Attached are some suggested policy initiatives that could be included at the end of the paper on Mexico.

ADDITIONAL POLICY INITIATIVES FOR MEXICO

5. Enable better control of Mexican border by (a) targeting effort on more serious problems (e.g., drug smuggling, violent crimes, terrorism, health hazards); (b) improving use of modern technology (e.g., laser beams) for ground and air surveillance of remote areas; (c) increasing coordination of civilian activities (e.g., consolidate agencies, reduce duplicate clearances); (d) utilizing military assistance where appropriate authority applies (e.g., posse comitatus) or civilian authority is limited (e.g., responding to paramilitary activities); and (e) establishing a simpler, yet more secure identification method for persons from Mexico in the U.S. for various purposes that does not require a national identity card.

6. Make illegal immigration more costly by (a) increasing fines and incarceration reimbursement for those detained based on their ability to pay and their prior record of illegal immigration; and (b) deporting apprehended illegal immigrants deeper into Mexico.

7. Increase legal immigration quotas for Mexican citizens for a two year period.

8. Evaluate suitability of U.S. laws or practices such as those that permit the children of illegal aliens to become U.S. citizens on birth.

9. Analyze impact of population nature and growth in the U.S. and Mexico on jobs and public services.

10. Have the President seek a joint accord with the President of Mexico that (a) deplors illegal activity; (b) encourages economic cooperation between the U.S. and Mexico; (c) encourages legal travel or migration between the U.S. and Mexico; and (c) establishes a bilateral commission to work out details of general agreements.

11. Have the President give a speech on national TV that enables the public to be more aware of the implications of illegal immigration and how the Administration needs public help in controlling undesirable immigration.
