Presidential Letter in Response to Prime Minister Thatcher regarding International Terrorism and

Extradition of William Quinn

Attached at Tab I is a memorandum from you to the President requesting his signature on the letter attached at Tab A. letter is in response to Prime Minister Thatcher's letter to the President (Tab B) expressing the determination and the cooperation between our two governments to combat international terrorism.

She notes her disappointment, however, in the U.S. District Court Appeal against the extradition of William Quinn, an IRA member, accused of murdering a British policeman in 1975. She feels that nothing should interfer with our commitment to fight terrorism, therefore, she will be following the outcome of the case with particular interest.

The President's response at Tab A expresses his disappointment in the judgement and notes that the Department of Justice's attempt to seek judicial review of the decision may not come for several months. Meanwhile, Mr. Quinn remains in the custody U.S. Court of Appeals in San Francisco.

The President's letter also notes that the Administration has introduced legislation which could counter similar appeals for extradition by requiring the courts to apply more restrictive criteria in adjudicating "political offense" claims in offenses similar to William Quinn's.

Finally, the President's letter notes that he would like the terrorism issue to be included in political discussions during the Summit this summer. Since Doug McMinn will be travelling to London on Tuesday, he could personally carry the President's letter.

Issue: How to respond to Prime Minister Thatcher's letter (Tab B) regarding international terrorism and the extradition of William Quinn, an IRA member.

Facts: On September 17, 1983, you sent a message to Western European Heads of State/Government soliciting their views on how best to proceed in combatting terrorism. In her reply, Prime Minister Thatcher cites the failure to extradite an alleged IRA member, William Quinn, who is accused of murdering a British police officer. Quinn is currently being held in San Francisco pending a final decision by the U.S. District Appeals Court. We have been holding any further missives in hopes for a positive outcome.

Discussion: While a response to Prime Minister Thatcher's letter is not imperative, it is an opportunity to press for better joint action against terrorists. Your letter at Tab A provides her with a status report on the Quinn case and note your position on the "political offense" issue. It also solicits her support for including counter-terrorism on the agenda for this Summer's Summit. Given recent IRA activity, we hope to find empathetic support for such an initiative.

Dear Margaret:

Thank you for your letter of October 7, indicating that we are together in our concern about international terrorism and a determination to combat it. I am heartened by your expression of our common resolve.

With regard to the William Joseph Quinn case which you raised in your letter, I share your disappointment that a U.S. District Court Judge in San Francisco recently held that Mr. Quinn is not extraditable to the United Kingdom. The Department of Justice is attempting to seek judicial review of that decision. In the meantime, the U.S. Court of Appeals in San Francisco has ordered that Mr. Quinn remain in custody pending its final decision. That decision, however, may not come for some time.

International terrorists should not be immune from extradition on the ground that their crimes are "political offenses." My Administration has twice introduced legislation which would make it considerably more difficult to invoke the "political offense" exception in cases such as this. We seek to establish more restrictive criteria for the courts in their adjudication of such claims. When the Congress reconvenes, we will again press hard for a positive outcome on this bill and on several others which will be helpful in combatting terrorism.
