On behalf of President Reagan, I am replying to your letter of November 6, 1985 in which you urged that the Strategic Defense Initiative not be bargained away and that the option of testing and deployment be retained.

First of all, I want to express our appreciation for your support and that of the Coalition for the Strategic Defense Initiative. You may be sure that your views received the careful attention of the President's experts on arms control prior to the Geneva discussions. Let me also assure you that the President forcefully stated his position on SDI to Secretary Gorbachev, and did not compromise his determination to learn whether a strategic defense is feasible and cost-effective. We believe that the SDI research program as currently structured will be adequate to provide the answers necessary to ensure that a future President will have the

Dear President Reagan:

I'm writing to you on behalf of the Coalition for the Strategic Defense Initiative. I recently organized this Coalition to help safeguard the nation's interests through public education and grass-roots support of your initiative for a true defense of the American people. Our Coalition is composed of over 150 civic, fraternal, veteran, religious and public policy organizations - representing millions of Americans. Eighty two Members of Congress, all of whom applaud your vision and courage in launching SDI, are also members of our Coalition.

However, in reiterating our strong support for you on this issue, I'm obliged at the same time to express the deep concern of the Coalition over an apparent pattern emerging prior to the Geneva Summit. Many leading Administration officials have consistently made strong commitments that SDI is not to be "bargain-chipped" away at the Summit or SALT meetings, and for this we are grateful. But the specific language of these statements has begun to reveal a studious commitment only to research and development. No similar commitment of a clear and unequivocal nature has been offered by the Administration on behalf of a <u>deployment option</u>, or even of testing. Our worry over the lack of any encouraging position on testing and future deployment is exacerbated by the recent conflict at the highest levels of the Administration over the ABM Treaty; and the unfortunate decision to maintain a restrictive interpretation in our unilateral compliance with an oft-violated treaty which clearly jeapordizes our supreme interests.


Consequently, I'm writing to urge you and your advisory team involved in the Summit to keep the deployment option open. Clearly, your continued political support and your opportunity for a lasting impact upon history, lie in continuing along the path toward genuine defense and a policy of Mutual Assured Survival; rather than in heeding the appeals of those whose vested interests lie in the perpetuation of Mutual Assured Destruction or basing our security upon illusory agreements with an implacable enemy. We realize there are many pressures being brought to bear, both from within and without the government, for an agreement at any price - even the price of our nation's long-term security against a preemptive Soviet ICBM strike or nuclear blackmail. I want to assure you that an overwhelming majority

of Americans are standing steadfastly with you on SDI - as attested by all recent major polls - and that you are going into the Summit from an unprecedented position of political as well as moral strength. We urge you to keep this in mind, and to make a commitment in your heart and mind - if not publicly - to preserve the deployment option, to preserve our nation's future ability to defend itself. We are indebted to you for your courageous leadership on this and many other issues. Our hopes and prayers are with you as you head for Geneva.

DEPARTMENT OF STATE SUGGESTED REPLY

Dear Ms. Wales:

I am replying to your November 11 letter to Reagan regarding his November 19-20 summit meeting in Geneva with Soviet General Secretary Gorbachev. We appreciate your comments as we move forward in our efforts to build the foundation for a more stable and constructive relationship with the Soviet Union.

The basis for this summit was set by the firm and realistic policies the President has pursued toward the Soviet Union. For 40 years, the behavior of the Soviet Union has complicated our hopes for peace and the growth of freedom. Through the reestablishment of our political, economic, and military strength and the reinvigoration of our alliances, we were able to establish a dialogue with the Soviet Union based on realism and strength.

The President called for a fresh start in U.S.-Soviet relations. We have now made that start. In Geneva, the two leaders had an intensive and frank examination of all the issues on our basic four-part agenda: arms control, regional issues, human rights, and bilateral questions. Each made clear where he stands and discussed areas of mistrust and suspicion. The joint statement issued at the end of the meeting frankly recognized that our systems and policies are vastly different. The competitive nature of our relationship will continue.

Nevertheless, President Reagan and General Secretary

Gorbachev agreed they share an overriding responsibility to
ensure this competition remains peaceful and to work together
to strengthen peace. The two leaders also agreed to meet again
and to set up a regular process of summit meetings, in addition
to meetings of senior officials of both countries. This new
high-level dialogue will provide a framework for intensifying
discussions and solving problems.

The meetings in Geneva were characterized by a great deal of give-and-take. On arms control, the President reaffirmed his commitment to securing deep and stabilizing reductions in offensive systems. At the same time, he outlined his goal of moving deterrence toward a greater reliance on defense and away from the threat of nuclear retaliation. The purpose of the

Strategic Defense Initiative is to determine whether strategic defenses are feasible. The President made clear the United States was not prepared to restrict research legal under the Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty.

We were pleased that the two sides were able to agree on a number of important points relating to arms control in the joint statement:

- --In the Geneva Nuclear and Space Talks, both sides agreed to the principle of 50 percent reductions in nuclear arms and an interim agreement on intermediate-range nuclear forces.
- --We agreed to study the feasibility of risk reduction centers.
- --We agreed to enhanced cooperation in support of the nuclear nonproliferation treaty.
- --Both sides endorsed the concept of an effective and verifiable ban on chemical weapons and agreed to experts' meetings on preventing the proliferation of chemical weapons.
- -- We emphasized the importance of achieving positive results at the Mutual and Balanced Force Reductions (MBFR) talks in Vienna.
- --Both sides reaffirmed the need for a document at the Stockholm Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe

which would include mutually acceptable confidence and security building measures and give concrete expression to the principle of non-use of force.

With regard to human rights, the President stressed to Mr. Gorbachev that respect for the individual and the rule of law is as fundamental to peace as arms control. He pressed for greater Soviet adherence to international agreements, such as the Helsinki Final Act. The Soviets agreed in the joint statement to the importance of resolving humanitarian cases in a cooperative spirit.

On regional issues, the President stressed that in addition to seeking a safer and more stable strategic environment, the United States and the Soviet Union need to work together to end dangerous regional conflicts. The President raised the Soviet Union's continuing intervention, both directly and through proxies, in Afghanistan, Angola, Central America, and Cambodia. He urged an intensified consultative process on regional conflicts. Both sides agreed to regularize the process of discussions by experts of both sides and at the foreign minister level.

In bilateral relations, President Reagan and Soviet

General Secretary Gorbachev agreed on the utility of broadening exchanges and strengthening people-to-people contacts. In this connection, Secretary of State Shultz and Soviet Foreign

Minister Shevardnadze signed a new exchanges agreement in Geneva. The two leaders also reviewed progress in a number of other bilateral areas, including the civil aviation agreement.

our new agreement on air safety in the Northern Pacific, expanded people-to-people exchanges, and the opening of new consulates in Kiev and New York. Although these steps are modest, we believe they demonstrate we can work together to resolve problems to our mutual benefit.

Perhaps the most important result of the Geneva meeting was that it allowed both leaders to discuss their differences in a candid and private setting. As the President said at the conclusion of the meeting, the talks also provided an opportunity to explore common concerns in all four areas of our relationship. Where there are differences, we believe they are now better understood. Where shared concerns exist, there is now a more solid foundation for dealing with them. In the end, both leaders agreed that real confidence must be built on deeds, not just words. The Geneva meeting was a very worthwhile beginning to what we hope will be a productive process of resolving problems through concrete action.

The President has stated on numerous occasions, most recently in his speech to the nation on November 14 prior to his departure for Geneva, his support for increased people-to-people contacts between the United States and the Soviet Union. Your proposed exchange of American and Soviet students is certainly worthy of further consideration. Such a proposal would give both American and Soviet children an excellent opportunity to learn about the other's way of life.

FEMARKS MADE FA WILLIAM EL PREBLE AT SAMANTHA'S MEMORIAL SERVICE

At Maranacook Community School, we have an Advisor/Advisee System. Because of the time that these advisees spend together, from 7th grade through 12th grade, a close family-bond is formed within the groups. These are the kids that in one year have learned and grown together, they have lost one of their fellow advisees and now are trying to make some sense of this terrible loss.

Yesterday we met to talk about the loss of Sam and her Dad, and to put down on paper some of our feelings and memories of Sam. We talked about our sadness and then we talked about life a little. We made a list of some things that we think we'd all want to accomplish by the time our lives were over. Here are some things we came up with together:

- We agreed, when we are gone, we'd want someone to notice that we're not around anymore.
- 2. Most of us agreed we'd like to have done a lot of traveling to far away places in our lifetimes, that we'd seen a lot of the world, and met many different and interesting people, and maybe that we'd come to understand them a little better.
- 3. We'd all want to have made some kind of special contribution to the world in our lifetimes.
- 4. We also thought that if we were lucky enough to have accomplished all these things, we wouldn't want to get stuck up or conceited because of our success. We'd want to remain friendly and easy-going, and always psyched and ready for more adventures.

In her 13 years, we agreed that Samantha had accomplished all of these things and more. She had, what most of us would consider, a full life.

All of you coming here to celebrate her life is a clear message to us that Sam did make a tremendous contribution to this world. She saw many new and wonderful places that most of us will never see. She met many new people and understood them for what they were. Better than many of us ever will. And we know that Sam never got stuck up or conceited; she remainded humble, giggley and as her friend Liz said, "always friendly and nice to people." I remember her wispering secrets about boys, I think with Kim and Karen during my social studies lectures. She was always on the go and full of spunk and life. Those are some of the things that we will always remember about Sam.

When Sam was a fifth grader, with a simple letter she took initiative which changed her life, and the lives of every one of us in this room.

We in this advisee group knew Sam as one of us because we studied, played sports, danced and joked together. And yet you, and people all over the world knew Sam too, because somehow she managed to capture and express our collective fear of war and our desire for peace and global understanding. This little girl did more than our governments have had the courage or the will to do. We think that people saw the things they love about life in Sam. She gave us hope and that made her very special.

It is our sincere hope that the message that Arthur so carefully helped Sami to communicate will somehow ring even louder as a result of this great tragedy.

But this group here will never forget the Sam that was sort of shy, nappy and always psyched, brave and always nice to people, who was caught in a whirlwind of adventure, and who lived a full and meaningful life in 13 years.

We pledge to work to make sure that the work that Sam and Arthur had begun will not cease as a result of their deaths.

Dear Mr. Velza: _

I am replying to your October 9 letter to President Reagan regarding his November 19-20 summit meeting in Geneva with Soviet General Secretary Gorbachev. We appreciate your comments as we move forward in our efforts to build the foundation for a more stable and constructive relationship with the Soviet Union. I regret the delay in this response.

The basis for this summit was set by the firm and realistic policies the President has pursued toward the Soviet Union. For 40 years, the behavior of the Soviet Union has complicated our hopes for peace and the growth of freedom. Through the reestablishment of our political, economic, and military strength and the reinvigoration of our alliances, we were able to establish a dialogue with the Soviet Union based on realism and strength.

The President called for a fresh start in U.S.-Soviet relations. We have now made that start. In Geneva, the two leaders had an intensive and frank examination of all the issues on our basic four-part agenda: arms control, regional Mr. Vladas Velza,

Lithuanian American Community of the USA, Santa Monica-West Los Angeles Division, 901 5th Street, Santa Monica, California. issues, human rights, and bilateral questions. Each made clear where he stands and discussed areas of mistrust and suspicion. The joint statement issued at the end of the meeting frankly recognized that our systems and policies are vastly different. The competitive nature of our relationship will continue.

Nevertheless, President Reagan and General Secretary

Gorbachev agreed they share an overriding responsibility to

ensure this competition remains peaceful and to work together

to strengthen peace. The two leaders also agreed to meet again

and to set up a regular process of summit meetings, in addition

to meetings of senior officials of both countries. This new

high-level dialogue will provide a framework for intensifying

discussions and solving problems.

On human rights, the President stressed to Mr. Gorbachev that respect for the individual and the rule of law is as fundamental to peace as arms control. The President believes a continuing dialogue on human rights is necessary. The status of the Baltic states is an important element of this dialogue. The President has consistently expressed U.S. support for the right of the people of each nation to define their own destiny. Based upon that principle, we refuse to recognize the forcible incorporation of the Baltic states into the Soviet Union. In Geneva, the President articulated the global need

3

for individual freedom and human rights -- issues of profound importance to the Baltic states. In addition, he pressed for greater Soviet adherence to international agreements, such as the Helsinki Final Act.

Perhaps the most important result of the Geneva meeting was that it allowed both leaders to discuss their differences in a candid and private setting. As the President said at the conclusion of the meeting, the talks also provided an opportunity to explore common concerns in all four areas of our relationship. Where there are differences, we believe they are now better understood. Where shared concerns exist, there is now a more solid foundation for dealing with them. In the end, both leaders agreed that real confidence must be built on deeds, not just words. The Geneva meeting was a very worth-while beginning to what we hope will be a productive process of resolving problems through concrete action.
