Attached is a synthesis of the policy issues discussed at the Policy Review meeting held on July 3rd. The attachment is compiled from many documents including those submitted from the Office of Policy Development, Office of Cabinet Administration, Office of Management and Budget and the National Security Council staff. The organization of these policy issues is consistent with the Phase III policy goals and priorities outlined in our memorandum to you entitled "Phase III Strategic Plan Policy Focus" dated 2 July 1981.

The following is a summary of the Administration's policy areas and goals, including an indication of how each policy area is handled in Phases I, II and III:

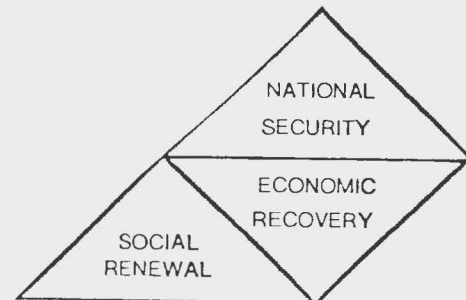
