COGNIZANT ACTIVITY: STATE, JUSTICE, TRANSPORTATION, FBI, FAA

SUBJECT: Airport and Port Security

ISSUE: The relative success of security programs at airports is due to the high degree of cooperation among the FAA, federal law enforcement and intelligence agencies, the airline industry, airport authorities and local law enforcement officials. The successful airport security program has been maintained without inconvenience to the traveling public and commerce and is consistent with the ideals of a free and democratic society. Pre-flight screening of passengers and carry on baggage, which has detected over 30,000 firearms and resulted in 13,000 arrests, is the cornerstone of the domestic security program. Despite the success of the security program to date, the recent attacks against commercial aviation and maritime shipping illustrate the need to continually monitor and update security procedures and policies. In contrast to airport security measures, at the present time there are no federally prescribed security measures to protect ports, vessels, passengers or crew members from terrorist acts. Additionally, at both airports and terminals there is no provision for individuals working in restricted areas to have a criminal background investigation before they are hired. These personnel have access to planes and ships and could easily engage in some act of sabotage or terrorism.

PROPOSAL: The IG/T Working Group on Maritime Security, chaired by the Department of Transportation, should coordinate a survey of current security procedures and levels of threat to vessels, passengers and crew members from terrorist acts, as well as review existing statutory authority in this area. This review should include consultation with the Maritime Administration, Coast Guard, State Department and FBI. On this basis, it should determine whether adequate legislative authority exists to regulate maritime security procedures, and, if not, should make a recommendation with respect to new legislation. Additionally, legislation should be pursued which permits airport and terminal licensees access to FBI State and local law enforcement criminal history files. These actions should be done in concert with the Department of Justice.

COGNIZANT ACTIVITY: JUSTICE

SUBJECT: Private Sector Activities That Aid/Abet Terrorism

ISSUE: Some individuals and private companies are known to engage in acts that aid or abet terrorism. Selected activity of this nature is currently legal. For example, a TV network, newspaper, or publisher is not legally constrained from "buying" an interview with known or practicing terrorists. Contributing to the financial support of terrorist organizations in this fashion directly contributes to the growth of terrorist activity. Another example might be insurance underwriters who pay a state that is sponsoring terrorism some amount of money (less than the face value of the policy on an aircraft) to have the state return an aircraft severely damaged in a hijacking incident to the parent company. (Thus the insurance underwriters lose less money than if they had to pay the airlines for a destroyed/lost plane.) A third example is policies and actions by US companies regarding the kidnapping of their executives overseas: Many US companies buy kidnapping insurance (e.g. from Lloyd's of London) and are required to retain the advice and services of security firms (such as Control Risks, Ltd.). bottom line is that many US companies are prepared to negotiate with and pay ransoms to terrorists, even if US laws are violated (e.g. the ransom letter being sent through US mail) and even though US Government policy is not to make concessions or pay ransom to terrorists. This conflict of objectives has the potential to place the USG in an awkward and embarrassing position: The USG may be "facilitating" US company/host government relations (in which the company may be seeking "non-interference" by host country law enforcement agencies in a kidnapping of one of their executives) at the same time that the US Embassy is encouraging the host government in its tough policy against terrorism (which may include technical support and advice to the local law enforcement agency investigating the same kidnapping).

PROPOSAL: The DOJ should investigate ways in which such payments and activities by US companies or individuals to terrorists, terrorist organizations, or states sponsoring terrorism could be made illegal. (Special attention would have to be devoted to the problem of enforceability of these laws.)
