary of the Dnepropetrovsk Oblast Party Committee. After Brezhnev became first secretary, however, he restored Shcherbitskiy to his pre-1963 positions on the CPSU Politburo (1964) and in the Ukraine (1965). His assignment as Ukrainian party chief in 1972 was part of a bitter struggle of personalities and policies at both the republic and national levels. He has been a deputy to the USSR Supreme Soviet (legislature) since 1958 and a member of its Presidium since 1972.

An avid soccer fan, he sometimes juggles his schedule in order to see a game. He is one of the few Politburo members to have visited the United States (in 1967). He is not known to speak any languages other than Russian and Ukrainian. Married, he has a son.



### TERRORISM - UNITED KINGDOM

- O Terrorism by the Provisional IRA continues as the primary British concern, but HMG is now also focusing on the threat to NATO, and the threat from terrorism of Middle Eastern origin.

  - -- Anti-NATO sentiment in UK now manifested in civil disobedience, but HMG acutely aware of potential for violence in UK, where NATO targets abound

  - -- possibility that <u>UK support</u> for retaliation <u>will cause</u> them to be targets
  - -- possibility that Europeans might support initial US


- O Terrorism by the Provisional IRA continues as the primary British concern, but HMG is now also focusing on the threat to NATO, and the threat from terrorism of Middle Eastern origin.
  - -- <u>Irish terrorism</u> now recognized as <u>one facet of a wider</u> <u>international problem</u>
  - -- Anti-NATO sentiment in UK now manifested in civil disobedience, but HMG acutely aware of potential for violence in UK, where NATO targets abound
  - -- HMG keen to promote allied cooperation and sees value of political push from the NAC
  - -- Working in EC-10 for political cooperation for more stringent application of Vienna convention as result of Libyan incident and similar state supported terrorism of Middle-East origin
  - -- HMG feels bilateral channels best to effect practical anti-terrorist measures
- O <u>US-UK anti-terrorist cooperation excellent</u> and getting still better, particularly in areas of <u>intelligence exchanges and technical R&D cooperation</u>
  - -- HMG made demarche to Iran on behalf of US prisoners and supports similar demarche to be made by EC
  - -- HMG very appreciative of US efforts to cut off support for IRA, and is pleased at agreement to improve our bilateral extradition treaty
- O Foreign Minister <u>Howe has personal reservations about</u> issue of "retaliation" against terrorists
  - -- concerns center on legality of retaliation
  - -- possibility that <u>UK support</u> for retaliation <u>will cause</u> them to be targets
  - -- possibility that <u>Europeans might support initial US</u>
    <u>position</u> in a terrorist situation only to <u>find</u>
    <u>themselves implicated after the fact in unilateral armed</u>
    <u>intervention by US</u>
  - -- however, UK allowed US forces to use their base in Cyprus on contingency basis at time of Kuwaiti airline hijacking

We have reviewed the State draft report on Senate Resolution 34, dealing with the Soviet occupation of Afghanistan. Inasmuch as the resolution would be acceptable if the last clause were revised, we suggest that the substantive portion of the letter to Senator Lugar be changed to read along the following lines:

The Department of State has reviewed Senate Resolution 34 (S. Res. 34) which condemns the Government of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics for five years of forced and oppressive military occupation of Afghanistan in the face of popular resistance to Soviet imperialism, submitted by Senator D'Amato on January 3, 1985.

We welcome the Congressional interest in Afghanistan which is reflected by the introduction of this resolution. Congressional support for the Afghan resistance parallels the strong stand of this Administration in opposition to the increasingly brutal Soviet occupation of Afghanistan. The call for increased medical and food assistance for the Afghan people is especially timely, and we hope to work closely with Congress to develop effective humanitarian assistance programs.

However, we believe that there should be no specific reference to military assistance. We therefore recommend that the final clause of the resolution be revised to read as follows:

Dear Mr. Chairman:

The Department of State has reviewed Senate Resolution 34 (S. Res. 34) which condemns the Government of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics for five years of forced and oppressive military occupation of Afghanistan in the face of popular resistance to Soviet imperialism, submitted by Senator D'Amato on January 3, 1985. The Department of State believes that it would be very unhelpful for this resolution to go forward, because of its clear recommendation that the President provide military assistance to the Afghan Freedom Fighters, a recommendation which touches on a sensitive intelligence matter. In keeping with our normal practice, we must also decline to comment publicly on this initiative.

Apart from this, we welcome the Congressional interest in Afghanistan which is reflected by the introduction of this resolution. Congressional support for the Afghan resistance parallels the strong stand of this Administration in opposition to the increasingly brutal Soviet occupation of Afghanistan. The call for increased medical and food assistance for the Afghan people is especially timely, and we hope to work closely with Congress to develop effective humanitarian assistance programs.

The Office of Management and Budget has advised that, from the standpoint of the Administration's program, there is no objection to the submission of this report.

Former EPA Administrator William Ruckelshaus wrote to the Secretary on March 29, 1984, requesting approval to rejuvenate the US-USSR Environmental Agreement, including as initial steps his appointment as US Co-chairman of the Joint Environmental Committee, experts' level meetings, and a convening of the joint committee. The US cooperative program with the Soviet Union in environmental affairs has contributed to American scientific interests. As continental, heavily industrialized countries the US and USSR share many environmental problems, on which cooperation under the Agreement has had benefits for both parties.

Following a Departmental review and consultations with the National Security Council, the NSC concurred in Ruckelshaus' proposals with the stipulation that he not fix a date for the next Joint Environmental Committee Meeting "in view of the situation currently facing Academician Sakharov and Mrs. Bonner." Since the NSC decision did, however, allow for working level contacts in preparation for a joint committee session, the American and Soviet Executive Secretaries met in Moscow during the summer to discuss the first such steps.

On June 27, 1984, the President announced Administration efforts to strengthen cooperation under the Environmental Agreement. As he noted, "Activities under these agreements have waned in recent years years, because there've been no meetings of their joint committees to plan projects. We've proposed that preparations begin for such meetings in order to increase the number of active projects." On November 16, the Soviets accepted the President's proposal.

On September 24, the President expanded on the theme of the June 27 speech in an address before the UN General Assembly on American foreign policy. On that occasion, he offered several proposals including regularly scheduled meetings at the ministerial or cabinet level to discuss the major areas of the relationship.

There is a human rights aspect here. If we go forward, we would make sure that Sakharov and other cases would be raised. In fact, of the various means for bringing pressure on Soviet authorities, we believe that one of the most effective is to raise it in the course of high-level visits. This is especially useful when the topic is of clear interest to the Soviets such as scientific cooperation. A Joint Environmental Committee Meeting is a high profile event from Moscow's perspective; it would perforce give senior Administration officials rare entree during which they could press the Sakharov case with members of the influential Soviet technological elite.

Meanwhile, we would continue to preserve the tight and logical linkage -- refusal to have a high-level meeting on health cooperation until the Soviets permit Sakharov's wife to receive adequate health care in the West.

Considering these factors as well as the constructive meetings in Geneva January 7-8 between the Secretary and Foreign Minister Gromyko, the Department believes that it is in the interests of the US Government to permit the Environmental Protection Agency to approach the Soviets about setting a precise date for the next meeting of the Joint Environmental Committee.

As you will recall, EPA was authorized last spring to initiate working-level meetings with its Soviet counterpart with a view toward revitalizing the U.S.-USSR Agreement on Cooperation for the Protection of the Environment. At the same time, State and EPA were instructed not to proceed to the point of setting a date for a meeting of the Joint Environmental Committee without considering the situation which Academician Sakharov and Mrs. Bonner then faced.

State and EPA now recommend that we proceed to set a date for a joint committee meeting. While recognizing that the problems facing Sakharov and Bonner have not be satisfactorily resolved, State believes that our and their interests would be better served by proceeding to plan activities under the environmental agreement (during which we would use the contacts to press the Soviets regarding the Sakharovs) and by withholding cooperation under the Health Agreement until Mrs. Bonner is allowed to travel to the West for medical treatment.

I believe that the linkage which State has proposed is the appropriate one and therefore concur in State's recommendation that EPA be permitted to proceed to work out a date for a joint committee meeting with the Soviets.

Roger Robinson and Steve Sestanovich concur.
